

Finally, in 1969 the City decided that it was time for the fountain to be removed, but a promise was made to the Shaffer Family that one day another fountain would take its place.

Eleven years later it looked as if that promise was going to be fulfilled when plans and a fountain model were shown to the public. Nothing ever happened though. Why not?

I became curious and contacted former Mayor Weddle who had served during that time of the new plans. According to him, it was then a time of drought and water conservation so building a fountain at that moment just wasn't the best thing to do.

Unfortunately, it looked like the idea of a fountain had died, but six years ago when I heard the City had plans to place fountains in the downtown area, I had meetings and wrote letters asking that one of those be dedicated to Mr. Shaffer. No promises were made, but I began to hear positive comments by the City that it just might happen. A couple years later I moved away from Brea. Still nothing had been done fountainwise, but, as I learned later, Don Schweizer whose father had worked for Mr. Shaffer, had picked up the ball and was trying to make the fountain a reality.

Finally last year, with the sound of falling water in the background, that long ago promise to the family was fulfilled. In a ceremony on the Birch Street Promonade, reminicent of the one 53 years ago and attended by several members of the Shaffer Family, City officials and the public, Don, serving as MC, spoke of Mr. Shaffer, his accomplishments and his caring for his employees.

Sure, the new fountain with its oranges and green stems doesn't look anything like the original one in the park, but that's okay. I think Mr. Shaffter would have been pleased with it because after WWII one of the things he produced here in Brea at a plant on Pomona Ave. was a large wind machine on a high tower that was used to prevent freezing of citrus groves during periods of frost.

So, next time you're down on Birch St. stop and take a look at the fountain, think of the original one, and, oh yeah, one last thing -- don't forget to glance down at the plaque.

THE SHAFFER FOUNTAIN

Now that the old "Brea Welcomes You" sign and Charlie's Clock have returned to the downtown and been placed on the Birch Street Promenade, I thought this might be a good time to tell you about the third Birch St. landmark., the new Shaffer Fountain --- how it came to placed there and why it was given that name.

In the late 80's, when I was first bitten by that Brea history bug, one of the first things I learned about was the story of City Hall Park, its buildings and other features, some of which were no longer there. The original American Legion Building, sitting on the corner of Elm and Pomona Ave (Brea Blvd.) had been sold in 1929 to the Anaheim School District and moved there to be used as a "Mexican school." In the 1940's there was a pond at the southwest corner of the park that became a constant sore point to neighbors who complained about the nightly croaking of the pond's frog population.

The "feature" though that really interested me, one that had also disappeared, was the Shaffer Fountain. Sitting right where the present Memorial Rose Garden is located, it was a huge, octogon-shaped, 3-tiered thing that must have been really something during the 21 years it dominated the park.

And why was it built? Well, it's name partially gives that away. It was placed there to honor a very special man in our history---William D. Shaffer, or ,as he was commonly known, "W. D."

The next questions naturally are, who was he and what makes him so special that he was honored in such a way?

Born in Springtown, N.Y. in 1877, Shaffer first came to this area in 1903 when he became superintendent of a tool shop in the little oil town of Olinda. After some years there, he left for Santa Paula but returned to Brea in 1922, becoming a partner in the Brea Tool Works Co. When the company was sold, he bought it back himself, giving it the name Shaffer Tool Works.

That first plant was located on the southwest corner of Birch St. and Redwood Ave., and it produced a wide variety of oil tools which led to the success of company. Over the next 24 years that success continued and enabled the firm to expand around the country.

According to everyone I've talked to who knew Mr. Shaffer, and likewise from the articles I've read, he was a well-loved boss who went out of his way to care for his employees, including during that bad times of the Depression.

In a 1981 newspaper article, his one-time secretary Lois Muzzall Smith recalls that during the company's heyday, workers were more than just employees, they were family. "Mr. Shaffer was a man with a heart who would always smile and say hello to everyone. He would also throw big company picnics," she recalls, "and only a broken leg could stop anyone from coming."

He was so respected by his many employees, especially those here in Brea, that when he died in 1946 they wanted to do something very special in his memory. What they finally decided upon was a fountain, a really big fountain to be located in City Hall Park. Plans were developed and many local firms and citizens contributed their materials and skills at little or no cost.

On the evening of Sunday, Sept. 12, 1948 a big dedication cermony was held in the park with music, crowds of people and a speech by then Mayor McCart. All this was then followed by the big event of the night -- the ceremonial turning on of the fountain. Jets of water rose high into the air "to the surprise and amazement of the crowd." They were even more impressed shortly thereafter when the changing colored lights were illuminated., making the fountain "a thing of beauty and a restful picture to watch."

All went well for several years, but then by the early 60's the fountain wasn't working more than it was. The piping had deteriorated, and work was constantly being done to keep the water flowing. With all the problems, there was even talk in 1963 of turning the whole thing into one big planter!

in general, I feel public art should serve the public by creating a landmarks that give a sense of place. They should, I believe, emphasize the history and uniqueness of a

I designed the Orange Grove Fountain as a symbol of Brea's particular history. Orange growing of course, played a crucial role in Brea's history and the piece itself is a whimsleal interpretation of an orange grove with the elements being in both form and placement reminiscent of a grove of trees.

That the work is a fountain is also significant and, in my view, an apt symbol of Brea's prosperity. The town is built on an ancient sea bed which provides its oil reserves. Brea's earliest settlers were attracted to the location because of the availability of water at the site. In the twentleth century, Brea's fertile soil allowed for agricultural development in particular the cultivation of oranges. The piece, in subtle way, aims to remind the public of the close link between Brea's natural and cultural history.

I saw the The Birch Street Premenade as the beginning of another chapter in Brea's development with the new Main Street being a sort of joyful celebration of the town's history and future. The site celebrates the town's abundance and I believe the fountain is appropriate symbol of that good fortune. At the risk of sounding grand, I think the Orange Grove Fountain is a expression of thanksgiving for what nature has provided Brea and a celebration of the people who put those resources to good use.





BREA - John James, one of the eleven candidates for the four school board seats, believes there should be a change in the leadership style within the district.

James said he will work to see the district gets more and better service with less dollars. Others items he has mentioned he will do if elected include putting "action to ideas"; doing seats. The election will be held March





There's no duty more urgent, no privilege more precious than exercise of the right to vote. Now is the time to protect that franchise. In order to vote at the November election, Californians must be

registered by September 23. Here are the rules for registration:

If you failed to cast a ballot in either the November, 1948 general election or the June, 1948 primary, you must re-register. New registration also is required of any voter who has moved to a new address or who has changed his name.

To be eligible to register-and vote-you must be an American citizen and over 21. Residence requirements are one year in the State, 90 days in the county and 40 days in the district.

It's well to remember that if you want good government, you have to vote for it. And if your want to vote, you must be registered.

Here in Brea the registration books are open daily at the city clerk's office in the city hall.

For those voters unable to call at the city clerk's office during office hours, Mrs. Arthur J. Roland of 515 S. Poplar has made arrangements to register voters at her home. Mrs. Roland, who is a member of the Brea Junior Woman's Club, is doing this work without pay because she and the Woman's Club members felt it a civic duty to see that all voters in Breæ were given an opportunity to register.

Bonds, Change In Leadership, Maste

BREA — John James, one of the eleven candidates for the four school board seats, believes there should be a change in the leadership style within the district.

He is also one of the candidates who has voiced a strong concern over the \$9.8 million bond election to be held along with the board election on March 8.

James said he will work to see the district gets more and better service with less dollars. Others items he has mentioned he will do if elected include putting "action to ideas", doing his harmonical as school hard men

As you can see, I have attached the information you requested some time ago concerning Fred Thaheld and his Hummingbird, the first low-winged monoplane built in the United States. It was constructed at the location of what was 120 No. Brea Blvd. I have more information both about Thaheld and his plane in case you need it for the monument/plaque envisioned for that location in the Heritage Block.

Also, I have included three other news articles concerning the Shaffer Memorial Fountain that once stood in City Hall Park. It was placed there in 1948 to honor W.D. Shaffer. As it says in the first article, "The fountain is a fitting tribute to a man who was outstanding in his work in the field of oil drilling and exploration. He was intensely active in the civic and social affairs of the community, serving for nearly ten years as councilman and mayor.

The fountain was lit at night by colored lights, causing the water jets to change colors. According to residents who lived here while the fountain was in operation, people would park across the street from the park at night and watch the fountain change.

In 1969 the fountain was removed (according to the second article) with the promise that it would be replaced "soon" by a new one. Of course, that never happened.

Eight years later plans were drawn up and unveiled by former Brea Mayors Ken Wagoner and Don Shaffer (son of W. D. Shaffer) for the construction of the fountain. At that time Mayor Carol Weddle "reminded Shaffer of a prior fountain in City Hall Park named in honor of the Shaffer family which had been torn down and promised to be rebuilt." When I asked Carol recently why the plans were not carried out, he told me that there was a water shortage at the time.

And why am I bringing up this fountain business after so many years? The reason is that when final plans for the Heritage Block are drawn up, I would like to see the City follow through on its earlier promises to the Shaffer family and have a fountain with a memorial plaque placed in that little park area at the south end of the project. It could then be rededicated to the man who played such an important role to Brea's early history.

In making this suggestion I'm not saying that the fountain be reconstructed to look like the original. The design I would leave to you, although if it interests you the original fountain was in the shape of an octagon. I do feel though that the Heritage Block would be the ideal location for the new Shaffer Fountain, and as I remember, there

June 1, 1990 Interview with Dorothy Sandman Yates

The Shaffer Fountain

The Shaffer Fountain was a beautiful part of Old City Hall Park for many years. Located between Date and Elm Streets, it was centered in the middle of the block, facing Brea Boulevard. It was a landmark for miles around.

A bronze plaque on the fountain read as follows: "Dedicated to W.D. Shaffer by his grateful employees. September , 1948. The fountain was indeed paid for by Shaffer employees.

The Shaffer Tool Company was formed in Brea on and work there furnished a livelihood for many of Brea's earliest citizens. A kind and generous employer, Mr. Shaffer furnished social occasions such as annual picnics and Christmas parties for his workers. One high level employee, Mr. Frank Schweitzer, Sr., Sr., was able to invent oil tools that became global in use, with Brea being the headquarters. The company expanded to Texas in

As remembered by Dorothy Sandman Yates, a granddaughter, the fountain was octagonal in shape, with a cement curb about 20 inches high encircling it. The diameter was approximately 14 - 18 ft. Up above this curb, and in the center was another octagon of smaller size, about 4-5 ft. across, and it was also about 20 inches high. Each of the curbs, and the inside was painted light green. Red brick faced the top edges of both curbs.

The fountain was not often turned on in the daytime. At night, however, it became a moving spectacle of color. Multi-colored flood-lights pointed to the center and upward, adding to the magic of the surging water. A thin, high spurt in the of water would rise high in the middle, followed by wave-likemotions coming toward the center from the basic curbs.

Especially in the summer, local persons "out for a ride" drove very slowly along this block of Brea Boulevard -- their gyes glued to the beauty of the night.
