The service was performed after a 10-minute walk from the White House in which the high and mighty of the world walked with Mrs. Kennedy and with members of the Kennedy family.

At the White House, Mrs. Kennedy left her limousine and with Robert Kennedy at her side followed the procession on foot to the cathedral. The six white horses drawing the caisson set the pace for the trip from the Capitol.

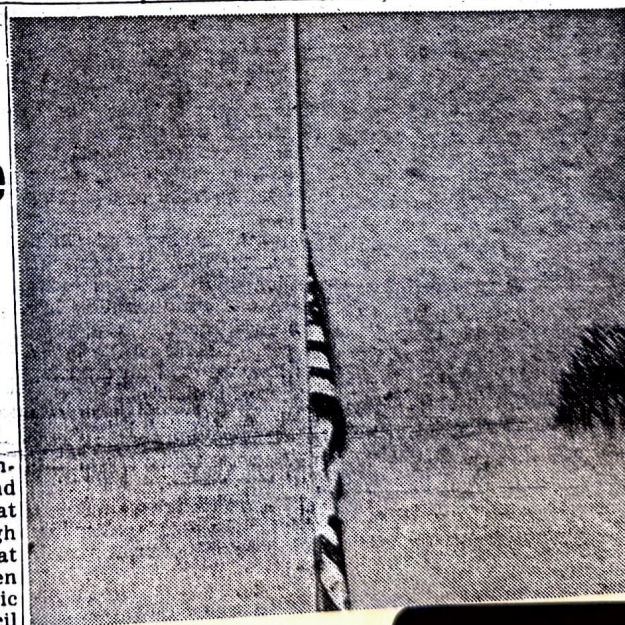
In the five-day forecast no rain is expected, but a cooling trend is anticipated again by Wednesday or Thursday.

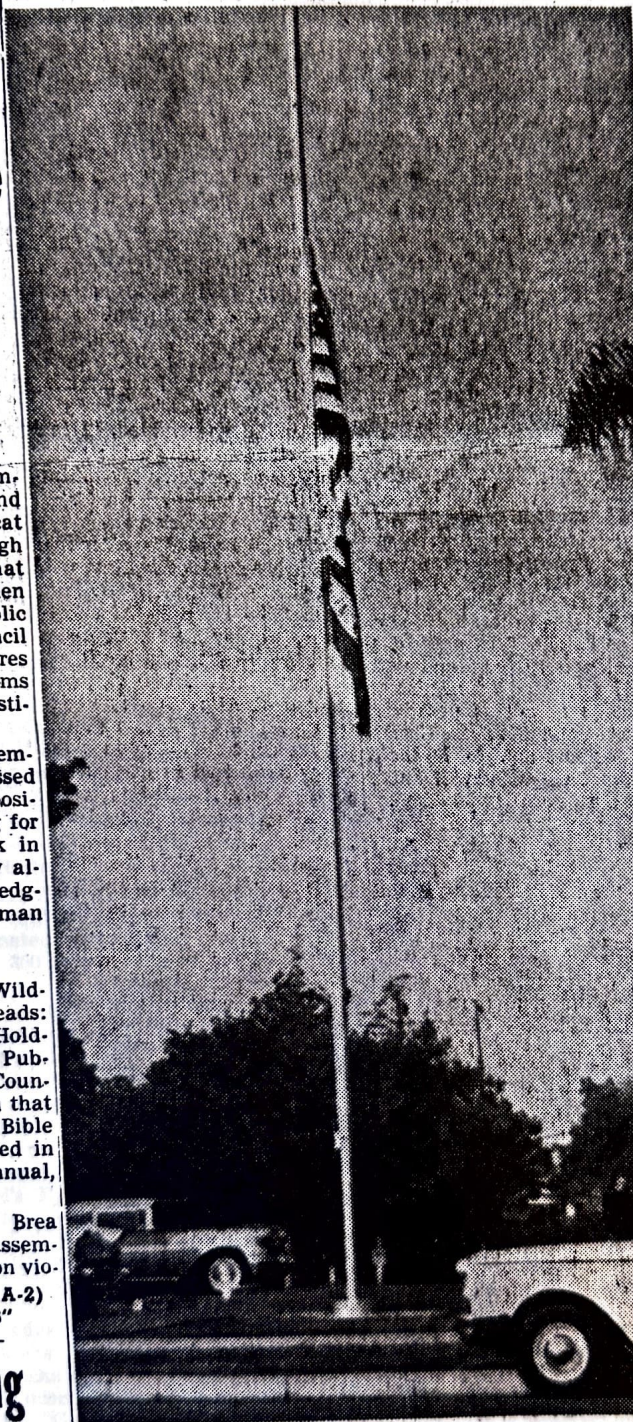

Slaying Shocks Brea

Postoffice, Schools Of City Close Flags At Half Staff 30 Days

Brea today joined the nation in a last tribute to John F. Kennedy, who was laid to rest in Arlington National Cemetery among heroes and statesmen.

Gov. Edmund Brown has proclaimed this a legal holiday in California and Brea, with other cities, has shut down much of its activity. The high school and the elementary schools are closed. The postoffice has suspended services and the banks are not doing business.

Meetings Rescheduled

A joint memorial service for the late President was held in Brea Christian Church at 11:00 a.m. under the auspices of the Brea Ministerial Association.

The Brea-Olinda Union High School District trustees meeting scheduled for tonight has been put off until Wednesday. The city council had adjourned last week to meet tonight for consideration of the Heritage Construction's bid for a change in zoning to permit a "blue collar" condominium development in the industrial zone, but the meeting is being delayed until Tuesday at 6 p.m.

Many retail stores closed this morning for the funeral of the late President, but there was interruption in utilities services.

Flags at Half Staff

Quickly, when the news of the President's death came Friday, City Administrator A. W. Studebaker ordered the flag at the City Hall lowered to half staff and a similar order was given by Postmaster Leonard DeGroff for the lowering of the stars and stripes. (Please Turn To Page A-2)
