

DR. CURTIS THEATRE

The exhibit honoring Dr. Curtis, in the lobby of the theatre named for him, has been completed. Responsibility for this work lies with Kathie Conrey and others on the City staff who put it together, and a lot of work by Dean Millen, gathering artifacts. Residual monies from the oral history project were spent.

The exhibit consists of a large glass wall case, to the left as you enter the lobby. Go through the archway over which hangs Dr. Curtis'

portrait.

There are several interesting enlarged photos, and among the memorabilia are Doc's camera, and various medicines and surgical instruments.

AIRCRAFT

It has been said that Brea is the place where the first low-winged aircraft was built. In 1925 Fred Thaheld and Bill Tremaine designed and built one, and it being so small, called it the "Humming Bird". It was powered by a small Henderson motorcycle engine. On an exhibition flight over the airport, on the east side of Brea, with many people in attendance, the plane crashed because of the overconfidence of the pilot in banking the plane, which caused the wings to fold up.

This did not stop development of the low-wing design. Another larger one was built, but powered with a newly designed 50cylinder 250 h.p. engine. They called it "The Spirit of John Rogers", and entered it in the Dole Race to the Hawaiian Islands On the takeoff from San Diego, during adverse weather, the plane crashed

and killed the pilot.

Further experiments in the diesel engines proved successful, and in 1927 Thaheld went to Texas, where S.H. Guiberson Co. made and installed this radial type engine into government M-3 tanks. The first engine is on display at the Smithsonian Institute in Washington.

Returning to Brea in 1945, Fred Thaheld joined with Shaffer Tool Works to convert the engine into diesel-powered wind machines for orchard protection from freezing

weather.



Building Our Commonwealth

If you've ever felt as though your city's activities or projects were remote or beyond your influence, you'll be happy to know that your city has itself felt the need for more citizen involvement. In fact, beginning this month, Brea embarks on an ambitious two-year project that aims to create a commonwealth-like atmosphere between residents and city government.

With so many far-reaching Council decisions being made on behalf of the City, the City Council resolved, at a Council retreat about a year ago, to seek for some method of enlisting more comprehensive input from the citizens of Brea. When they discovered that the cities of Modesto and Palm Springs had been participating in a similar program, they enlisted the help of David Jones of Sentient Systems, Inc. to provide the framework for the Brea program.

Dubbed "The Brea Project... Building Our Commonwealth," it will call on all residents to participate in advising the City on what the citizens themselves identify as issues.

The first step in this program is the formation of a steering committee to be selected by the City Council from residents recommended by members of the community.

This committee will then call on other residents to suggest

This committee will then call on other residents to suggest solutions to areas of particular concern, such as education, traffic, environmental quality, cultural opportunities, and the like.

According to Mayor Norma Arias-Hicks, "These will not be simply Blue Ribbon Committees that discuss a problem; we expect these committees to work toward solutions." Mayor ProTem Gene Leyton concurs, "The Brea Project will give the community an opportunity to act rather than react to problems."

Who was "Doc" Curtis?

Country Doctor" at a time when this was a village of oil workers and citrus farmers. He is warmly remembered as the physician who brought many Brean's into the world, as the busy doctor who always had time to make each person feel like they were his only patient, as the humanitarian who brought medical care to the jungles of Equador for 2 years, as the practical joker and as the patron of the arts.

Several years ago the Brea Historical Society, spearheaded by

Dean Millen, approached the City to honor Brea's country doctor by naming the theatre in his memory and that facility acflicated the Glen Curtis Performing Arts Theatre. Recently the Historical Society and the City collaborated with funding from the Brea Foundation to design, construct and install a display case in the Theatre about Doc Curtis. The specially crafted white oak case contains photographs, medical artifacts, his medical school diploma, his now antique camera and a scrapbook commemorating his life. It gives Brea's more recent residents a chance to know Doc Curtis and his contributions to "Good Ole Brea."

This display documents local history and the life of a fascinating man; but more than anything else it's a tribute to friendship. Dr. Curtis' impact was such that thirty years after his death, his friends still feel compelled to share his memory with the entire community. Enjoy this display next time you visit the Theatre.

THE BREA FOUNDATION APPLICATION FOR FUNDS

HISTORICAL DISPLAY FOR CURTIS THEATRE

 Describe the history, purpose, and experience of the organization/agency seeking funding. (Who are you?)

The purpose of the Brea Historical Society is to collect and preserve Brea's historical memorabilia and heritage. We would like to honor the memory of Dr. Curtis through a display case in the Curtis Theatre. This historical project is led by Dean Millen, who spearheaded the theatre naming efforts. Mr. Millen has lived in Brea for 48 years and is a founding and active member of the Brea Historical Society. He was also the driving force in the Brea Community History Project and Exhibit.

2. Describe the organization/agency experience and qualifications for implementing the project. (Why can you do it?)

In 1980, a request that the theatre be named in memory of Dr. Curtis was successfully presented to the Cultural Arts Comission and then, in turn, to the City Council. Through Dean Millen, the Brea Historical Society has compiled an extensive collection of photographs, newspaper articles, letters and memorabilia for a comprehensive scrapbook which documents the life of Doc Curtis. These, plus additional items, such as his medical diploma and graduation picture, have been secured for use in the proposed display.

 Based upon the proposal request, describe the need for the proposed program/project, what you intend to provide and the number of persons that will benefit. (What do you want to do?)

Brea has grown tremendously and many current residents and theatre guests are not familiar with Doc Curtis and the wonderful legacy he left. A display in the lobby will compliment his portrait, while describing his life and contribution. (See attached capsule biography.)

4. Describe the tasks necessary to implement the proposal, including time frames, coordination with other groups, and staff responsibilities. (What will you do if funded, when will you do it and who will do what?)

The project will be implemented through the teamwork of Dean Millen and City staff, which would include a Project Coordinator and the Graphic Illustrator. The necessary tasks include:

A. Select items and photographs for the display.

- B. Design display.
- C. Receive bids for fabrication and installation.
- D. Select fabricator(s).
- E. Prepare narratives for the display.
- F. Supervise installation.
- G. Arrange display.
- H. Plan and conduct unveiling.

It is estimated that the design, fabrication and installation would take three months.

 Describe the target population that will benefit, including age, sex, income, ethnicity and special needs that the proposal will address if funded. (Who and how many will benefit?)

The target population for this project is everyone visiting the theatre. It will be valuable to children and to new residents who are just learning about their City's history.

6. List any other goals or projects that are pertinent to this proposal or related to the project. (Why do you want to do it?)

The display will be attractive and interesting. It will give theatre goers an enjoyable display to peruse before the show and during intermission.

 Describe how you have assessed the effectiveness and efficiency of the program and how you will evaluate the project upon completion. (How will you know if you are successful?)

The display will be evaluated through comments from theatre goers and those in attendance at the unveiling.

 Describe who in the community knows and supports you, who assists you now, who do you work with now and who will work with you if the program/project is funded.

This project is supported by the Brea Lion's Club, the Brea Woman's Club and the Cultural Arts Commission.

9. How will Brea benefit from the program/project?

The Doc Curtis display will help students and residents appreciate the community's history and recognize the value of a true humanitarian to the quality of life.

10. Identify the Agency/Organization's various funding sources during the past year.

\$1,200 was raised to cover the cost of naming the Curtis Theatre (portrait, bronze plaque and reception). There is not, however, an ongoing or carry-over budget for this project. The City will provide staff support to complete the project, if funded.

DR. GLEN CURTIS A LIFE DEDICATED TO HUMANITY

Dr. Glen Curtis practiced medicine in Brea for over 30 years and it was a very comforting feeling to know that if you needed help, Doc Curtis was there. He was a medical doctor of the old school with a general practice that included surgery, internal and external medicine, hospital calls, office visits, home calls and even sidewalk consultations.

There is little doubt in the minds of those who knew Dr. Curtis that his devotion to this community was real. Whether rich or poor, each patient was a sick person needing help to Dr. Curtis. Many bills for his services were marked "Paid in Full" when patients were unable to meet their obligation. He was truly generous with his time and talent.

Doc Curtis not only looked after the health of the residents of Brea, he also traveled to Equador on vacation and ended up spending two years caring for the sick and teaching health care in a very primitive part of the country.

Glen Curtis was a leader in many civic and professional organizations and served as president of the Orange County Medical Association. His love of the arts was evident in his charter membership and patronage of the Los Angeles Music Center. He was an avid coin collector and the co-founder of the Orange County Coin Club.

Doc Curtis was proud to be know as "Brea's Country Doctor" and thoroughly enjoyed this role. He had a strong sense of fun and a quick sense of humor which often resulted in practical jokes.

Doc Curtis is warmly remembered by those who knew him and Brea's Theatre is fondly named in his memory.



Who was "Doc" Curtis?

oc Curtis was known as "Brea's Country Doctor" at a time when this was a village of oil workers and citrus farmers. He is warmly remembered as the physician who brought many Brean's into the world, as the busy doctor who always had time to make each person feel like they were his only patient, as the humanitarian who brought medical care to the jungles of Equador for 2 years, as the practical joker and as the patron of the arts.

Several years ago the Brea Historical Society, spearheaded by



f you've ever felt as though your city's activities or projects were remote or beyond your influence, you'll be happy to know that your city has itself felt the need for more citizen involvement. In fact, beginning this month, Brea embarks on an ambitious two-year project that aims to create a commonwealth-like atmosphere between residents and city

government.

With so many far-reaching Council decisions being made on behalf of the City, the City Council resolved, at a Council retreat about a year ago, to seek for some method of enlisting more comprehensive input from the citizens of Brea. When they discovered that the cities of Modesto and Palm Springs had been participating in a similar program, they enlisted the help of David Jones of Sentient Systems, Inc. to provide the framework for the Brea program.

Dubbed "The Brea Project... Building Our Commonwealth," it will call on all residents to participate in advising the City on what the citizens themselves identify as issues.

The first step in this program is the formation of a steering committee to be selected by the City Council from residents recommended by members of the community.

This committee will then call on other residents to suggest solutions to areas of particular concern, such as education, traffic, environmental quality, cultural opportunities, and the like.

According to Mayor Norma Arias-Hicks, "These will not be simply Blue Ribbon Committees that discuss a problem; we expect these committees to work toward solutions." Mayor Pro-Tem Gene Leyton concurs, "The Brea Project will give the community an opportunity to act rather than react to problems."





Who was "Doc" Curtis?

Occ Curtis was known as "Brea's Country Doctor" at a time when this was a village of oil workers and citrus farmers. He is warmly remembered as the physician who brought many Brean's into the world, as the busy doctor who always had time to make each person feel like they were his only patient, as the humanitarian who brought medical care to the jungles of Equador for 2 years, as the practical joker and as the patron of the arts.

Several years ago the Brea Historical Society, spearheaded by

Dean Millen, approached the City to honor Brea's country doctor by naming the theatre in his memory and that facility was officially dedicated the Glen Curtis Performing Arts Theatre. Recently the Historical Society and the City collaborated with funding from the Brea Foundation to design, construct and install a display case in the Theatre about Doc Curtis. The specially crafted white oak case contains photographs, medical artifacts, his medical school diploma, his now antique camera and a scrapbook commemorating his life. It gives Brea's more recent residents a chance to know Doc Curtis and his contributions to "Good Ole Brea."

This display documents local history and the life of a fascinating man; but more than anything else it's a tribute to friendship. Dr. Curtis' impact was such that thirty years after his death, his friends still feel compelled to share his memory with the entire community. Enjoy this display next time you visit the Theatre.

"At Christmas time he would send a card to people that owed him something saying 'Paid in full'."

"He said he would never turn down a call, because if they were sick enough to need a doctor, they were sick enough to have one. So he always went when he was called."

Lois Auer (Director of Santa Ana Community Players):

"Dr.Curtis was Brea. He was one of the most caring persons I've ever known, and his love for people was like a giant umbrella over the town."

News Tribune Article -

He was known as the modern physician with the old-fashioned billing methods as a result of his practice of "forgetting" to send bills.

Senator Thomas H. Kuchel:

"Glenn Curtis was the epitone of a devoted country doctor."

"Glenn Curtis lives on in the fond and respectful memory of those who knew him as a fellow citizen who gave unstintingly of himself for people's needs."

"Glenn Curtis was more than the trustworthy Brea doctor and confidant. He wanted to improve the quality of life of people, whether they lived across the street, in the next town, or halfway around the world. On one occasion, his sense of service took him to Ecuador where he helped in the elimination of a nationwide epidemic of bubonic plague, by use of his professional skills, and by his successfully prodding our government to speed up the shipment of serum to that poor country. He had learned how, as a private citizen, to make government do a better job for the people."

Sharon Dean, School Board Trustee (delivered by Doctor Curtis):

"He will be remembered by all who he delivered as a man always in a hurry but with plenty of time to stop and listen when one of his patients had a problem."

Sister Jane Francis, President of St. Jude Hospital:

"If he had a fault, it was being too generous, for his very wiry physical stamina many times was challenged beyond human endurance."

Julie Ann Thomson (Lois Smith's neice, living in New Zealand) resident of Brea when?

"It's a good and very right thing to remember someone who very simply did his job in life by caring and loving others as he did himself."

Dr. Gerald Mitchell, friend since 1912:

"He was a natural born doctor and even in prep school was called 'Doc'."

Elsie Bergman (Doc Curtis' nurse, employee and friend):

"I remember him as being so impulsively generous to everyone with a delightful sense of humor."

J. Howard Robinson (Manager of Union Oil Pipeline):

The Chief of Police scolded Doc many times for leaving his keys in the car. On one particular morning Doc stopped for coffee, parking his car next to the Chief's car. Doc noticed the keys were in the police car – he slide out of his car and quietly slid into the Chief's car, hoping to park it on one of the side streets. What Doc didn't know was that the ignition switch had been relocated under the cowl and the keys that Doc saw operated the siren. Doc was a long time living this one down."

After spending several hours on the Loma Linda University campus Friday, January 17th, I was encouraged in my quest for information regarding Dr. C. Glenn Curtis, a 1924 graduate. A group of friends who knew Dr. Curtis were successful in naming the theatre in the Brea Cultural Civic Center the "Dr. C. Glenn Curtis Theatre for the Performing Arts", and on August 4, 1882 a dedication ceremony was held. Some 150 persons attended this event including the Director of St. Jude Hospital Fullerton, Sister Jane Francis, - a former United States Senator, Mr. Thomas Kuchel, and many others who knew and loved Dr. Curtis.

After his death November 15, 1959, Dr. Curtis' coin collection was given to the University and a trust fund was set up for Mrs. Bernice Curtis for her health care. Mrs. Curtis passed away December 25, 1980.

Our local Historical Society is searching for any professional degrees, honors or mementos that could be displayed in the Curtis Theatre foyer to inform people of this important person for whom the Theatre was named.

I would like to pursue the thought that Mr. Walter McPherson, also in the class of 1924, might have a diploma that could be loaned in order that a duplicate diploma for Dr. Curtis could be produced.

I am enclosing copies of articles and clippings related to Dr. Curtis that might be of interest to you. I will greatly appreciate any help you can give me on this matter.

Building Our Commonwealth

f you've ever felt as though your city's activities or projects were remote or beyond your influence, you'll be happy to know that your city has itself felt the need for more citizen involvement. In fact, beginning this month, Brea embarks on an ambitious two-year project that aims to create a commonwealth-like atmosphere between residents and city government.

With so many far-reaching Council decisions being made on behalf of the City, the City Council resolved, at a Council retreat about a year ago, to seek for some method of enlisting more comprehensive input from the citizens of Brea. When they discovered that the cities of Modesto and Palm Springs had been participating in a similar program, they enlisted the help of David Jones of Sentient Systems, Inc. to provide the framework for the Brea program.

Dubbed "The Brea Project...Building Our Commonwealth," it will call on all residents to participate in advising the City on what the citizens themselves identify as issues.

The first step in this program is the formation of a steering committee to be selected by the City Council from residents recommended by members of the community.

This committee will then call on other residents to suggest solutions to areas of particular concern, such as education, traffic, environmental quality, cultural opportunities, and the like.

According to Mayor Norma Arias-Hicks, "These will not be simply Blue Ribbon Committees that discuss a problem; we expect these committees to work toward solutions." Mayor Pro-Tem Gene Leyton concurs, "The Brea Project will give the community an opportunity to act rather than react to problems."

Who was "Doc" Curtis?

Country Doctor' at a time when this was a village of oil workers and citrus farmers. He is warmly remembered as the physician who brought many Brean's into the world, as the busy doctor who always had time to make each person feel like they were his only patient, as the humanitarian who brought medical care to the jungles of Equador for 2 years, as the practical joker and as the patron of the arts.

Several years ago the Brea Historical Society, spearheaded by

Dean Millen, approached the City to honor Brea's country doctor by naming the theatre in his memory and that facility was officially dedicated the Glen Curtis Performing Arts Theatre. Recently the Historical Society and the City collaborated with funding from the Brea Foundation to design, construct and install a display case in the Theatre about Doc Curtis. The specially crafted white oak case contains photographs, medical artifacts, his medical school diploma, his now antique camera and a scrapbook commemorating his life. It gives Brea's more recent residents a chance to know Doc Curtis and his contributions to "Good Ole Brea."

This display documents local history and the life of a fascinating man; but more than anything else it's a tribute to friendship. Dr. Curtis' impact was such that thirty years after his death, his friends still feel compelled to share his memory with the entire community. Enjoy this display next time you visit the Theatre
