

1,036 IS CENSUS OF BREA

Brea is on the map, and is known by the government census bureau as a city of 1,036 people, according to announcement made yesterday. This is not satisfactory to the citizens of Brea, who know well that Brea is entitled to a larger number, and was recently rated in an Orange county directory as a city of 1491 people, including the Stearns lease.

However, when the last government census was taken in 1910, Brea was a barley field, and now is the leading industrial city of Orange county, and it is only through the lack of houses that the census this year shows less than 3000 people.

Probably no other like district can show figures to equal those of Orange county with every city and every part showing an increase.

Growth of 1036

According to the census reports, Brea has increased in population 1036 in the last 10 years, and this is actually true. When the 1910 census was taken the site of the present thriving and busy city of Brea was a barley field, with a few oil derricks up in the canyon.

The census figures, of course, show only those people actually residing within the corporate limits of the city, and some who are to all practical purposes residents of the city are left out for that reason. It is the opinion of best informed citizens, however, that that even with this allowance the city should have a somewhat higher rating. The growth as shown is by no means to be despised, and will be accepted cheerfully.

In Other Cities

The census bureau at the same time announced the population of four other Orange county cities. Fullerton now has a population of 4415, a gain of 2690 since 1910, or 155.9 per cent. This is the largest percentage of gain shown by any city in the county. Huntington Beach has 1687, a gain of 106.6 per cent; Orange, 4884, a gain of 67.2; Newport Beach, 898, a gain of 101.8.

SPECIAL CENSUS OF BREA, CALIFORNIA SEPTEMBER 22, 1952

The total population of the city of Brea, Orange County, California, on September 22, 1952, was 3,942, according to the final results of a special census announced today by the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce. There were 3,940 white persons (1,934 males and 2,006 females) and 2 nonwhite male persons. The total figure represents an increase of 734, or 22.9 percent, over the 3,208 inhabitants on April 1, 1950.

The total persons living in occupied dwelling units (which excludes persons living in such places as institutions, rooming houses, and transient hotels) was 3,924. The number of occupied dwelling units in Brea on September 22, 1952, was 1,348, with an average of 2.91 persons per occupied dwelling unit.

The special census was taken at the request and expense of the city of Brea.
