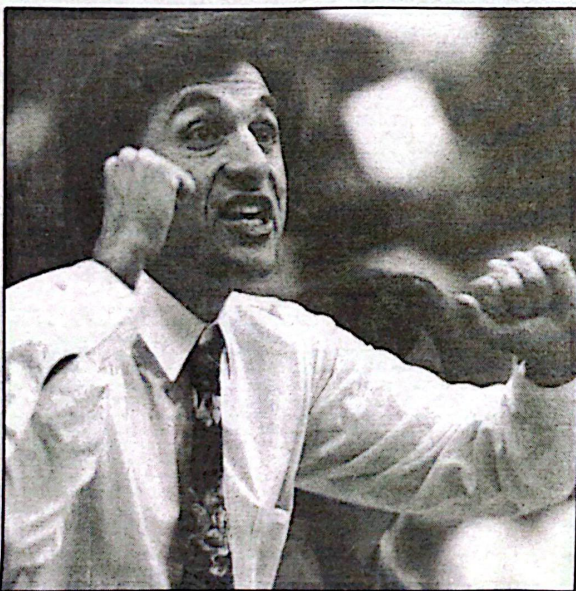

# GRAND SLAM!

## Ladycats win 4th straight CIF crown

Winning CIF titles is becoming old hat for Brea Olinda Ladycats coach Mark Trakh.

Saturday night's 49-35 win over Inglewood Morningside at UC Irvine's Bren Events Center was the Ladycats' fifth under Trakh, and their fourth straight, tying Morningside's and Riverside Poly's record of four consecutive championships.

Despite shooting only 33 percent from the floor, they won. The Ladycats' defense was the story again, holding the Lady Monarchs to just 19.2 percent shooting, and containing 6-foot-2 center Tina Thompson.

"(Thompson) had a great affect on us," Ladycat Colleen Hudson said. "Her height made it hard to shoot over her. I think we just had to jump a little higher for rebounds. We played her perfectly."

Thompson, who averaged over 23 points per game during the regular season, was held to just 15, including only six in the second half.

"She was our main focus," said Jody Anton, who enjoyed another stellar performance in a big game with 24 points and 14 rebounds. "We knew we needed to stop her because she is the best player on their team."

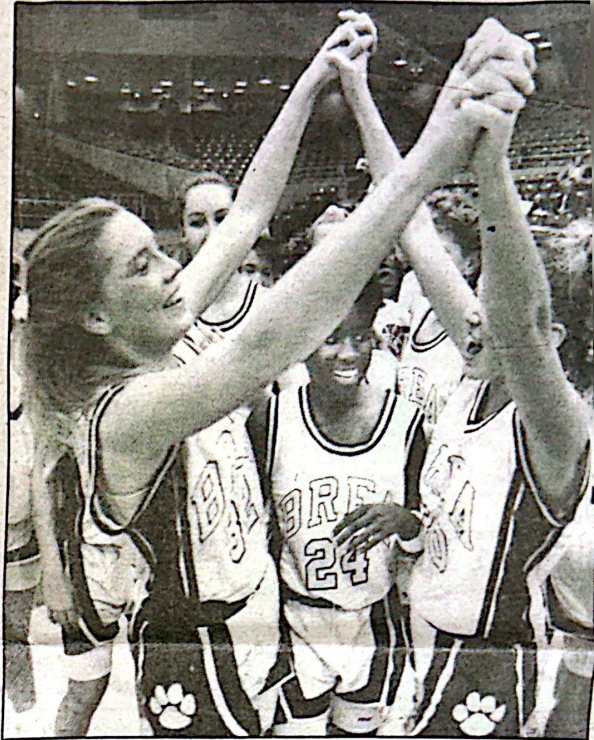
"When they came out with a man defense, we knew we had a chance. Our coach thinks we can run our offense against any team that plays man-to-man. We just got the ball to everybody."

The Ladycats forced 14 turnovers and all but shut the Lady Monarchs out in the second and third quarters.

The game was tied after the first quarter, 10-10, thanks to Anton's hot hand. She hit a three-pointer and finished the quarter with eight points. A 7-0 run at the beginning of the second quarter broke the game open for the Ladycats. Anton hit another three-pointer and added a jumper, and Hudson hit a layup in the run.

The Ladycats penetrated to the basket on nearly every possession, but the presence of Thompson forced most shots wide.

Brea Olinda led at the half, 22-16, behind Anton's 13 points. Hudson finished the half with seven, and Nicole Erickson had three assists. The Ladycats had four girls with at least two fouls at halftime including Nicole

Clark and Sarah Beckley with three each.

But another 7-0 run broke open the game in the third period. Katie Bauer made two fast break layups, and the Ladycats jumped out to a 31-19 lead.

Anton hit another jumper with just over a minute left to repel a Morningside 7-0 spurt, and the Ladycats led, 33-26, entering the final eight minutes.

Anton opened the fourth quarter with a three-pointer, and the Ladycats were never threatened.

The Ladycats defense was just too strong down the stretch, expanding the lead to as many as 16 points, before settling for the 14-point final verdict.

## CURIO 790

It was on April 17, 1940, that press writers in the sports field across the nation told the world that "Paul Moore, Brea, Calif., sets new world's record in running  $\frac{3}{4}$ -mile in 2:58:7 minutes," to beat a world's record of 3:00:6 held by a Frenchman, Jules Ladoumègues, since 1932.

It was by accident that Paul discovered his racing ability here at Brea, during a tennis match in his senior year.

Asking his coach for time-out to get a sweat shirt, he was directed to Coach Shorty Smith. Mistaking his identity, Smith sent him into the track race. Before Paul could demure, he was on his way to win world honors from that beginning.

## THE BALL IS PASSED TO A NEW GENERATION

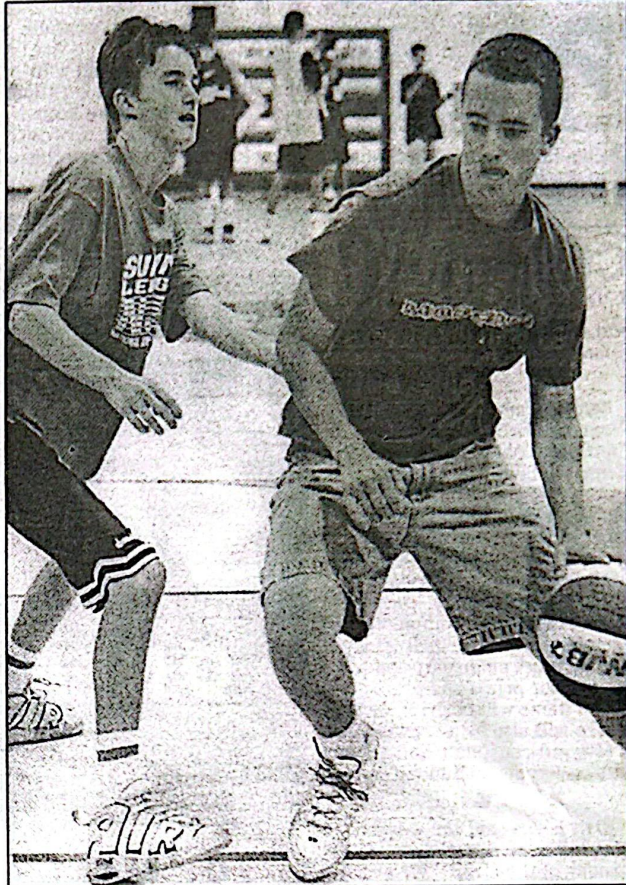
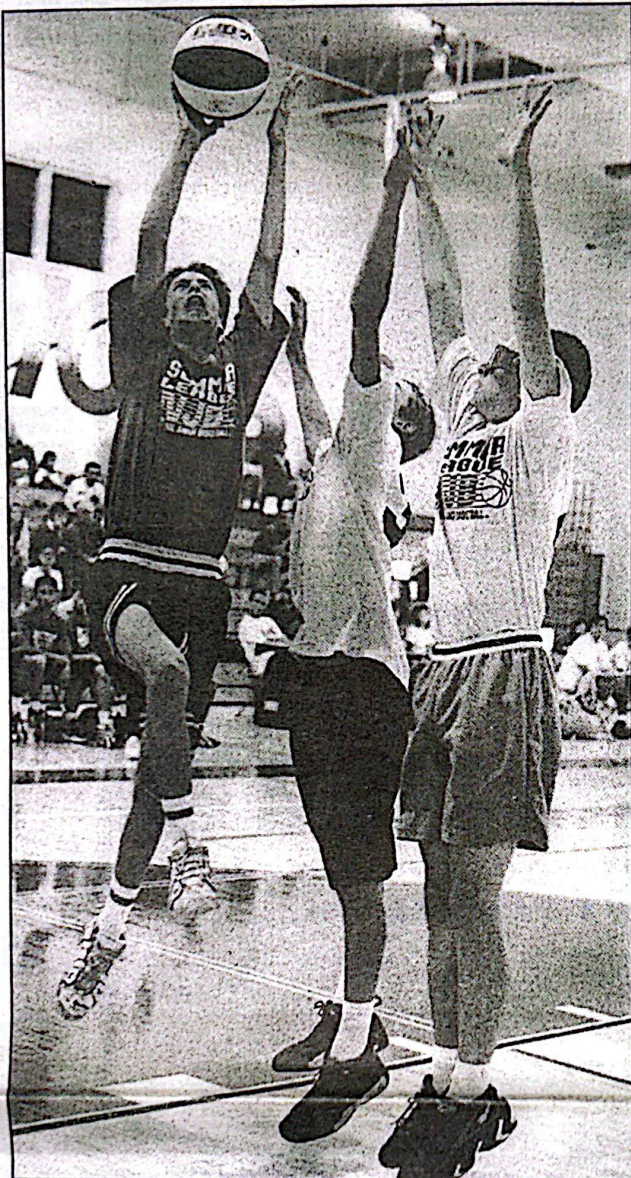
Van Houten is among several Brea families provide a seemingly inexhaustible supply of top hoop performers

Only the county recorder and a handful of Brea parents know how many Repp, Van Houten, Bodulla and Skrifvars children are left out there. Brea and Santa Ana basketball fans hope the list isn't tapped yet. These are among the most illustrious family names in local youth hoops — the aristocracy of the hardwood. All have graduated varsity players from the high school and all have rising successors playing on elite eighth-grade teams this year. In particular, the Brea eighth-grade boys All-Net team plays with familiar surnames. Sixth man Kiki Bodulla is the younger brother of 1995 graduate Madhav Bodulla, a swingman in his senior year for the 19-9 Wildcats. Power forward Richard Repp is the latest in a long line of Repp post-players: Sister Anna, a 1997 Brea grad, starred with the Ladycats, and cousin Craig ('96) was a 6-foot-7 post-tyer for Wildcat coach Gene Lloyd.

Also on the All-Net team is Preston Van Houten, whose brother, Jason, was a valuable wingman on last season's 25-4 Wildcat team. Van Houten, a 5'10" two-guard, says Jason's involvement with the high school program facilitated his own love of basketball.

"When he started playing, I wanted to start playing, too," Preston, whose brother attends Fullerton College, recalled. "I guess I wanted to be like him." In honing his craft, Preston teamed with his brother and stepfather to play three-on-one games at Brea's favorite unofficial proving ground — the senior high. Jenny Skrifvars, an eighth-grade player on the girls' All-Net team, played here with her brothers, Jason

and Jerett, before the former left to play at Montana State and the latter, a junior, joined the high school program. Van Houten scores approximately 18 points per game for the 4-0 All-Netters, according to his coach, Jim Giesler. He also is an adept passer and rebounder.

"He's an amazing player," Giesler said. "He can shoot from outside and is a real hand-

ful down low, can pass and is a good defender. He's our Hondo Havlicek — he can do it all." Van Houten dished out eight assists in last week's 50-37 win over the Irvine Buzz, a testament to playmaking abilities that run in the family. "Jason actually played point guard for us at times, too," Brea coach Gene Lloyd said. "He was so valuable because he had so many skills. I think he

turned out to be one of the better sixth men in the county." In addition to the younger Van Houten's seven points and eight assists in last week's game, the All-Net team got 11 points from Repp and 16 points from Eric Giesler, Jim's son. Van Houten and Giesler combine to form a formidable three-point shooting crew, according to the coach. "(Eric) and Preston must shoot about 60 percent together from the three-point line," he said. "With those guys, we're really explosive, up-tempo. We haven't found anybody who can keep up with us. If they double-team Eric, Preston will just scorch them." Since the All-Net team is essentially an all-star squad of the

city's eighth-graders, it's likely that Van Houten, Giesler and Company will compete on the high school's freshman team next season. So, where will that leave the future of Brea hoops? Jim Giesler has an idea. His youngest son, Jeff, took part in Lloyd's summer basketball camp for fourth through 12th graders and won several individual contests, including the "round the world" shoot-off. Jeff, a third-grader playing up a division, also made the finals of the free throw competition and the one-on-one tournament. In the latter event, he lost to a seventh grader on a reverse lay-up. "He's a good little player," the father said fondly of this rising basketball terror.

## Signs of the times: hometown heroes

BREA — Brea's hometown heroes are getting their share of recognition these days, thanks to the Brea Olinda High School Football Booster Club.

For the second year in a row, green and gold "spirit signs" are showing up on the homes of BOHS varsity football players, announcing to neighbors and passers-by that "A Brea Olinda Wildcat Lives Here."

The booster club signs, complete with the player's name and jersey number, are not the type to be discreetly displayed in the corner of the window. The 1-foot-by-4-foot wooden planks dominate balconies and doorways, giving visitors a good look at Wildcat pride.

Which is exactly what the boosters wanted the signs to do, said club President Alex Gasporra.

"We wanted the community to know we're proud of our sons, but we wanted the community to be proud, too," said Gasporra, whose son Lance wears No. 86 as a varsity outside linebacker. "We wanted to let the neighbors know about our players so they could wish them luck and maybe decide to come to the game."

Gasporra's wife Judy, who runs the snack shack during the 11 season and serves as club secretary, said the spirit signs came from Sue Coop, whose son is a varsity fullback. The sign had been used in Coop's home in Ohio, where her son played football, Judy said.

The signs made their debut

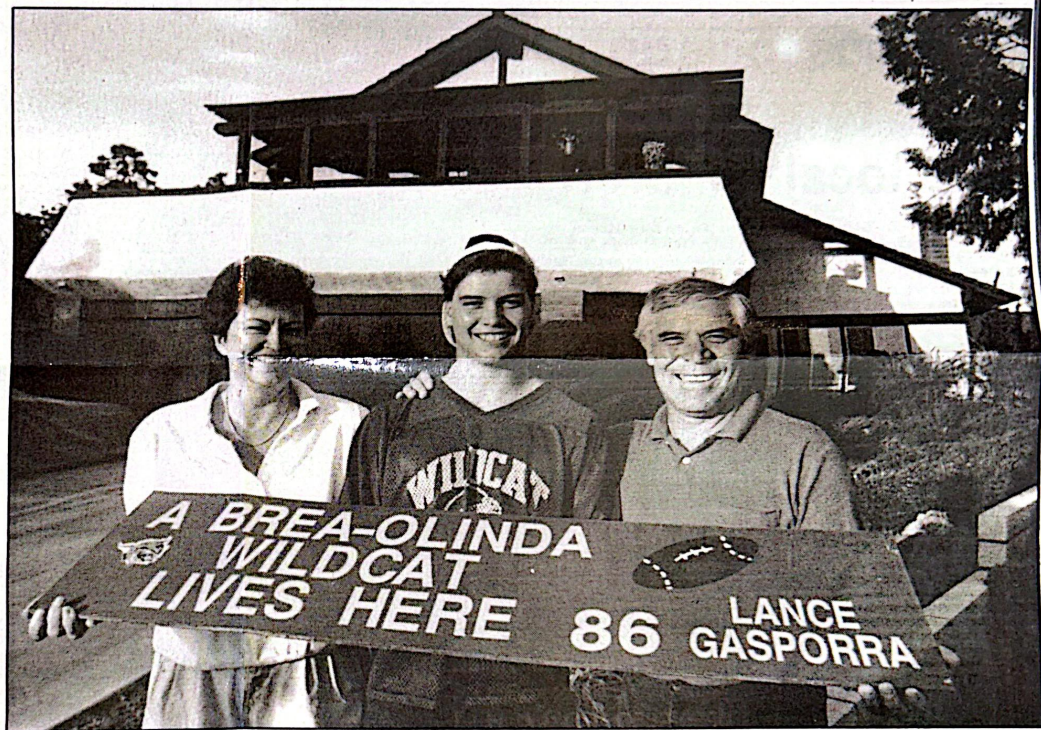
in Brea last year, when the Wildcats moved into their new stadium on Wildcat Way. This year's varsity roster carried 38 new names, which meant a massive Labor Day project for the football boosters.

Alex Gasporra and Rich Buonauro, father of cornerback Mike Buonauro, wielded the brushes and buckets of green paint while Judy Gasporra led the team of booster club members who applied the lettering, footballs and Wildcat decals.

Helping with the project were Marilyn and Ron Feine, parents of cornerback Marc Feine; Sheila Buonauro; John and Sue Coop, Pat Ryan, whose son Mike is a varsity safety; and Rae Robinson, mother of varsity guard Aaron Robinson.

In addition to the spirit signs, the BOHS Football Booster Club is also sponsoring tailgate parties before each home game. The public is invited to the pregame steak dinners, which are served at the south end of the football field between 5:30 and 6:45 p.m. Tickets are \$6 for adults and \$4 for children under 12.

This season's home games are scheduled Sept. 21, Oct. 5, Oct. 19 and Nov. 9. At Friday's home game against Troy High School, the booster club will honor senior citizens and invited sponsors with free admission to the 7:30 p.m. contest. Rotary Club members will be recognized on Oct. 5 for their donation of a blocking sled to the football program. Oct. 19 is Homecoming for Brea Olinda and on Nov. 9, the Boosters will

salute participants in the Brea Pop Warner football program.

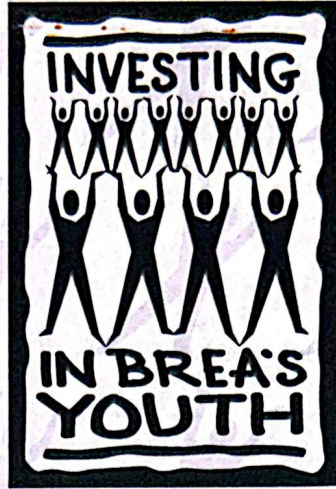
The BOHS Football Boosters also provide pregame meals for varsity players, pizza nights for freshman and junior varsity teams, a preseason picnic for players and their families and

# Steak 'n Eggs, No - Hitter To Satisfy 'Good Old Dad Winder'

Greeting card companies have managed to stereotype "good old dad" for Father's Day. Pictured the celebrated gent stretched across his favorite chair, beverage in hand, with a coast-to-coast smile reflecting satisfaction that his favorite baseball team has just managed a "no hitter" in an otherwise uneventful season.

The truth is that Jim Winder, sergeant with the Brea Police Department, knows the feeling. Except, you won't find Winder relaxing in his living room, relishing a day of peace and quiet.

With wife, Roseann, and daughters Kathy, 12, Teri 11, and Lori, 10, Winder will be dining at his favorite restaurant on steak and eggs and reliving the glorious moment of last week's Brea Bobby Sox Hot Chocolate game when his

pitchers threw a no-hitter. And the beverage in Winder's hand will not be the bubbly type. Instead, a cup of coffee will hit the spot as Winder rests between the midnight shift and another day on the field.

Life for "Good Old Dad Winder" may be looked upon by some as an attempt to try and touch all bases. But the 32-year-old coach suggests it's all worth the sacrifice.

A nine-year member of the Brea Police Department, Winder works rotating shifts. His first shift as watch commander is from midnight to 10 a.m., he sleeps until 4 p.m., arrives at the ball diamond by 5 p.m. for Bobby Sox practice and returns home to watch a few winks from 8 to 11 p.m.

"But it's the most rewarding thing to have an involvement with my

daughters, two of which are on the team," Winder relates. "I've really had no ego problems

with not having a boy; it was my daughters' idea to play baseball."

Winder was also re-

sponsible for forming the Brea Police Dept. Slow Pitch Team seven years ago when he

served as president of the Brea Police Employees Association. Interest has peaked as 14

teams play on both Friday and Saturday nights.

"I try to teach my team that there are lessons to be learned in the game; it's more than softball and fun," Winder explains. "It means being part of a whole team, getting along with

the family. All through life we are part of a team where there is a commitment, sacrifices and rewards."

He offers the example of the Bobby Sox player or policeman who wants to pitch all the games, hit home runs and always play first base. "But

they have to remember that when the team wins, everybody wins."

While working as a juvenile officer with Brea PD, he counseled young people by telling them "dropping out of school sets up a pattern for losing and not making it."



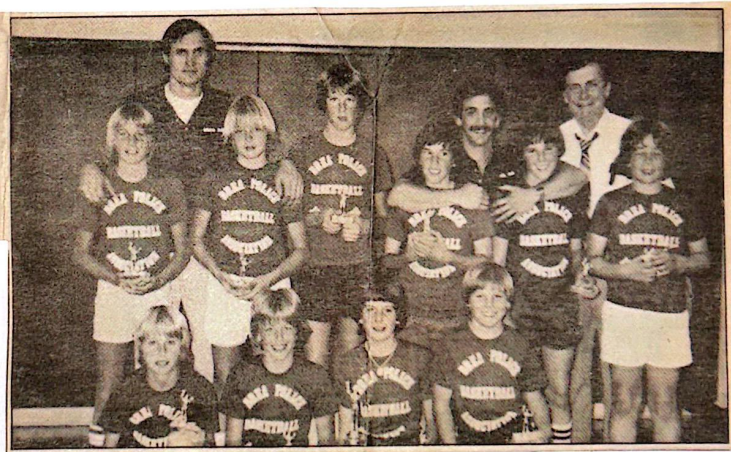

Dear Dean:

It was nice to get a relay call through Curtis that you are rewriting the history of Brea, and of course there is much pride that you should want me included. We think of you often; indeed we think of "home" often, for in many ways Brea will always be home to us.

Here is a short recap of me, as I understand the request, and I hope it will help.

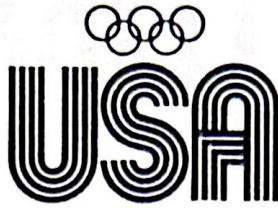
I was born March 24, 1937 to Leland and Lois Auer, who then resided in Anaheim, and who moved to Brea, on Walnut Street, before I was two years old. My first memory is of a 1940 flood rushing past the park. And so I grew up among the orange blossoms and in sight of the Mount Baldy peak, moving to Poplar Street about seven when Dad changed from musical director of the elementary and high schools on his career journey as oil engineer for Schaffer Tool to chief engineer for Cosasco Worldwide, and as my mother made her steps from stage director to drama coach. Here were the writer's, and your Olympic medalist's, formative years.

Before I graduated from Brea O'Linda, my father had already started a shooting club as a hobby for juniors, arranging the site for Brea on the Standard Oil grounds, and there I led this developing team into several national sports titles plus the Junior National Championship.

The entire town of Brea raised money in a special campaign to send me to the Olympic trials in 1956, where I made alternate.

My sports and education continued, and I won the national collegiate title three years on the UCLA team, and traveled on international sports teams prior to graduation at UCLA, then attending Exeter College, Oxford, England, and receiving an M.A. from UCLA in English Literature. I served in the Air Force, and was picked up for international sports again, winning the national and world titles in 1961, 1962.





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## VICTOR L. AUER

I was an Olympic silver medalist at the Munich Olympics in 1972, and a U.S. Olympian at Montreal in 1976. I gold-medaled in the Pan American Games in Columbia in 1971, and team-medaled at the Pan Ams in 1975, and at the World Games in Switzerland in 1974. I have also coached on goodwill tours through the U.S. State Department to Equador, Mexico City, Rome, Caracas, and Puerto Rico. I retired holding the World record for my event in 1977. I aided the U.S. Olympic Committee in Moscow 1980 before that boycott year, and have twice been honored by the White House, as I was honored by Tom Bradley for help on our Olympic Spirit Team for the 1984 Games in our own state of California.

Careerwise, I have written for many television shows, have done movie scripts here and abroad, and have had articles published in 110 countries and several languages. I am now at work on a book, which is an international thriller around Olympic and world competition.

But it's not a long ways really, from those \$.05 Brea pickles on the way to the \$.10 matinee, and racing pigeons next door to you, playing the trumpet, and rehearsing for speech contests, feeding chincillas for Dr. Curtis, and watching you protect the oranges from frost. How did you put up with me?

I'm now in Thousand Oaks, with my wife Karla and our eight-year-old daughter, Victoria. It's time to show her Brea.

So here you are, with my forever best and warmest wishes to you and all,

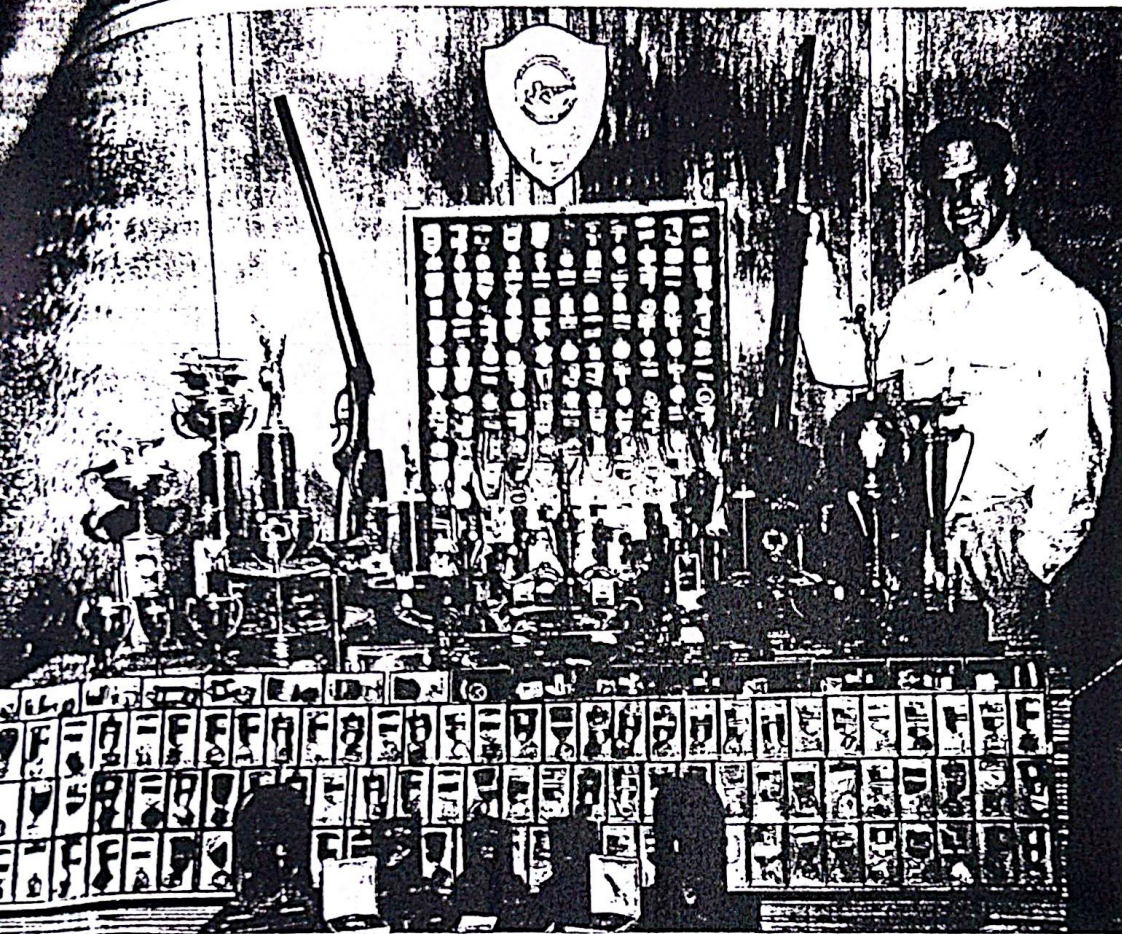

## Dead-Eye Vic Auer Takes 30 World Records With .22

In an interview with Vic Auer, popular and genial senior at Brea-Olinda, I found that we have one of the world's best shots in the .22 calibre rifle field right here attending our school. The aster-ranked competitor in his assault on the .22 calibre shooting records has compiled a terrific record of victories.

Proudly displayed on the walls of the Auer home are 286 medals and four plaques. From numerous silver hollowware which Vic has won. These spectacular and astounding feats are indicative of a veritable dead-eye Vic who has done more than his share at Brea on the map.

Since he took up rifle shooting in 1951 he has set 30 world records, seven of which are senior records (competition open to any age). He holds more records than any individual rifle shooting competitor at this time.

Vic's conquests have been too numerous to mention all of them, but I would like to highlight a few of his major ones. Auer won his first win in 1953

when he copped the Southern California Championship for those 15 years of age and under.

Among his great conquests were victories in the California and Wyoming State Championships in 1954 and the Kansas State Championship in 1953. All were in senior division competition. Perhaps his greatest win was a senior division win in the U.S.A. Southwest Sectional in '54. Vic says he is most proud of his junior world's record set in 50 meter scope shooting. His score was 400x37 which means that out of 40 shots, forty were seven-eighths and 37 were three-eighths of an inch from the exact center of the target.

In 1954, he and his dad, also a crack shot, attended the National Team Championship at Camp Perry, an establishment about four miles from Toledo in Ohio. If he isn't on top, Auer is almost redoubtably in the top three. He is a member of the Brea Rifle Club, the hottest and most fabulous Jr. Club in America at the present time.

Vic uses a special custom built .22 calibre rifle that is a

magnificent gun. Its mechanism and precision are near micro-metrically perfect. In addition to this he possesses two more rifles, all of which he keeps in tip-top shape, highly polished and immaculately clean.

The 17-year-old phenomenon is also a top-flight chess player and a fine student, known for his oratorical work. He plans to keep on piling up records and furthering his education at some college or university next fall, entering the scientific field as his chosen profession.

## A Letter To Virginia

Forty-two years ago this month the New York Sun received the following letter:

Dear Editor:  
I am eight years old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says, "If you see it in the Sun, it's so." Please tell me the truth, IS THERE A SANTA CLAUS?

Virginia O'Hanton.

Below is Mr. Church's "Letter to Virginia" as it appeared in its original text.

The editor asked Frank P. Church, an editorial writer, to answer Virginia's letter. He soon warmed to what at first he disdained as a trivial job and turned out the letter that was to make him famous. His reply has been reprinted millions of times and in every country in the world where Christmas is observed. Even today no holiday season passes without bringing to the Sun hundreds of requests for the text of this classic answer to the question, "IS THERE A SANTA CLAUS?"

"Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

"Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exists, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest

beauty and joy. And how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus! It would be as dreary as if there were no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

"Not believe in Santa Claus! you might as well not believe in fairies! You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas Eve to catch Santa Claus, but even if they did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would they prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children or men can see. Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof that they are not there. Nobody can conceive or imagine all the wonders that are unseen and unseeable in the world.

"You tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil covering the unseen world which not the strongest man, nor even the united strength of all the strongest men that ever lived, could tear apart. Only faith, fancy, poetry, love, romance, can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it real? Ah, Virginia, in all this world there is nothing real and abiding.

"No Santa Claus! Thank God! he lives, and he lives forever. A thousand years from now, Virginia, nay, ten times ten thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad the hearts of childhood."

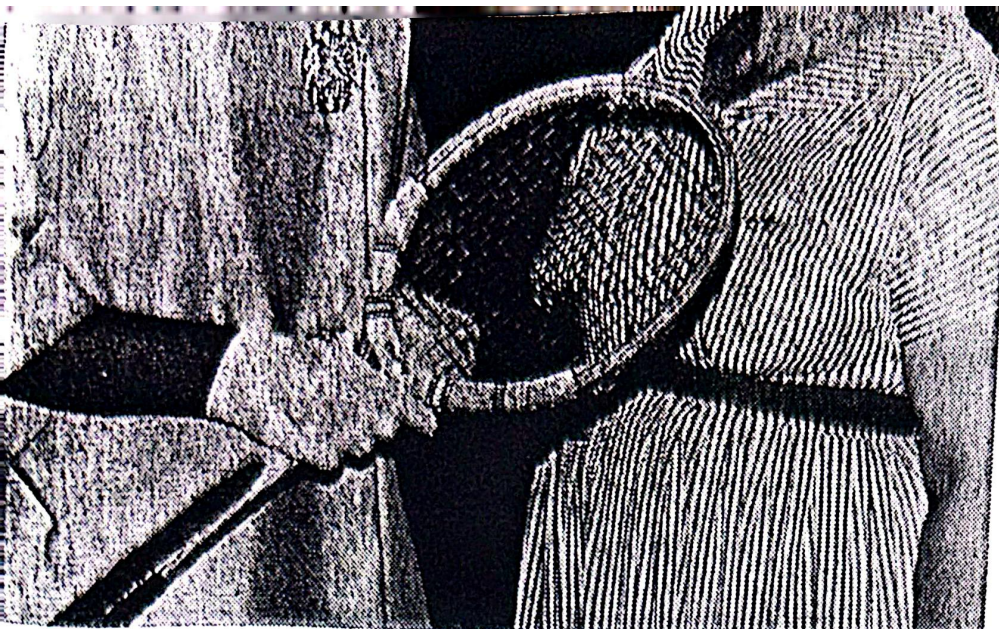

"I approached them at first and after meeting with the coaches, they gave me the chance to try out," Adler said. "I also wanted to go to a four-year school rather than a junior college."

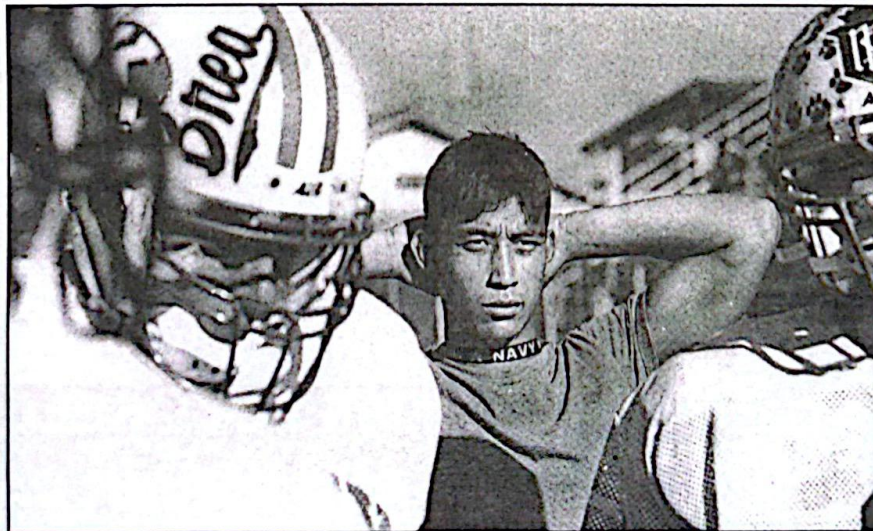
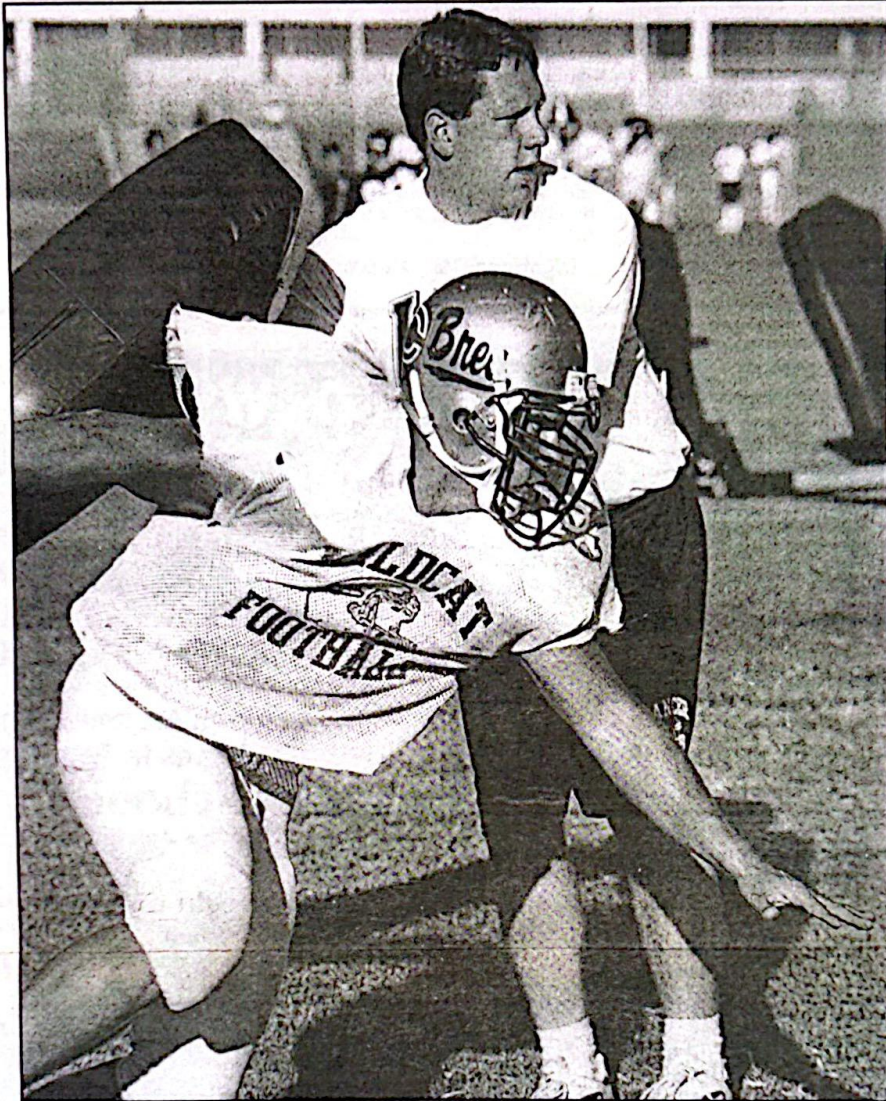
Adler is very excited about playing for the legendary former Notre Dame coach.
