## SCOTT DIES FROM INJURIES

The funeral services for Adrian Scott, who died Monday at the California Hospital in Los Angeles, from injuries sustained when he was caught in the cog wheels of the machinery at the Birch Refinery, were held Thursday from the McAuley chapel in Fullerton. Large numbers of fellow workmen, friends and neighbors attended the funeral.

The interment was held at Loma Vista.

The accident which cost Mr. Scott his life occurred Wednesday morning, June 5th, and at first it was thought that he was only injured in the arm, but later the belief grew that he was hurt internally.

There is a wife and two small children left to mourn his loss.

## Wedin Unveils Plan at Board

City Manager Wayne Wedin unveiled plans for a proposed Brea Cultural Center in a presentation before the Brea-Olinda School Board last Wednesday night.

The center would be located on Birch St. in the open area directly south of Brea-Olinda High School. Complete floor layouts and an artist's conception of the three story structure were displayed by Wedin.

The plans showed a library, a museum and art gallery, and an auditorium to be included in the center. The building, with 35,000 square feet of floor space would consist of two wings connected by a lobby.

In the smaller of the wings, the museum and art gallery would feature displays from local organizations as well as traveling exhibits. Located in the same wing would be the 100 seat auditorium with facilities for viewing television, movies, filmstrips,

and small theater productions. The larger of the two wings would be occupied by the library. Planners are also considering the building of a radio station on the third floor of the lobby section.

The location of the center would be one of its major benefits, since it would be adjacent to both the high school and the planned Brea Regional Shopping Center. An enclosed overpass crossing Birch Street is planned, connecting the center with the main building of the high school.

Although the cost of the cultural center is still undetermined, the project will not raise local taxes. Funds will be provided by investments from Homart, Inc. a subsidiary of Sears & Roebuck, who set aside the four acre lot for a cultural center to accompany the Regional Shopping Center.

Wedin concluded his presentation by stating that the center could be completed by the spring of

1976 if all goes as planned.

School Board response to the proposal was favorable. Superintendent Dr. Paul Bolie said that the concept of a cultural center was a first rate idea which would benefit both the community and the high school. The board then unanimously agreed to adopt a formal working relationship with the city and the Homart redevelopment project.

In other business, the board approved a four hundred dollar federal grant to provide a special educational program for the district's eight American Indian students, and approved the recommendations of the Citizen's Advisory Committee on Drug Abuse Education, which were presented at an earlier meeting.

It was also announced that Wilma Sauer, teacher in Brea Jr. High School's Educationally Handicapped program was awarded a certificate of merit for her work in special education.

## MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES SEPT. 18th, '18.

Regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the City of Brea was called to order by the President, Jay C. Sexton, in the chair on the above date in the City Hall.

Roll call was answered by Trustees Mitchell, Schweitzer, Craig and Sexton. Absent Trustee Huddleston.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Under the head of written communications was a letter from the Southern California Safe Co. quoting prices on fire-proof safes. Discussion followed on same and it being decided that a heavy safe in the up-stairs of City Hall would be a cumbersome article to move in case of fire and that if it were not moved it would be collapsible and charred remains would be the result; also that when the new City Hall is built a vault will be installed which will be absolutely fire and theft-proof.

Motion was made by Trustee Mitchell, seconded by Trustee Schweitzer that communication from Southern California Safe Co. be filed. Carried and so ordered.

Clerk was instructed to reply to communication from Southern Cal. Safe Co., informing them that the City of Brea is not in the market for the purchase of a safe.

City Attorney presented a communication from the U. S. Highway Council offering its suggestions for improvements on public roads and rural engineering. Same communication was filed with City Clerk in City Hall for inspection of Board of Trustees at any time.

Ordinance No. 29 entitled--"An ordinance fixing and levying the property the property tax on all property within the corporate limits of the City of Brea for the fiscal year 1918-19" was given its second reading and vote was had by ayes and noes and all present voted by ayes and Ordinance was passed.

Ordinance No. 30 entitled--"An Ordinance changing and re-establishing the official curb grade on So. Walnut Ave. from the So. property line of West Birch St. to the North property line of West Cedar St. in the City of Brea" was introduced and given its first reading.

Trustee Craig was heard on the matter of water standing on Deodara St. opposite property of v. B. Scott. Clerk was instructed to write the Union Oil Co., who are owners of the private road, or Deodara St., and inform them of the condition existing and ask for a remedy of same as the water standing in hollow place becomes stagnant and that the lowering of the pipe from Lot 1 in Blk. C across road, be accomplished, in order to carry away surplus water.

Discussion was held relative to the conveyance to the County by deed, that strip of road belonging to the City of Brea running north from Deodara St. to Central Ave. and along the eastern boundary line of Section 11, providing the Union Oil Co. also deed a like strip adjoining said roadway to county. Clerk was instructed to write Adam Underwood of Union Oil Co., and Wm. Schumaker, County Supervisor, regarding the City's favorable attitude toward such conveyance of road.

The matter of disposition of all tin cans and rubbish was taken up and it was deemed wise by the Council to hire a truckman to haul away all rubbish twice a month, dates being perhaps the 1st and 15th of the month, for collection of same.

Trustee Schweitzer was heard in the matter of enlarging the platform of the fire engine and after a discussion on same it was decided that the work be done.
