Brea Plans Country Fair

BREA — The "good old Brea spirit" so often applauded by Brea officialdom will be in full swing this July 4 weekend as groups throughout the city join together at the Country Fair and Fireworks Spectacular.

"Community involvement is the Brea spirit," said Rex Wixted, a Country Fair steering committee member.

Wixted said the effort being made for the Country Fair by so many local groups — including the Lions, the Kiwanis, the Masons, the Soroptomists and the Brea Creative Arts Council — makes the spirit come alive.

The people involved in the fair at City Hall Park said they hope the two-day event will keep Breans at home for the holiday weekend.

Planned for Friday and Saturday are games, food booths and all-day entertainment with cakewalks, ice cream eating contests and a puppet show.

Food booths at the fair will offer cold watermelon, taquitos, soft drinks, cotton candy, popcorn and hot dogs. Also featured will be ongoing activities for children, including organized games, puppet shows, clowns, pony rides and game booths.

The Plunge will also be open from 2 to 4 p.m. both days.

As part of the old-fashioned fair-style atmosphere, a bazaar area will be used where arts and crafts will be sold by members of the Brea Art Association, the Forever Young Club, the Senior Optomists, and TOPS.

T.L.C. members will be selling homemade breads and other special baked goods.

The Brea Creative Arts Council will be sponsoring a Kids

Creative Corners where children can make wood sculptures, puppets, paper people and collages for 50 cents.

Saturday the Kiwanis will be sponsoring a pancake breakfast from 7:30 p.m. to noon. Included in the breakfast are scrambled eggs, sausage and milk, coffee or orange juice. The money will be

used to buy smoke detectors for the Breal, Inc. apartments.

A Lion's Barbecue dinner Friday will be held between 3 and 6 p.m. as a preview to the Fireworks Spectacular. The barbecued dinner will include beans, cole slaw, bread and drinks. The cost will be \$4 for adults and \$2.25 for senior citizens and children 12 or under.

The fireworks pre-show will begin at 8:30 p.m. Friday and will feature the All American Boys Chorus, the Society for the Preservation of Big Bands and a tug-a-war between the Brea City Council and the Miss Brea Contestants.

The fireworks display, with 700 shells expected to be exploded at the Brea - Olinda High School football stadium, starts at 9:15 p.m. The cost is \$3 per person and tickets can be bought at City Hall, Fire Stations No. 1, 2, and 4 and the Seven - Eleven Store on Puente Avenue and Imperial Highway.

The firemen's award-winning

chili, sandwiches and drinks will be on sale at the show, too. Tickets for the fireworks show will not be sold at the gate.

To provide ongoing entertainment during the fair, musical groups will be performing at the City Hall Park Gazebo. On stage for the first time will be Brea's Community Band directed by Norm Campbell, Tex Bradbury and his Mountain Boys and the Village Singers.

And just for fun, the Soroptomists will hold a beard growing contest on Saturday.

The sweepstakes winner in the contest that Judge Betty Elias and Councilwoman Norma Hicks will help officiate will be awarded a pair of Rams tickets for his handsome growth.

Sunday will slow down with only a pancake breakfast at the Masonic Lodge and a concert in the park planned.

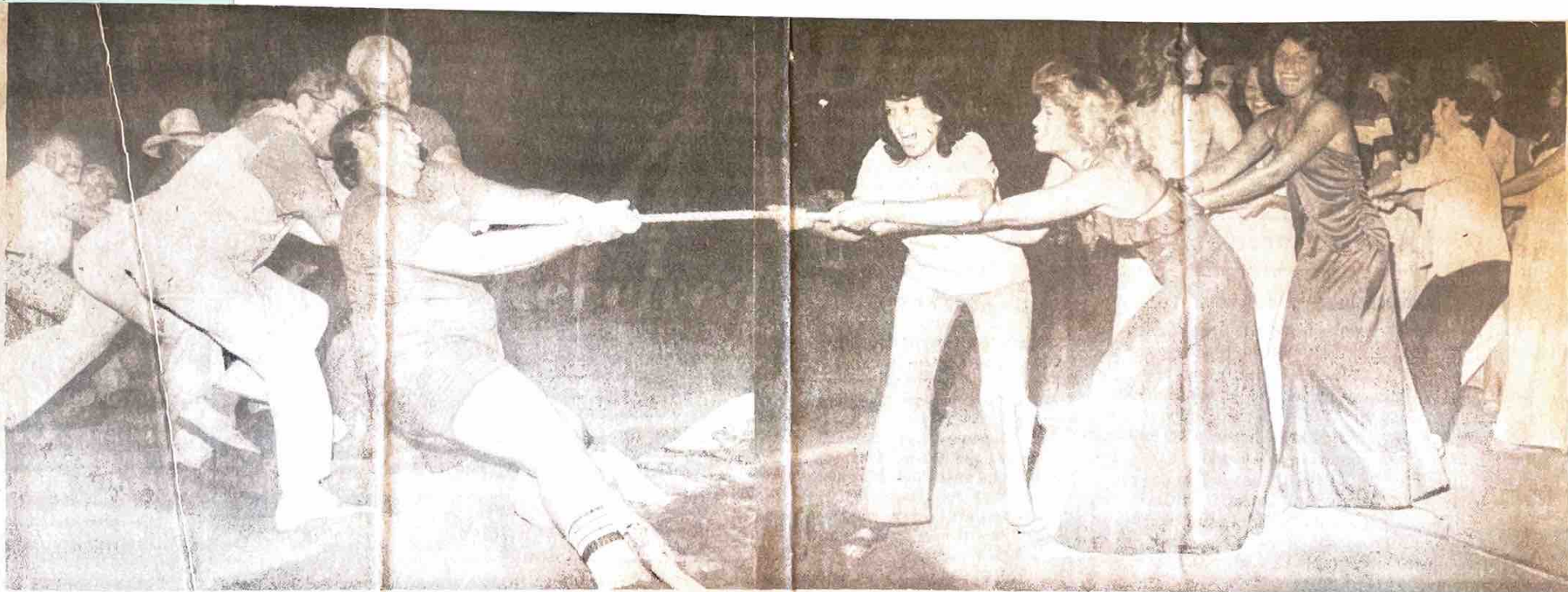
The breakfast is from 8 a.m. to noon. The concert will feature The Society for the Preservation of Big Bands

Fireworks For Brea

BREA — Pre - set fireworks, electronically timed to blast off in sync with family - oriented tunes, will be the main feature of the Seventh Annual Fireworks Show tonight that will also be the largest aerial show in California, according to co - fire chief Jerry McDowell.

The gates at the Brea - Olinda High School football field will open at 7 p.m. with the pre - show beginning at 8:30 p.m.

The pre - show will be highlighted with performances by the All - American Boys Chorus, the Society for the Preservation of Big Bands and a tug - a - war between the city council and

the Miss Brea contestants. Patty Martinez from KWIZ radio will emcee the events.

During the pre - show, six representatives from Brea's sister city, Lagos de Moreno in Mexico, will be recognized. Four Canadian consulates will also be honored for the help their government gave the United States in the Iranian crisis.

With the theme "The Year of the Family," the fireworks show, which is sponsored by the city and Brea's Firemen's Association, will begin at 9:15 p.m. More than 700 fireworks worth about \$11,000 are expected to be exploded in the skies of Brea tonight.

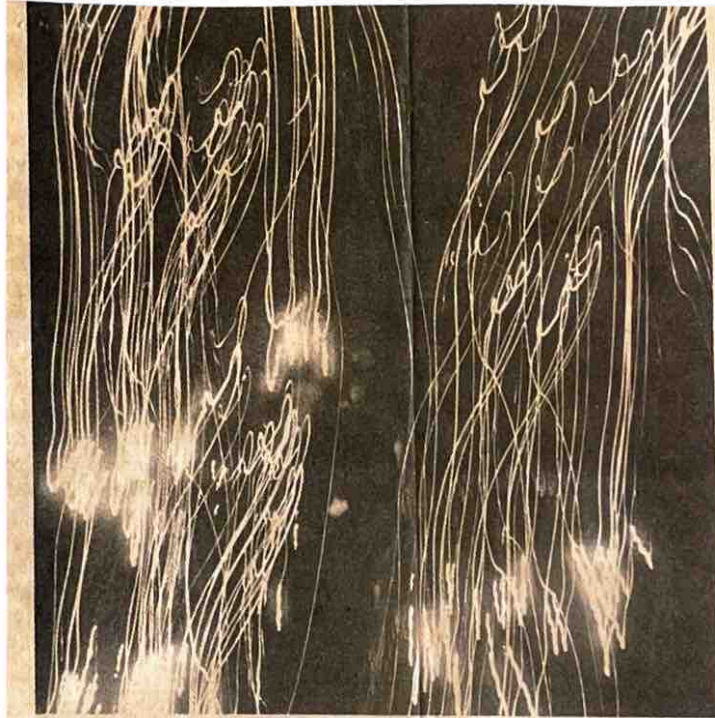
McDowell said 250 shells would be saved for

the patriotic grand finale. "That's more than our entire first show," he added with a smile.

The fireworks show will follow the Brea Country Fair at City Hall Park. The fair will continue Saturday with an opening pancake breakfast sponsored by the Kiwanis at 7:30 p.m. Activities will begin at 10 a.m. and run to 6 p.m.

Sunday will slow down a bit for the Country Fair devotees with a pancake breakfast from 8 a.m. to noon scheduled for the Masonic Lodge.

The breakfast will be followed by a leisurely concert in the park from 1 to 4 p.m. The Society for the Preservation of Big Bands will be performing.

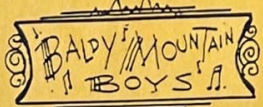
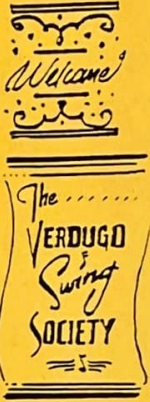
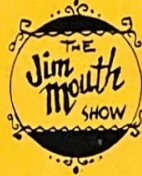

Country Fair heads for City Hall Park

BREA — Plans are moving forward for the annual Brea Country Fair on the Fourth of July with a wide range of activities scheduled for City Hall Park on Brea Boulevard.

Plans for the day include food and game booths, a boutique, kiddie parade, puppet shows, Beautiful Baby Contest, a free swimming at the Plunge, ongoing entertainment, contests, a bluegrass concert and barbecue.

The Brea Kiwanis Pancake Breakfast begins the day at 7 a.m. followed by a morning worship service presented by the Brea Ministerial Association.

Flag-raising ceremonies will be staged by the Brea Historical Society at 9:30 a.m. Brea Girl Scouts will also bury a time capsule during this part of the morning.

The Country Fair begins officially at 10 a.m. as food and game booths open.

The Baldy Mountain Boys will keep things hopping with their music, and registration will begin for the Beautiful Baby contest.

A Kiddie Parade, the Brea Senior Center Ding-A-Lings and a Pie Eating Contest round out the morning's events.

Scheduled for afternoon appearances are the Sweet Adelines, the Brea Line Dancers, Dance Spot Studio, the Sugar Foot Cloggers, aerobic dancing with Kathy Stradley and the Norm Hughes Trio.

Finally, a bluegrass concert featuring the Thunder Mountain Boys, the Trembling Trees Bluegrass Band and a Brea Lions Club Barbecue round out the day's events.

Missing sun brings no sunset of fun at Country Fair

The sun's refusal to shine was not going to keep Breans from having a ball at their big annual fair.

The 20th annual Brea Country Fair may have begun under gloomy skies, but the fun and excitement prevailed all day.

Taking a stroll down "food row" was a journey for the senses. The smell of teriyaki chicken and freshly roasted corn was so tantalizing, it was hard not to stop and beg for a sample.

One booth had fresh fruit: cups of icy grapes and melons in bite-sized pieces that were perfect for the little hands reaching out to take them. For other tastes, there was a bit of everything ranging from soft pretzels to pizza slices and "red hot" frankfurters.

Local groups including the Veterans Club and Rotary and Lions clubs all contributed delicious wares for reasonable prices.

Brea Kiwanis Club kicked off the morning's feasting by providing pancakes and crisp sausages.

Councilwoman Lynn Daucher was on hand to help serve, as was school board member Susie Sokol. At \$4 per plate, the pancake breakfast was one of the best deals available at the fair.

Getting away from the food area was not easy, but it was necessary if one wanted to see all the sights.

For the younger set, a petting zoo was open with lambs, hogs and a cow patiently standing by, waiting to be petted. Bigger kids could go on the pony rides or try some of the wilder activities, such as the Velcro wall.

The dunking tank, however, had to be the biggest hit of all. Mayor Pro Tem Bev Perry kept a great smile on her face as she was dunked time and time again.

School board president Ken Kegel tried to keep potential dunkers at bay with his water gun, but he eventually fell victim to the liquidy tank.

Young and old alike could have their faces painted or hair dyed in wacky, bright colors. For the agile of arm, there were darts, ring tosses and mock shooting galleries at which to try their skills.

Prizes were small and well-earned.

By far, one of the most popular events at the fair was the "Beautiful Baby Contest," with babies judged for their appeal, personality and overall "cuteness." In the contest sponsored by Brea Republican Women, Federated, winners were announced at noon by Mayor Marty Simonoff.

Each baby competed in one of three age categories. For ages zero to four months, winners were: Hanna Virginia Pavao, first place; Connor Leech, second place; and Tyler Thomas, third.

For ages five to eight months, winners included: Ariel Williams, first place; Nicholas Tezak, second; and Patricia Carson, third.

For nine months to one year,

Vanessa Peterson took first place, Dane Tips was second and Devon Homer took home third place.

The top three babies in each category received trophies and all of the approximately 75 little entrants could clutch at tiny certificates of appreciation. All onlookers agreed that Brea simply has a bumper crop of cute children.

Just beyond the baby-judging area was a mecca for shoppers.

Persons showing some foresight could get done a great deal of Christmas shopping, as bargains were offered for wares on display.

Jewelry was available at half retail cost, and handmade bean bags, hand-painted ceramics and an array of children's clothing were only some of the items on sale. Many displayers promised to be at the popular winter Nutcracker Boutique with expanded lists of their special crafts.

Nostalgia lovers were treated to a special display of cars at the fair's edge, with automo-

biles ranging from a 1920 Ford to a World War II-era Volkswagen bug lined neatly along the sidewalk. Children could have their pictures taken on a Brea police motorcycle, and each could receive a trading card containing facts about one of the officers.

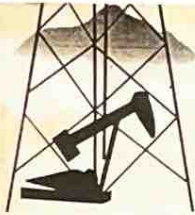
The Brea Fire Department had its antique "pumper" on display, gleaming and polished in the midmorning sunshine.

The fair wound down by 5 p.m., with tired but happy children clinging to parents' hands on the way back to their family cars. Red, white and blue balloons bobbed in the trees and some floated lazily into the sky above.

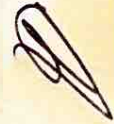
It had been a day of fun, excitement and for many, over-eating.

Schools ask county to sell bonds

After hearing a presentation on a plan to bring \$18,500,000 into district coffers, the Brea Olinda Unified School District board voted unanimously Tuesday to approve a resolution asking the Orange County Board of Supervisors to sell general obligation bonds.

"We're finished with the first phase," said Ernesto Flores, president of Caldwell, Flores and Winters, which presented the plan. "It's been a difficult process, with plenty of severe decisions. So many things have happened along the way; we are now entering the second phase, getting the money to the district."

Lynn Paquin, an associate of the firm who joined Flores for the presentation, said they are talking to two rating agencies and looking into credible bond insurance in order to make the bonds more attractive as well as securing lower interest rates.

"We anticipate the ratings to be in place by the end of August and the money should be in the bank by Sept. 29," Paquin said.

Before any of this happens,

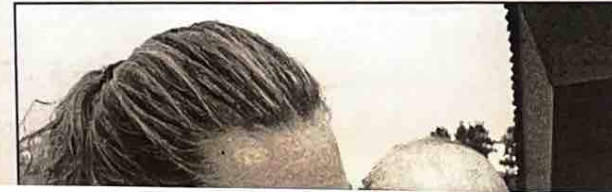

Brea group challenges men to grow beards

BREA — Men beware. It's grow a beard or go to jail.

Beardless men who dare to appear at the city's July 4 Country Fair at City Hall Park risk arrest and jail, members of Soroptimist International of Brea said.

Mimicking a contest held 50 years ago, Brea Soroptimists are challenging all men citywide to enter their beard-growing contest and become "Brothers of the Brush" — all in fun.

The contest is designed to get

more residents involved in the city's country fair July Fourth, one of many activities planned during the city's yearlong celebration commemorating its 75th anniversary, Soroptimist member Cathy Greene said.

It's also a way to introduce Soroptimist International to the community, she said.

In 1942, men who refused to grow beards for the contest were forced to wear balls and chains. But this year, men without beards will be permitted to buy "Heck, no, we won't grow!" badges for \$1 from

Soroptimist members. The men will be asked to wear the badges at the fair to promote the contest — and defend their right to shave.

"If not, they'll go to jail," Greene said.

The jail is a harmless-looking paddy wagon. Beardless and badgeless men run the risk of being rounded up by the Soroptimists on patrol. Bail is \$2, Greene said.

Contestants will be judged at the fair for prizes in various categories. Mustaches will be awarded for the longest, and most attractive. Winning beards could be the longest, bushiest, softest, grayest, scrawniest, and most attractive. Goatees are permitted to enter, to vie for the most attractive award.

Al Harri, a Brea Lions Club member, started growing his beard two weeks ago after the Soroptimist group approached Lions members at a meeting and urged them to join the contest, he said. The blond shadowlike beard is just now getting itchy.

"I'm going to look like a scruffy old man if it grows," said Harri, 60. "But I don't grow hair on top of my head anymore. Why should it grow on my chin?"

Konrad Bartlam, director of city planning, said he grew a beard once in a quiet revolt "protesting

life in general."

"It was scrawny," he said. "After six weeks, the director asked me if this was a way of saying I needed more money."

So he decided to try again. His goal is the scrawniest beard.

Bartlam persuaded 12 of the city development services department's 20 male employees to join him in the revolution.

"You don't want to look bad by yourself," he said.

But Jim Cutts, director of development services, won't be a part of the contest.

"My wife won't let me," Cutts said of his wife of 26 years, Diane. "It just so happens I like her."

Alan Lawson, an associate planner for the city, has been impressed with his beard so far.

"It's coming in scruffy and it's gray, but I think I'm starting to look very distinguished," said Lawson, 43, who has thinning brown hair.

"I sometimes shaved in the morning and in the night (in the same day)," he said. "I'll decide after July Fourth whether to trim it. But I'm doing this for the camaraderie and the male bonding."

1. Country Fair festivities begin at 7:00 a.m. with the Pancake Breakfast. Serving will continue through 10:30 a.m.
2. Only Brea-based, non-profit organizations and service clubs may have reserved space, food and game booths at the Fair.
3. **ALL BOOTHS MUST HAVE ADULT SUPERVISION DURING OPERATION AT ALL TIMES.** Experience has shown that adult participation is mandatory for a profitable operation.
4. No controversial pamphlets, fliers, buttons, posters or displays will be allowed. All participants must occupy assigned positions only!
5. The Country Fair Steering Committee reserves the right to close any booth that is not being conducted in conformance with the rules or is not being managed properly.
6. Neither the City of Brea nor the Country Fair Steering Committee will assume responsibility for any damage, theft or loss of personal property or damage, theft or loss of items offered for sale on the day of the Fair.
7. All entry fees are non-refundable after June 1. Checks should be made payable to Brea Country Fair and mailed to Community Services Department, Number One Civic Center Circle, Brea, CA 92621.
8. Participants are responsible for paying their own sales taxes.
9. Food and game booths must be set up and operating no later than 10:00 a.m. and are required to remain open until 4:30 p.m.. All food concessions must close at 4:30 p.m.
10. **IN KEEPING WITH THE FESTIVE JULY 4TH ATMOSPHERE, ALL BOOTHS MUST BE MINIMALLY DECORATED.**

There will be five winners of \$50 cash prizes each. Booths will be judged on the following: a) Originality b) Creativity c) Theme d) Quality e) Color Presentation.

PLEASE NOTE: Booths are to be decorated only by members of the sponsoring organizations. Additional information will be mailed to those contest participants after application deadline.

11. You have total control for the operation of your booth and are responsible for your own starting change, money aprons, and storage of money, all booth decorations and signs. **IF YOU WANT SHADE, IT IS SUGGESTED THAT YOU BRING YOUR OWN TARP TO USE AS A COVERING. YOU WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY DAMAGE THAT MAY OCCUR TO YOUR BOOTH. NOTHING CAN BE STAPLED OR NAILED TO THE BOOTHS. PLAN TO USE WIRE, STRING OR MASKING TAPE ONLY - NO DUCT TAPE IS ALLOWED.**
12. Food and game booth applications will be registered on a first come/first serve basis.
13. Each year your organization must re-apply for the items to be sold from your food or game booth. Both applicants will not necessarily be granted requests to sell food items which they have sold in the past. This policy is intended to allow all groups an equal opportunity to earn profits.
14. Groups operating food booths are responsible for keeping it clean and uncluttered at all times. You must observe all health regulations and clean up your operation before you leave.
15. In the event that your food booth is being sponsored by a commercial entity, you will be allowed to display one 8-1/2" X 11" sign showing the sponsor's name.
16. To avoid conflict with other participants, food booths may sell only items previously approved by the Steering Committee. Game booths may not sell or provide food or drink items.
17. Individual use of portable P.A. systems is prohibited.
18. Crafter's tables must be set up no later than 9:00 a.m. and are also required to remain open until 4:30 p.m. Early Pancake Breakfast customers tend to be early shoppers.
19. **Crafter's Corner**

Each crafter's space contains one table (or defined amount of space). If you use two tables or equivalent area, you must pay for two spaces or "tables." Handcrafted items must be approved regardless of whether you have participated previously. Participants in the Crafter's Corner must submit for review one representative sample of each item together with an inventory sheet of items to be sold during the Fair, regardless of whether you have participated previously. Only items that have been approved by the Country Fair Crafter's Corner Board may be sold. Dates of review drop off and pick up will be provided upon receipt of application to participate in the Crafter's Corner. If you cannot attend the appointed judging time, you will be responsible for getting approval or you will not be permitted to participate on July 4th. No food or beverage items may be sold at Crafter's Corner tables. One large tarp will be covering the entire Crafter's Corner area.
20. Additional space used at the end of your booth will result in additional charges.
21. Craft tables are not to be moved from the position and/or location in which you find them. **TABLES MUST REMAIN IN LENGTHWISE POSITION.**
