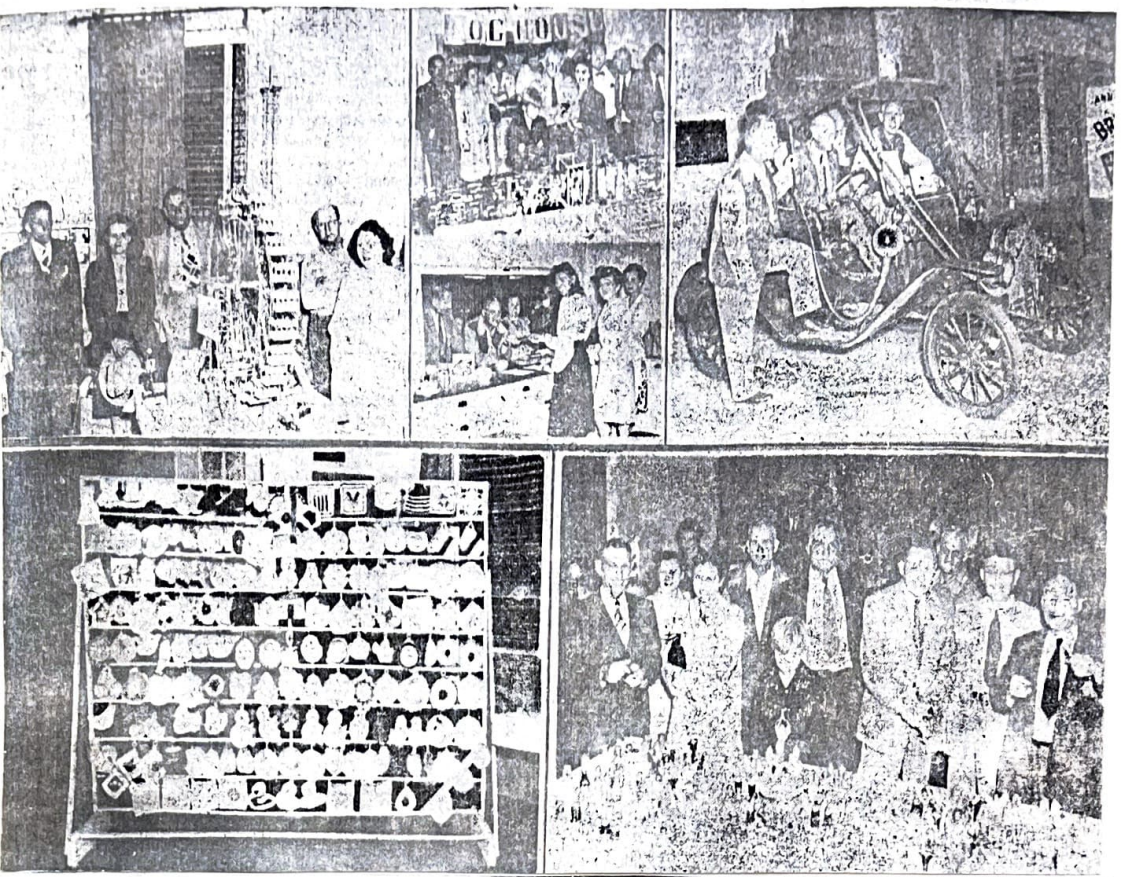


Exhibitors, Guests at Brea's Biggest Hobby Show



Pictured above are some of the prize-winning exhibits, the hobbyists, and spectators at Brea's Seventh Annual Hobby Show. The picture top left shows some of the intricate models, made entirely of toothpicks glued together, shown by F. C. Harris of Anaheim. His hobby won the grand sweepstakes prize of the show. C. Knowlton, and Frank Hopkins look over the ancient two-cylinder gasoline buggy, one of the very first to have a transmission and differential. Part of Mrs. H. F. Moore's huge collection of crocheted pot lifters is shown at left above. She won second prize. At right of it a group is shown before the table filled with salt and pepper shakers, representing a small part of J. W. Stives' collection, which won third prize. Stives is at left. At the right are Chrest Lazaro; and Rev. H. R. Carstens, and B. H. Sidnam of Laguna. The two latter judged the Show, with Russ Caldwell, secretary of the Orange Chamber of Commerce. Young Jimmy Aldritch is in the center, with Tom Slayton standing behind him. In the top picture of the two at left, Sam Burgess is shown before his first-prize-winning collection of mustache cups and saucers. The cups were shown on stands this year, for the first time, and prompted a great many admiring comments constantly through the Show. With Burgess is Mrs. Lena Zimmerman, Mrs. Burgess' sister, visiting here from North Carolina. Mrs. H. Powers of Brea won fourth prize for her fine exhibit of oil paintings. Charles Stewart of Fullerton received a special award for his unique exhibit of fluorescent rocks, shown in the darkened lounge room of the Woman's Clubhouse. In the lower picture, a group admires the hundreds of razors collected and shown by S. C. Knowlton of Fullerton. Left to right are Knowlton, Bob Goodman, an unidentified woman, Mrs. Zimmerman, Mrs. Sam Burgess, and Joan Clem. The 1947 Show was generally agreed to be the finest Brea has ever had; 502 persons signed a guest register, an estimated one-fourth of those attending.

New Frozen Food Locker to Open About April 20

The adobe building at 241 North Pomona which is the scene of considerable activity these days is being converted to a frozen food locker rental establishment, and the owners of the new firm, "Brea Frozen Food Lockers," expect to be open for business by about the 20th of this month.

Two Colorado men, a stockman and an engineer, Raymond D. Newton and Otis R. Johnson, are fitting out one of the most modern frozen food plants in the county. Mr. Newton explained that the new firm is in the business of renting lockers of different sizes to the people of Brea to deep freeze—or any other kind of freeze—their own food. There are facilities for butchering one's own cattle and three types of freeze rooms.

The deep freeze section is maintained at 20 degrees below zero, the freeze section at zero degrees and the chill room, at two degrees above freezing. Fruits, vegetables and meats are customarily placed in the 20 degree below zero temperature for a sharp freezing which holds in all the original flavors and at the same time breaks down the tissue of meats to tenderize it. The food is then stored in the zero temperature lockers.

The Newtons live at 203 South Poplar in town and the Johnsons are from Bellflower.

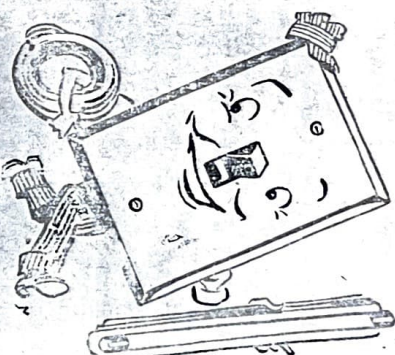

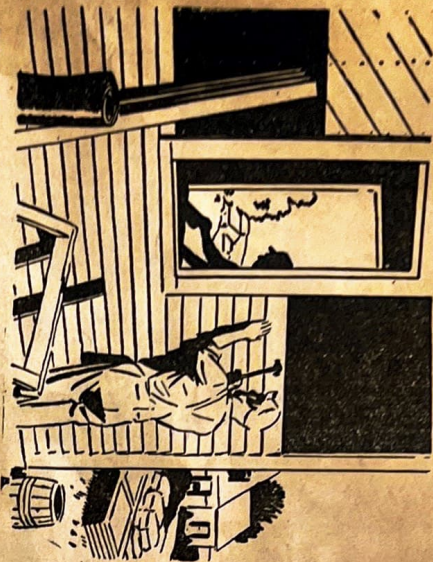

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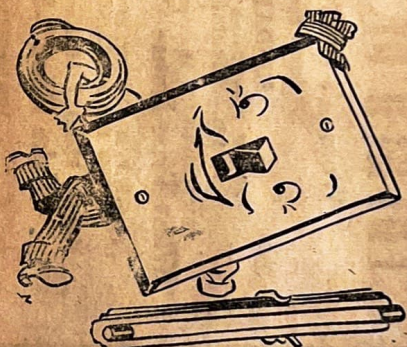

In addition to the market, Hansen has purchased the home of Mr. and Mrs. Art White Jr., at 400 East Imperial highway.

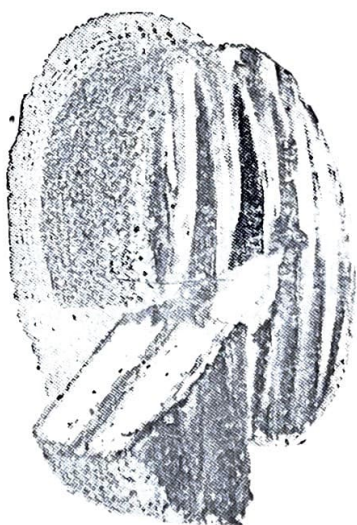
Hansen, who recently was honorably discharged from the army, has been looking for a nice set up for a store of his own. Brea is it.
