




1914: On July 6, 1914, the Rev. Paul E. Wright was granted a leave of absence from the pulpit at the First Christian Church of Santa Ana to start a congregation in Brea. Soon afterward, a group of men from Santa Ana and Brea put up the "tent-tabernacle" that would be the first of several structures at Ash and Walnut streets, and in August of that year Wright

held a three-week evangelical meeting at the tent site. In the fall of 1914, men of the congregation erected the wooden structure, shown here, in a single day. Two other structures were eventually to be built on the same site, the "little brown church" built by the congregation within the next decade, and a stucco structure that served until 1962.

> Today: On June, 17, 1962, ground was broken for the present location at Laurel and Lark Ellen. Because the site, at 3125 Laurel Ave., was just over the city line in Fullerton, the congregation voted to give it the new name of Lark Ellen Christian Church. The first services were held on Palm Sunday of 1963. On the site of the first Brea Christian Church today is the Brea Missionary Baptist Church, at 201 W. Ash St., built in the early 1960s.

Lark Ellen celebrates end of debt payments

Lark Ellen Christian Church will celebrate paying off the church's mortgage with a mortgage burning ceremony Sunday, Oct. 28. The festivities will begin at 6 p.m. with a pot luck supper. There will also be a "state of the church" presentation, allowing the congregation a voice in the decision-making processes that will chart a future course for the church.


The original church, the Brea Christian Church was organized in 1914. It was located at Ash and Walnut Streets in Brea, just one block west of Brea Boulevard. During the following years the wood structure was renovated and enlarged twice in order to serve the growing congregation. A parsonage

was built in 1919 on a lot adjacent to the church, a Log Cabin for the young people was put up in 1921. The final stucco sanctuary was dedicated in 1936, and in 1948, the two-room stucco Schweitzer Memorial building for pre-school children was built. These buildings still stand and are in use.

In 1960, with the old property having been sold. the congregation purchased the present 5% acre land site from the Union Oil Company. The name was changed to Lark Ellen Christian Church as a means of geographical as well as community identity, the location being just inside the Fullerton city limits on Laurel .. Lark Ellen Streets.

The sanctuary was completed and the first worship service was held on Palm Sunday, April 7, 1963. The members and friends of Lark Ellen are extremely

proud of the accomplishments of their 'founding fathers' and are continually striving to serve the Brea-Fullerton communities.





By now the Little Brown Church was about 20 years old and had been condemned. A loan of \$4,000 was secured in 1935 from the State Board of Christian Churches for the construction of the Stucco Sanctuary at an estimated cost of \$7,500. By the end of the year \$2,000 had been returned on the loan. The new Sanctuary was dedicated on Feb. 16, 1936, with services morning, afternoon and evening. The Young People presented a pageant, "Unveiling the Sanctuary". Mr. Stipp remained as minister until 1941.

Erroll B. Sloan served as minister from 1942-1945, followed by L. D. Howard, 1945-1947. Ronald Lemmex served during the years 1947 through 1949. It was during his ministry that the Schweitzer Memorial Building — a two-room stucco building for pre-school children — was built facing the patio. Ned Romine was minister from 1949 until 1952. Following his ministry, Dr. Claude E. Jones served as ad interim minister. W. Leslie Lowrey came from Northern California as minister in August, 1952, and has remained with the Church until the present.

A parsonage was purchased at 307 E. Locust St. in 1956 and the old parsonage was then used for class-room and office space. It was re-named Friendship House and served for several years as a meeting place for women's and youth groups as well as for Sunday School classes. The new parsonage was used for five years and then sold when the Lewreys purchased their own home at 615 S. Maple. A Building Fund was launched in 1956 with \$36,894 pledged over a three-year period.

THE BRICK CHURCH

A "Look to the Future" Committee was appointed on Feb. 10, 1959 to study possible future developments. This Committee, composed of Harold Carver, Chairman, This Committee, composed of Harold Carver, Chairman, Archie Logsdon, Elwyn Saferite, Morris Bergman, Frank Schweitzer, Grace Kreps, Jean Carver, James Miller and Leslie Lowrey, presented their report to the congregation: (1) Development of existing site; (2) Development of existing site plus adjacent property; velopment of a new 5-acre site on the south border of Brea. The congregation meeting on May 23, 1959, voted to accept plan No. 3 and to re-locate on a new site.

A five-acre site was purchased from the Union Oil Co. on Jan. 15, 1960, at a cost of \$30,727.26. Cash was paid for the new site. E. Lynn Child, architect from Fullerton, was selected to draw plans and oversee the building program. The contract was let to Arundell and Lindsey. Groundbreaking took place on Sunday, June 17, 1962, with Mrs. Clara Burquist, a charter member, participating. Others who turned over shovels full of dirt were W. E. Fanning, Elwyn Saferite, Eileen Logsdon, Harold Carver, W. E. Spicer, Rev. and Mrs. Lowrey.

Construction was completed and the first services were held on Palm Sunday, April 7, 1963. Dedication of the site and buildings was on June 16, 1963, with Dr. Gerald Bash, minister of First Christian in Santa Ana, as speaker. Other ministers participating in the Dedication were William R. Terbeck of the Area Office, Rev. Austin Coe of Downey, Rev. R. C. McFadden of Brea First Baptist. Rev. Roy Bullock of Fullerton First Christian, Rev. Frank V. Stipp, former minister of the Brea congregation.

The cost of land and improvements is \$40,000 and the value of the land is now more than double the purchase price.

The cost of our buildings is \$130,000, and our mortgage is now about \$73,000. The cost of furnishings is \$8,000.

The Sanctuary has over 5,000 square feet and seats about 350.

The Education Building contains 5,000 square feet, cight classrooms, rest rooms and offices.

Plans were drawn and construction directed by Architect E. Lynn Child, who is now a member of the congregation.

A HISTORY OF THE LARK ELLEN CHRISTIAN CHURCH

On an August morning in 1914, a group of men and women from the First Christian Church of Santa Ana erected what they called a Tabernacle on west Ash Street in Brea. This was the beginning of what became the Brea Christian Church which grew and prospered under the leadership of a number of very effective ministers and a strong laity. The Burquists, Schweitzers, Sextons & Fannings were among the church's earliest families.

The first minister was Thomas Vance. He was followed soon by W.E. Spicer who served for over 10 years. Others who served were William Remfrey Hunt, J.W. Runyan, Frank V. Stipp, Erroll B. Slone, Leroy D. Howard, Ronald M. Lemmex, Ned M. Romine and W. Leslie Lowery. It was Les & Sadie Lowery who served the congregation when it moved to its present location in 1963.

The congregation has occupied several different buildings in its ongoing life, and each has special meaning for those who were involved in the construction of them. That first tabernacle was used for lumber in the construction of the "Little Brown Church" that was erected during the first ten years of the congregation's existence. A parsonage was constructed in 1919 and a couple of years later, in 1921, the famous Log Cabin was built by the Honor Knights. The Little Brown Church was improved over the years, including a white paint job. It lasted until 1935 when the Stucco Sanctuary was built at an estimated cost of \$7,500. The new sanctuary was dedicated on February 16, 1936, during the ministry of Frank V. Stipp.

Over the years that followed, the Schweitzer Memorial Building, a two-room stucco building for preschool children, was built. It was at this time, in 1952, when the Lowerys came from northern California to assume leadership of the Brea congregation.

In 1956 a new parsonage was purchased and the old one was converted into classroom and office space and renamed Friendship House. This building became the center of congregational life as the meeting place for women's and youth groups, and as the Sunday School. The newer parsonage was eventually sold when the Lowerys purchased their own home. Interestingly, Friendship House was only recently demolished as part of the Brea redevelopment program.

Now begins the second phase of the life of this congregation. A building fund was launched in 1956 and with \$36,894 pledged over a three year period, a five acre site on the south border of Brea was purchased from Union Oil Company. The purchase occured on January 15, 1960, at a cost of \$30,727.26 which was paid in cash. E. Lynn Child, architect from Fullerton, was selected to draw plans and oversee the building program. Groundbreaking took place on Sunday, June 17, 1962, with Mrs. Clara Burquist, a charter member, participating.

Construction was completed and the first services were held on Palm Sunday, April 7, 1963. Les and Sadie Lowery continued to provide pastoral leadership until 1965 when they left to become missionaries in Okinawa. They were followed by Vernon D. Ummel, Bob Vinson, Paul Redmond, Bob Bodell, and the current pastor, Bob Weitzeil.

Discovering that they were in Fullerton, rather than Brea as they had first thought, the members of the congregation chose a new name that would more closely identify them with the new neighborhood. Taking the name from the major street in the area, Brea Christian Church became Lark Ellen Christian Church. Many new folks from the north Fullerton area became active in the congregation and it continued to grow.

In 1970 some of the excess land at the rear of the church was sold and developed. The first of two preschools began operation, and in 1979, under the leadership of Paul Redmond, the mortgage was burned.

Currently, the congregation shares the facility with a second thriving Christian preschool and two ethnic congregations, the Cornerstone United Methodist Church and the Brea Apostolic Assembly. Lark Ellen is also deeply involved in the work of the Fullerton Interfaith Emergency Services, the New Vista Shelter and community efforts to assist the homeless and the hungry of this area.

One of the more recent exciting events in the life of our congregation is the possibility of adding a fellowship hall through a joint venture with the other two congregations now sharing the facilities.





With the surprise resignation of Rev. Leslie Lowrey, who has served as pastor for 13 years, members of the Christian Church today looked back over the church's long history in Brea. The Lowreys are leaving for missionary work in Okinawa next month.

It was 51 years ago yesterday that the Reverend Paul E. Wright was granted a leave of absence from his pulpit at First Christian Church in Santa Ana to lead in starting a church in Brea. He brought with him a group of men from Santa Ana and they were joined by men from Brea who built the "Tabernacle in a

Day" on West Ash Street. During the month of August, Mr. Wright held a three-week evangelistic meeting aided by Miss Myrtle Wilson. The church was organized at the conclusion of this meeting. Later that year, Thomas Vance was called to be the first minister of the new congregation. The Schweitzer, Burquist and Sexton families were among charter members.

Elders chosen to guide the new congregation were J. L. Sexton, W. H. Swoap, J. S. Elder and K. E. Nothway. The Henry Becker family today continues the close association of the J. S. Sextons with the church. Mrs. Becker is a daughter of the Sextons. Following the ministry of Mr. Vance two ad interim ministers served for brief periods-R. W. Abberly of Pasadena and Rev. Hahn of Los Angeles. It was during this period that Richard and Margaret Jones united with the church.

Little Brown Church

The following year, W. E. Spicer came to lead as minister. Brother Spicer recently commented about his first experience in Brea, "My first sermon in Brea was delivered in the slab 'built-in-a-day' meeting house on Ash street, some-

where around fifty years ago."

During the 10-year ministry of Rev. Spicer, The Little Brown Church was constructed, using some of the better lumber from the "Tabernacle in a Day".

The old records show that officers in 1918 included J. L. Sexton and W. E. Fanning as elders; J. L. Sexton and Richard Jones on the Board of Trustees; Bible School Superintended was W. E. Fanning, and Director of Music was Mrs. F. J. Schweitzer. During 1918, the church was incorporated under the laws of the State of California. The Articles of Incorporation were signed by Edward Beatty, J. S. Elder, K. E. Nethaway, W.H. Swoap, J. L. Sexton and W.E. Sniver

Parsonage Built

In 1919, a lot adjacent to the church was purchased and a parsonage was built.

The log cabin was constructed by the Honor Knights during the ministry of Rev. Spicer, 1921. The Honor Knights were led by "Junior" Schweitzer and Walter Bergman. In 1924, two lots were purchased at Imperial and Orange Streets with the intention of rebuilding in this new location. This plan was abandoned after a few years and lots were sold.

Dr. Remfrey Hunt, former missionary to China, became minister in 1926. During his ministry, the exterior of the church buildings were redone. Following the five-years ministry of Dr. Hunt J. Wesley Runyan became minister. He

served during the worst depression years—1932-1934.

Stipp Becomes Minister
Frank V. Stipp became minister in August of 1934. His
wife, the former Myrtle Wilson, had worked with Paul
Wright in the 1914 meetings in
the Tabernacle. She later went
to the Philippine Islands where
she met and married Frank
Stipp

By now the Little Brown church was about 20 years old and had been condemned. A loan of \$4,000 was secured in 1935 from the State Board of Christian churches for the construction of the Stucco Sanctuary at an estimated cost of \$7,000. By the end of the year \$2,000 had been returned on the loan. The new sanctuary was dedicated on Feb. 16, 1936 with services, morning, afternoon, and evening. 



The purpose of the meeting will be to continue the process of terminating the visible ministry of Lark Ellen. Specifically, we will be considering the Board's recommendations on the distribution of Lark Ellen's assets.

HIGHLIGHTS OF FEBRUARY 19 MEETING

On Wednesday, February 19, sixteen Lark Ellen members met with Dr. Nance, Dr. John Wolfersberger (Regional Pastor), Rick Reisinger (Board of Church Extension) and Jim Johnson (President of the Christian Church Foundation).

In distributing church assets there are three options: (1 Cash which can be restricted or unrestricted, (2 Permanent Endowment for which members can designate who gets the money and what percentage they receive, and (3 Capital Fund which is an account which can be spent. Sometimes it has to be repaid, sometimes not.

It was emphasized that Lark Ellen wishes the property to remain a church. The resolution which members passed at the Congregational Meeting of February 9 was to deed the property to the Christian Church Foundation. They will actually sell the property. When it is time to list the property for sale, it will be advertised to other churches first.




CELEBRATE!

The Board approved moving the money from the Building Fund account to the checking account.

The final decision on the distribution will be voted on by the congregation.





BREA - Brea's first school bus driver has never allowed her faith to detour since she first set foot inside the Brea Christian Church in 1954.

"That first day I walked in and there were four of my coworkers," said Edna Makins, vice chairman of the renamed Lark Ellen Christian Church congregation. "I felt so at home. Now I'll be losing a lot of friends."

Charter member Inez Fanning offered quick consolation. "We'll all be friends forever, we're only tosing a personal network."

The women joined strustee chairman John Dyke Wednesday afternoon to organize Sunday's closing cleebration of the 78-yearold Brea church. The program, which includes a 10:30 worship service and noon buffet, will be attended by Jim Johnson, president of the Christian Church Foundation; Dr. John Wolfersberger, regional minister for Southern California Disciples of Christ Churches; the Rev. Kenneth Scovill, pastor of Fullerton First Christian Church; a Chapman University representative; and former Lark Ellen minister, the Rev. Leslie Lowrey.

Surrounded by worship materials, artifacts and picture albums that chronicled the church history, Fanning said the new demographics of megachurches made

it difficult for neighborhood congregations to survive.

"Basically, the new generation ust wants to sit and listen and not get involved," Makins said. We were always the participants. We got in there and got the job done."


Getting the job done meant serving up hundreds of chicken oie dinners, sewing items for mission projects and offering help to hose in need. It also meant gathering in the shade of pepper rees in downtown Brea where alling leaves and berries flavored summer picnic fare.

Holding small pie tins, Fanning explained many of the churchwomen butchered their own hickens in Brea back yards for he "fresh" pot pie dinners.
