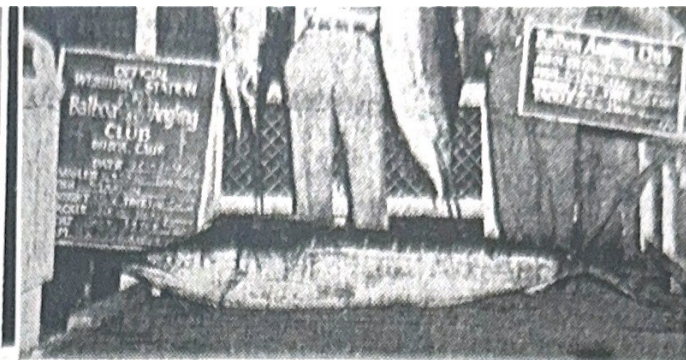

Elan Busy With Christmas Candles In New Location on No. Madrona

The Christmas rush is in full swing this week at Brea's Elan Candle Company, operating now in new headquarters at 272 No. Madrona, after buying the former Boy Scout building and moving it to the present location.

Miss Edith Myers and Miss Ann Griesel recently bought the building and moved it from property a short distance away on the west side of North Madrona, where a homes subdivision is under way.

Having a home to call their own ends a long period of uncertain tenure in rented quarters for the candle firm. The owners took time out on Wednesday to show how the work is done in the new place, and to comment that they are pleased with the change, which gives them a more compact arrangement of their wax-heating units, the long tables which hold the candle molds,

and the various other departments that go to make up a specialty candle factory.

In addition to their holiday business, Elan is preparing now for a Los Angeles gift show in January. And, strange as it seems, they are getting ready their next year's Christmas items for that show. Orders are placed by the buyers early in the year, and deliveries being made this November are to fill orders which were placed 9 months or more ago.

Elan is now producing 13 different varieties or sizes of candles, most of them perfumed, and all of their own design. The biggest of them is the Empire, standing about 2 feet tall and weighing 8 pounds. It's a dripless candle, and is solid wax, except for the wick in the middle. Its estimated burning time is 400 hours.

If you should go into Clyde's Drive-In, you'll see an Empire candle presented them on their cafe's first anniversary recently and with many more hours' burning yet to go. Some friends of Miss Griesel's who own a gift shop in San Bernardino lighted an Empire candle in their shop four weeks ago, and have burned it 6 hours a day since.

Elan has many visitors at the shop, but Miss Myers said Wednesday that they have to turn prospective buyers away. Their local representative is Brea Hardware, and they manufacture only, at their shop location. They do distribute candles throughout the entire country, but their heaviest business at present is coming from orders in this area.

The company also has plans for extending its production to include gift novelties of other kinds. Some

England's Condition Is Forum Subject

CECIL QUANTON TALKS AT WOMAN'S CLUB

Cecil Eden Quanton, graduate of Cambridge university, was the federal forum speaker last night at the Brea Woman's club house, the sixth of a series that began over two months ago. He chose for his theme "Post-War England," and discussed his subject from the standpoint of England's social outlook and psychology. Between thirty and forty were in attendance at the lecture.

Mr. Quanton pointed out also the effect of the World war on England's industry, commerce and finance, employment problems, the close relations with the League of Nations, and her wide spread gambling.

A native of England and educated in British schools, Mr. Quanton was enabled to observe at first hand his native country's efforts to adjust herself to post-war conditions.

Now a citizen of the United States, he is a member of the faculty of the University of Washington, a post he has held for the past ten years. During the summers, he has made frequent trips abroad and is widely conversant with the problems of European countries.

The federal forum speaker on November 5, next Thursday evening, will be Dr. John Brown Mason, professor of history and government at the Colorado Woman's college. His subject will be the "Spanish Revolution."

Scouts To Have Own Home Soon

LEGIONNAIRES ARRANGE TO PLACE BUILDING

Brea Boy Scouts are to have a home of their own again. The building, which the Scouts used formerly, is to be moved right away by the district school board from the Brea grammar school campus, to a Union Oil company site, just back of Dr. C. Glenn Curtis' office on North Pomona avenue. When placed there the building will face east, with ample playground in front. Howard Robinson has just received permission in writing from his company, granting the right for the building's location.

The Scout building matter came before the American Legion meeting, Tuesday evening, and was discussed at length. The building, formerly used as a home, was loaned to the school board for use during the recent construction period at the school on condition that the board would then place the building on a site, selected for the purpose. The Brea Scouts, with Lester Slaughter as Scoutmaster, are sponsored by the Legion and the Lions club.

The Legionnaires, present at the meeting, voted also to have the Boy Scouts place again in the Armistice day parade on November 11 at Santa Ana, where the official observance of the day will be held this year. The Scouts won first place in their division in the official parade last year at Anaheim.

The Legion voted to co-operate with the Junior Chamber of Commerce in celebrating Brea's birthday as a chartered city on February 23 next. Commander George Gesme named Roy Nelson as the Legion's representative to work with the Junior Chamber committee, with authority to call upon any other Legionnaire needed.

Scout house plans noted

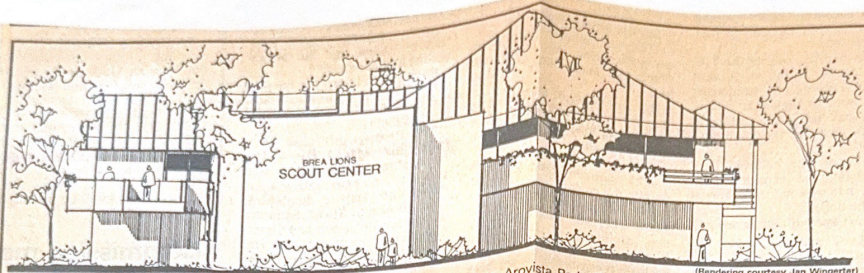

BREA — Of the former one-room Scout house in Arovista Park only a flat patch remains.

With plans in the works for a newer, more contemporary meeting place, the old structure, once a school house for children of Unocal oil workers, was recently demolished.

As the Scout home aged, many people became concerned with

the safety of the building, and orders were given to tear it down. So, one autumn afternoon last year a not-so-gentle push by a bulldozer sent the building folding upon itself like a house of straw.

But like a phoenix arising from the tangled pile of wood, the Brea Lions' club, city of Brea Parks and Recreation Department, along with over 1,200 Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts in the city, are working to resurrect the much-needed facility.

The Scouts and Lions are trying to raise money to fund the \$800,000-\$900,000 project designed by Don Schweitzer, a Dana Point architect who is volunteering his services on behalf of the Scouts.

Schweitzer, the son of long-time Brea residents Frank and Ruth Schweitzer, presented a "beginning" conception of a two-story scout house to members of the Brea Parks and Recreation Commission at a meeting Wednesday. Under Schweitzer's vision, the new Scout home will have a counseling and conference room, storage areas for camping gear, a kitchenette, and a 3,000 square-foot, glass-encased assembly room that overlooks a renovated Arovista Park.

The Scout house would even offer a concession area on its first floor, serving patrons of a proposed amphitheater, according to Schweitzer.

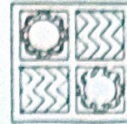
Parks and Recreation Committee Chairman Bob Munro called the plans "better than what I first envisioned."

"Anyone would be proud to have a function in there," said Leo Sutton of the Brea Lions' Club.

Sutton said the Lions have begun the process of establishing fund-raising for much of the money needed to bring Schweitzer's plan to reality.

Old City Hall New Home for Brea Scouts

The city of Brea and the Brea Lions Scout Center Foundation have agreed to transform the historic Old City Hall into a Scout Center for Brea Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts.

Presently, the building, located at City Hall Park on Brea Blvd. houses the Brea Historical Society's offices and display. The Historical Society, however, is pleased to turn over the building to the Scouts, who will preserve this State Historic Landmark for generations to come.

Brea's former city hall was opened in 1928 and served as the city's legislative center until completion of the city's new civic center in 1980.

The building, listed on the National Register of Historic Places, needs major renovations and retrofitting to meet California's earthquake standards and handicap accessibility codes.

The Scout Center foundation is launching an ambitious fund-raising campaign to finance their portion of the retrofit, which is the strengthening of the building. When the Foundation has raised \$200,000.00 towards this effort, the City will match the funds to complete the phase one repairs.

The renovations will not affect the exterior of this lovely old building! Once the retrofit is completed, the building will be safe for limited Scout use.

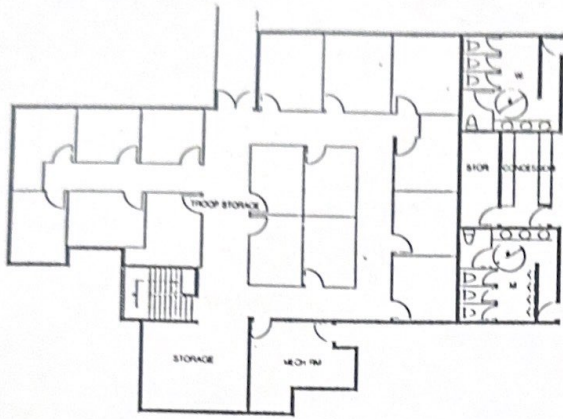

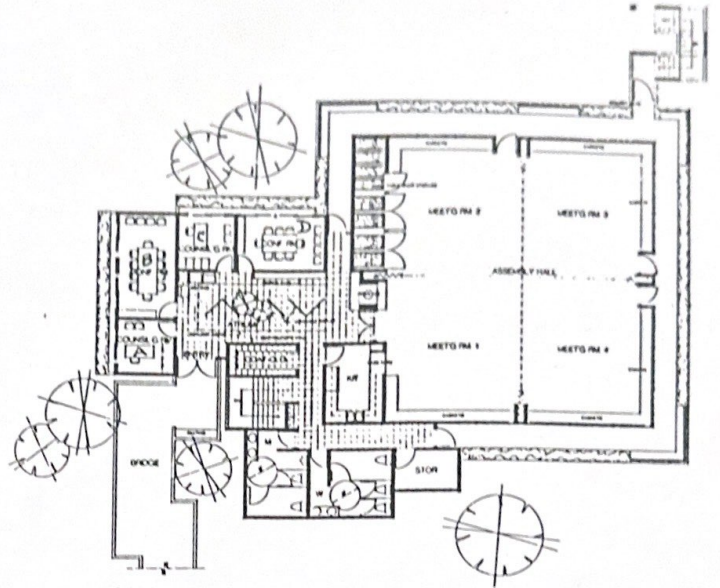

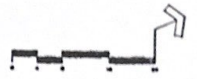


FIRST FLOOR PLAN



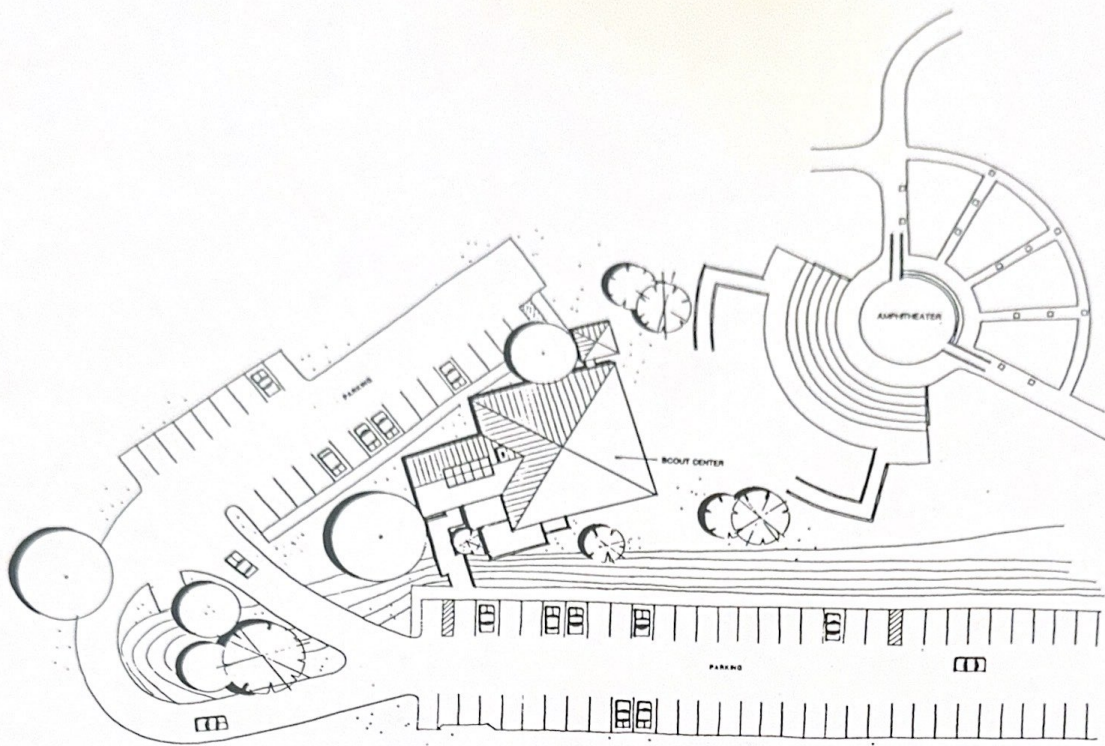
SECOND FLOOR PLAN

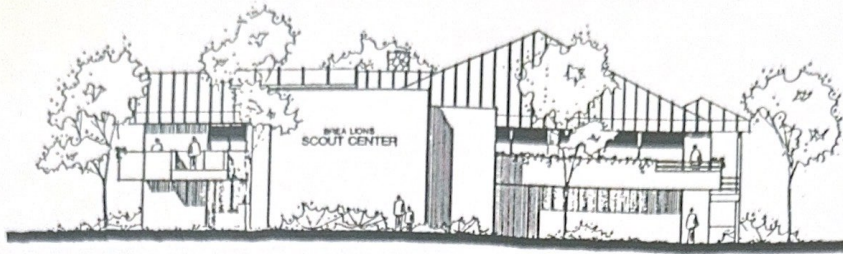

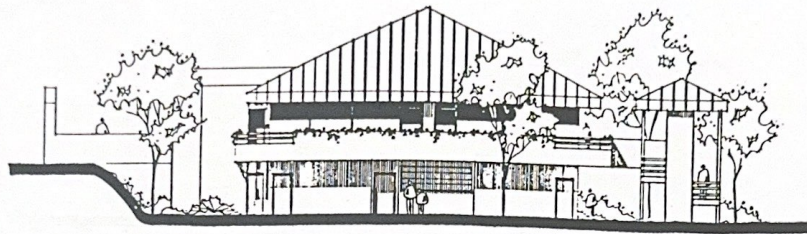
