representatives of local business benumbed federal directives which compel them to come up with Emergency Epsilon Plans.

However when the complaints died down the businessmen conceded the regulations would have to be complied with and supported the PMP recommendation for a Commuter Computed survey.

Survey packets will now be distributed to all companies expressing an interest in the car pool program.

Each firm will be responsible for disseminating the surveys to their employees. By going through the employer the PMP committee hopes to get a high response rate from workers.

Several of the complaints concerned this method of distribution, however.

"Why is it always up to the employer to get these things done?" asked one industry representative. "We're trying to put people to work and we have a long line of people with surveys like these. Let the government conduct the public if needs car pools."

Most of the persons asking the companies for information are from the county, state and federal governments. Congress has passed a bill requiring all industries with 250 or more parking spaces to formulate emergency plans and the counties are coordinating the effort.

The government wants these companies to have a scheme to reduce the number of cars on the road should major smog alerts or similar emergencies occur in the future.

Cities can either come up with a parking management plan, enforce federal Environmental Protection Agency rules or submit to a review of building codes by the federal government.

"We may not like the idea of having to implement these programs," said Woody La Valle of F.M.C. Corporation. "But the only way we are going to get anything done is through cooperation."

The committee is also planning to carry out the continuation of the oral history tapes, a Bicentennial symphony concert, dedication of the Junior High Park, Bicentennial gardens, merchant's window display, historical slide presentation for the school district, festival of arts, Mexican heritage and cultural display, essay contest, placement of the Liberty Bell and the Bicentennial Concert in the Park.

"We hope the entire community will get the spirit, get involved and join us in our wish for a Happy Birthday USA from the people of Brea", Mrs. Daetweiler concluded.

Chamber Supports Airport Election

BREA — The board of directors of the Brea Chamber of Commerce Wednesday unanimously voted to support proposed Assembly Bill 37 that would require an election within the area surrounding the proposed Chino Hills Airport (a 7½ mile radius) be conducted on whether the airport should be constructed.

If the bill is passed the proponents would have to apply to the Board of Supervisors who would in turn conduct the election.

Two sponsors of the legislation are Orange County Assemblymen John Briggs and Bruce Nestande.

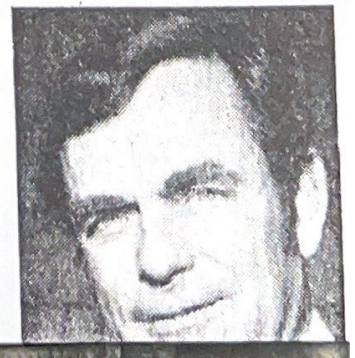
The board also agreed that Pauline Finch be recommended for appointment to the Beautification Committee as the chamber representative.

A GAZEBO... AHHH...

On July 3, 1976, at 11:00 a.m., the Soroptimist International Club of Brea will join with the City to publicly dedicate the recently constructed Gazebo in the City Hall Park. The public is invited to attend.

Margery Paul, President of the Soroptimist Club, will present the City Council with a check for \$3,500 at the dedication. The Soroptimists conceived the civic gazebo for a Bicentennial project and then collaborated with the City and the Brea-Olinda High School Regional Occupation Program to construct it.

The Gazebo has a touch of nostalgia for

long-time Brea residents who remember the City Hall Park foundation. The wrought iron railing which now surrounds the Gazebo once enclosed the fountain and the lightning rod which embellishes the roof once stood atop City Hall.

The Gazebo, which stands in the lovely location overlooking the City Hall Park grounds and rose garden, is backed by the historic Brea Plunge which offers hours of summer recreational aquatic fun for people of all ages. The Gazebo will house summer concerts in the park and numerous other civic events.

BREA LIBERTY BELL

The Brea Liberty Bell project was discussed by Phil Campbell and Frank Schweitzer as a Bicentennial event early in 1976. It was thought a project like this would be one that would not only help celebrate the Bicentennial year but one that would live for the future generations to remind them of our nation founding. The idea was presented to the Bicentennial Committee who favored it and also to the Citrol Lodge, who were pleased to be a part of the project. Phil and Frank visited the bell at Knotts Berry Farm, which is an exact duplicate of the original bell in Philadelphia and talked with one of their representatives to obtain more information. Drawings were made of the bell from enlarged projected pictures at quarter, half and full size and from these, the casting weight of each size was determined. The original bell is 45" high and weighs 2080#. The wall of this bell is quite thick, especially at the base, to obtain good tone, but it was felt that our bell did not need the proper pitch and by making it thinner, the cost could be lowered. After much study and discussion, it was decided to make the bell half size - 22" high, with a weight of 225# and at a cost of approximately \$2,000.

The idea was presented to the elementary school students and they were asked if they would like to participate in the project as their gift to the city, and upon accepting the invitation, they donated over \$300. The Citrol Lodge held several pancake breakfasts and have contributed over \$400.

The pattern for molding the sand to receive the metal was made by Campbell Pattern in Santa Fe Springs, and the casting was poured by McGraw Foundry in Brea. A perfect casting was obtained on the first pour, which is somewhat remarkable for a product such as this. The bell was cleaned up and even the crack was cut through the metal similar to the original, and a supporting member was made to support the bell. The presentation was made to the city at the fire department's fireworks display on July 4, 1976, by Phil Campbell in conjunction with two elementary students. Since that time, it has been on display at the Masonic Temple, each of the Brea-Olinda elementary schools and at Brea's 60th birthday party in February. Presently, it is in the Brea City Hall and will be placed in the foyer of the new city hall or library. To complete the project, a base was built and 6 plaques were fastened to it, one of which will record the names of the contributing organizations and persons. The cost of the pattern, casting the bell and the support amounted to \$3,500. - more than had been estimated but since only about \$800. has been collected, Campbell Pattern and McGraw Foundry, as a civic contribution, have assumed a large portion of the cost. An additional cost of \$500. has been added for the base and the plaques, four bought outright and two custom-made. The Bicentennial Committee, with unspent funds raised last year, and the Brea Historical Society will contribute to the project. The service clubs, along with any other group or person who would like to participate, are urged to do so and their names will be inscribed on the plaque. Make checks to James E. McGraw and Son Foundry and mail to 322 No. Orange, or give them to Frank Schweitzer.

Thank you for your consideration for we know the bell will
always be a cherished replica of our heritage.

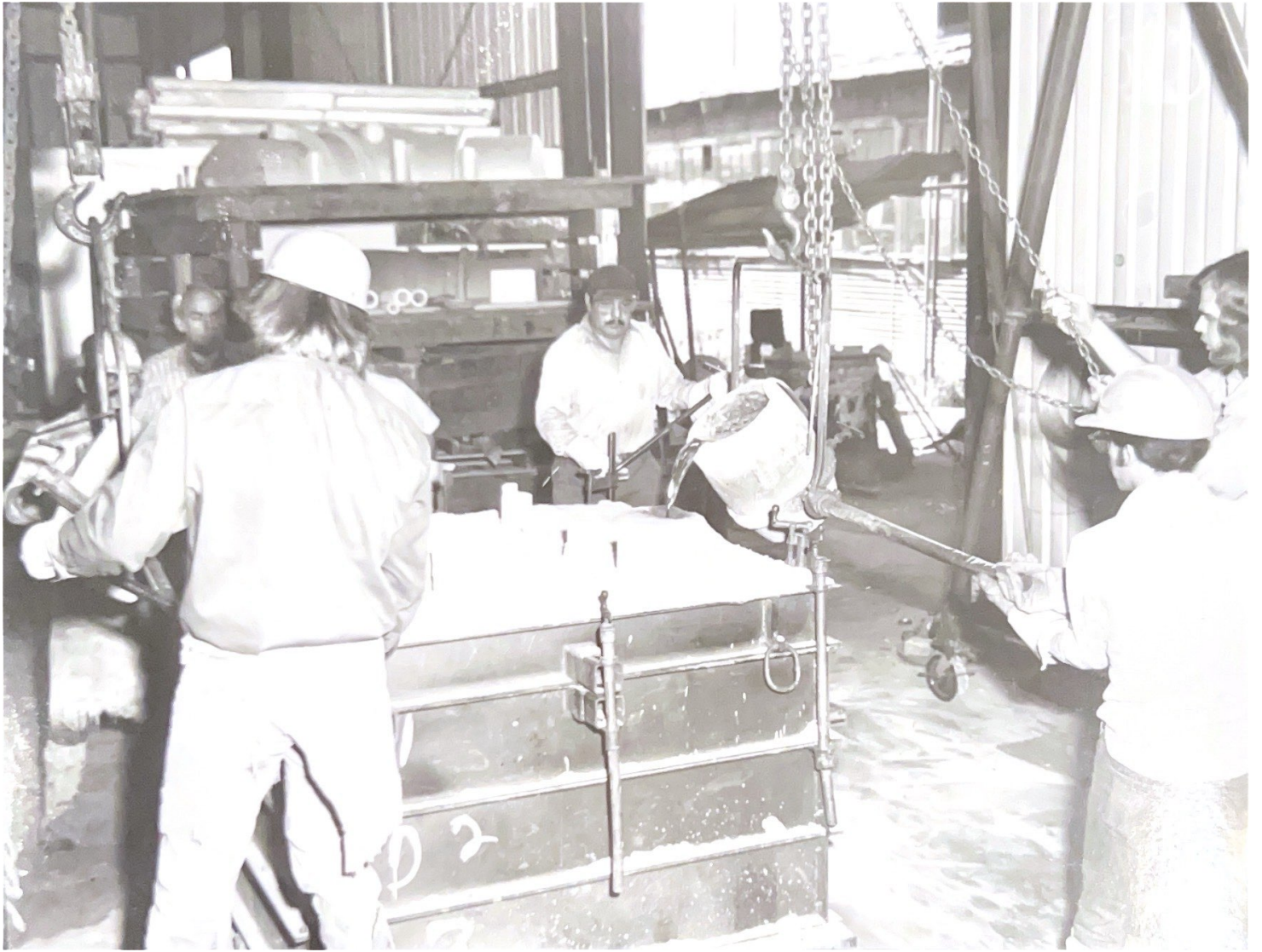

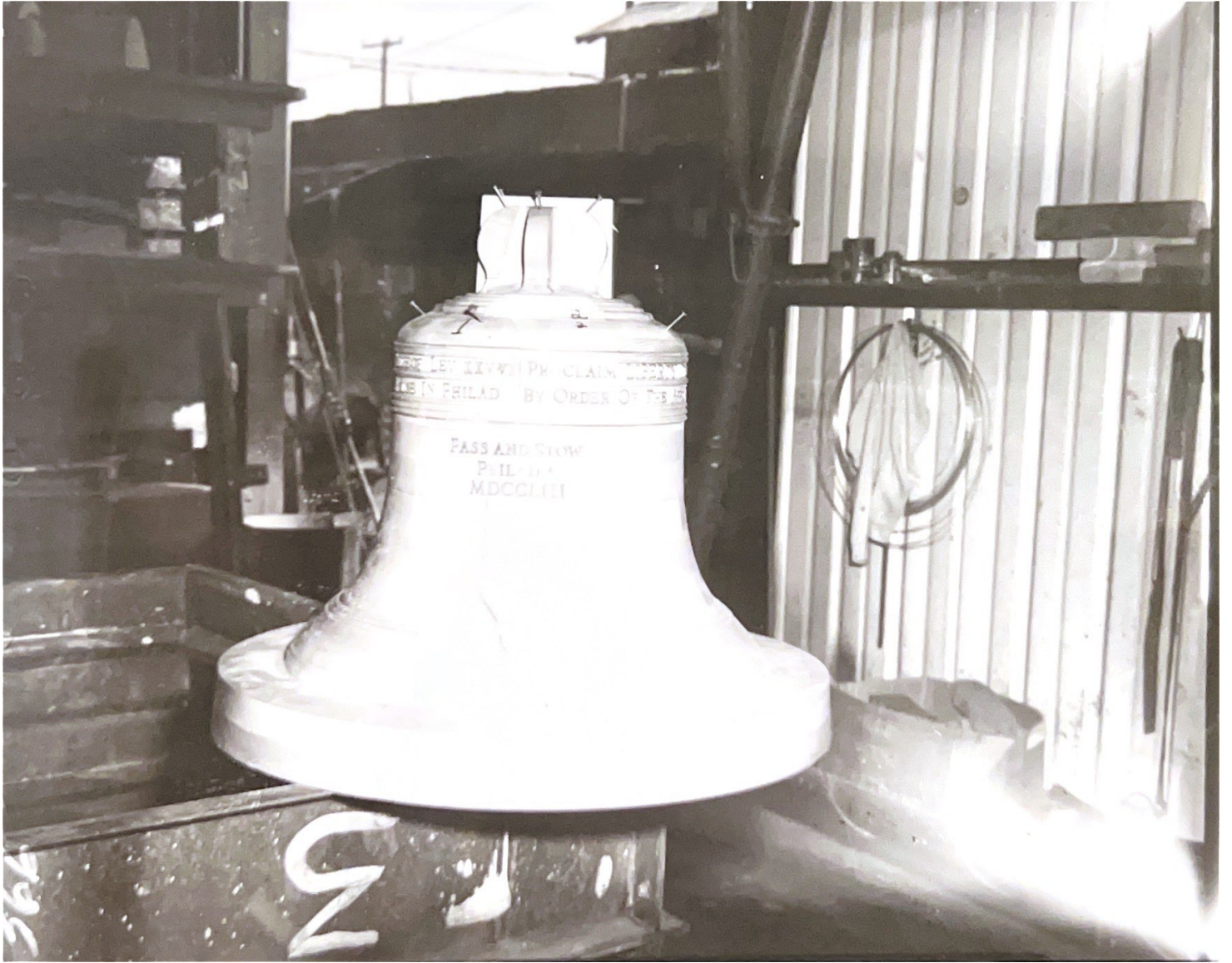
