Officials said the fire damaged a carpet. The home is owned by Don Barber.

Death Toll Hits 36 In Grinding Train Crash

MUNICH, West Germany (AP) — A police spokesman today reported 36 persons killed and 88 injured in the head-on

collision of two passenger trains in the Alpine foothills south of Munich.

It was West Germany's worst train wreck in four years.

Earlier today the police said the toll had risen to 42 dead. But later a spokesman said this incorrect report was due to confusion over the number of persons who had died in hospitals.

So far, no Americans were among the identified victims.

"The cars piled up on each other, and the locomotives were telescoped," a police spokesman said. "It's a terrible scene that recalls the wreckage after World War II bombings."

The two commuter trains were filled with passengers returning from weekend outings. They slammed into each other about 6:45 p.m. Sunday on a single-track stretch of the Munich-Bad Tuelz line 30 miles from Munich between the vil-

lages of Wargau and Schafflach.

A detachment of U.S. Army Special Forces troops, the Green Berets, is stationed at Bad Tuelz.

No immediate information on the identities of the dead and wounded was available.

The collision occurred several hundred yards south of the Wargau station. A police spokesman said the southbound train failed to stop at a siding at Wargau to let the northbound train go by. The northbound train was carrying a special that runs on Sundays and holidays while the southbound train runs every day.

Federal Transport Minister Kurt Gscheide went to Wargau early today to take charge of the investigation. The wreck was also being investigated by the Bavarian state police and the state prosecutor, who was

studying the recordings of the radio traffic with the trains.

The collision occurred on a curve adjacent to a forest section which apparently prevented each engineer from seeing the other train in time to brake the trains. But a spokesman said the determination of what happened would be difficult because one engineer was killed and the other one was missing and believed dead.

The two locomotives smashed into each other at full speed.

"The cars piled up over each other," said a police spokesman. "Many persons were trapped inside, injured or dead."

"I could hear cries for help from people trapped in the wreckage," said a villager.

It was one of the most beautiful days in months, and the highways were jammed with holidaygoers returning from the mountains. As a result, ambulances were delayed by traffic, and 10 helicopters took most of the injured to Munich.

Rejuvenated Brea Plunge Opens June 14

BREA — Participants in the city's summer aquatics program will be able to enjoy a newly renovated Municipal Plunge for which \$65,000 has been spent on a new filter system, heating system and other upgrading.

The pool will be officially opened in ceremonies June 14, 1 p.m. at the Plunge in City Hall Park.

Hours for recreation swim, which starts immediately after the opening ceremonies, are: Monday through Friday, 1:30-3:30 p.m.; Saturday and Sunday, 1-3 p.m. and 4-6 p.m.; Tuesday and Thursday, night swimming 7-9 p.m.

Fees for recreational swimming are 25 cents per session for pre-high school children and 50 cents per session for high school children and adults. Afternoon lessons will be offered by the community services department's trained aquatics staff at both the Plunge and at the Brea-Olinda High School pool. Lessons will include Parent and Me classes, poliwog, beginner, advanced beginner, intermediate and springboard diving for children. In addition, pre Jr.-Sr. Lifesaving Conditioning, adult beginner

classes and adult workouts are also offered.

The first session of classes will be held June 23-July 4; second session, July 7-18; third session, July 21-Aug. 1; fourth session, Aug. 4-15; fifth session, Aug. 18-29, junior and senior lifesaving only.

Registration for the first session only will be taken at the preregistration periods June 16, 9 a.m.-noon and 7-9 p.m., Brea residents, and June 17-18, 9 a.m.-noon, open registration. For the second, third, fourth and fifth sessions, persons should register in person at the Plunge, 1:30-4 p.m. after June 23. Cost of lessons is \$5 per session for children and adults.

In addition to the recreational swimming and lessons, the Plunge is reserved for the use of certain special groups from 12:15-1 p.m. as follows: Monday, Brea Psychiatric Hospital; Tuesdays, handicapped children; Wednesdays, senior citizens; Thursdays, handicapped adults; Fridays, notice given to meet for children 12 and under.

Over 100 hours of free swimming will also be available this summer.

Senate Panel Continues CIA Assassination Plots

WASHINGTON (AP) — With President Ford expected to make public the Rockefeller Commission report on the CIA, the Senate intelligence committee continues its investigation of alleged CIA assassination plots.

White House Press Secretary Ron Nessen said during the weekend he assumed the President would make public the Rockefeller report dealing with allegations of domestic spying by the CIA. Sources said the announcement could come at a Ford news conference scheduled for 7:30 p.m. EDT this evening.

The Senate committee, chaired by Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, was meeting later today to question Robert Maheu, a former aide to billionaire Howard Hughes, and Richard Bissell, former head of the CIA's clandestine operations or "dirty tricks" department. Meanwhile, there were these developments:

—Rep. Lucien Nedzi, D-Mich., said he will not resign as chairman of the special House committee investigating

the CIA and other intelligence-gathering agencies. Today acknowledged the CIA had given him information about "some sort of assassination" because he also is chairman of the standing committee that is responsible for overseeing the agency's activities.

—Atty. Gen. Edward H. Levi said Sunday the Justice Department would examine the Rockefeller report, if it is turned over to the department, and would "determine whether a criminal prosecution in the federal courts would lie" for any actions described in the study.

Levi, speaking on ABC's "Issues and Answers," also said a president does not have the constitutional power to order assassinations.

Maheu is the first witness to appear before the Senate committee under a subpoena. Church has promised to examine evidence of assassination plots against Cuban Premier Fidel Castro and other foreign leaders before moving on to other areas in his probe of the entire U.S. intelligence community.

For the moment, the 11-member panel appears to be focusing on what former CIA Director John A. McCone has described as the agency's principal effort to kill Castro in 1963 and 1961.

Several former agency officials, including Bissell, have acknowledged the existence of a Castro assassination plan involving underworld figures Sam Giancana and John Roselli, but sources disagree over whether any attempt was ever made on Castro's life.

'Fragile Mind' Film Slated At Neuro Center

BREA — "The Fragile Mind", a film which discusses mental health and illness will be presented at 7:30 p.m. June 19 at Brea Hospital Neuro-psychiatric Center, 875 N. Brea Blvd.

The 33 minute color film was produced with the assistance of the National Association for Mental Health. Narrated by Joanne Woodward, the film looks at mental illness from a humanistic point of view, showing real people in their homes, on the job and in therapy.

Symptoms which may be indicative of mental health problems are described and ways in which loved ones can help the mentally ill are offered.

Following the film Linda J. Bookin, director of Problem Talk Shop, a free counseling and referral center in Orange, will lead a discussion about various mental health issues.

The report said as of the first week of June, 102,314 of the 131,000 refugees under American control remained in camps to be processed and resettled. The pace of resettlement improved slightly that week and refugees began moving out of the camps at the rate of 600 to 650 a day. However, it still would take a minimum of six months to clear the camps if the processing continued at that rate, the report said.

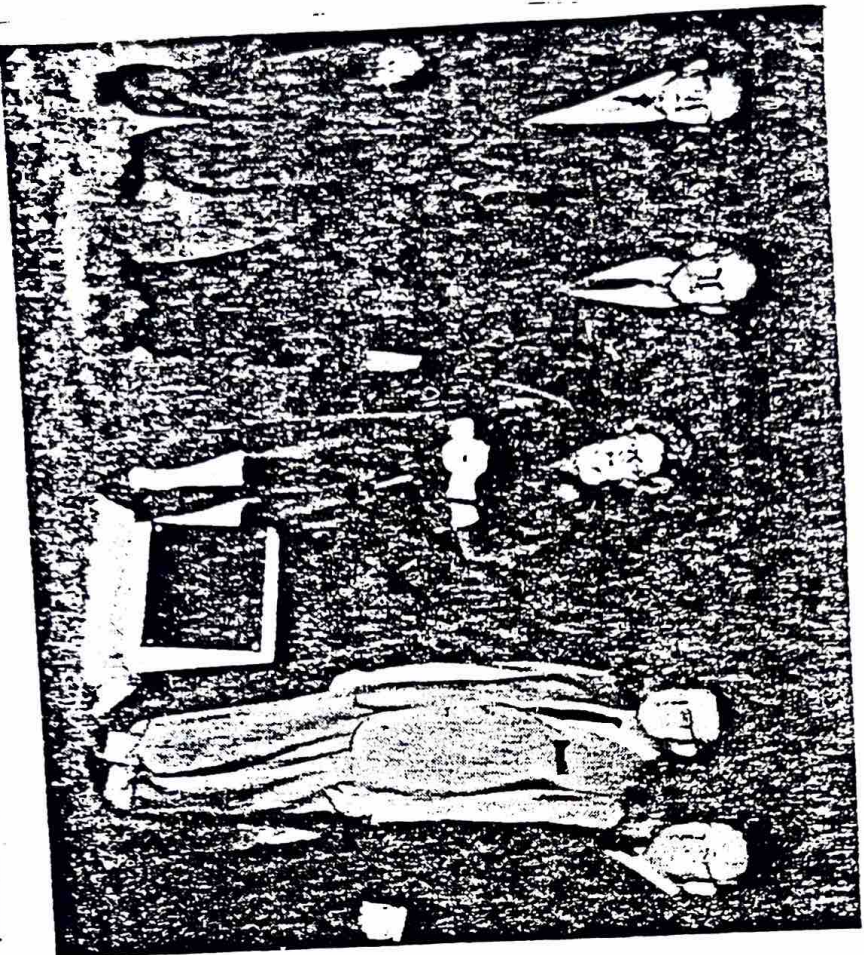

BELOVED MEDIC

Breaans Pay Tribute To Dr. Glenn Curtis

BREA — Dedication of a plaque and tree at the Brea Golf Course in honor of the late Dr. Glenn Curtis, "Brea's beloved country doctor," was held last night with Kiwanis Club members officiating.

Dr. Curtis, who referred to himself as a "country doctor," began his practice in Brea in 1927 and was still an active practitioner until shortly before his death in 1959.

O. T. Douglas, president of the Brea Kiwanis Club was the master of ceremonies and Vincent Jaster, a Lion's Club member gave a short eulogy of Dr. Curtis. Mrs. Catherine Curtis

attended the ceremonies with a group of the late doctor's close friends.

OFFICIAL FINDS:

Problems in U.S., West Reich Similar

By RAY MAST

It's almost 10,000 miles from Southern California to West Germany, but once you get here you might as well be back home. The Germans have their own problems, and many of them are the same as in the United States.

During the two years he's been stationed in Bonn as a foreign service officer, John H. Christensen, son of Col. and Mrs. Nels F. Christensen, 3500 West Ave., had time to form some personal and nonpolitical opinions about West Germany.

Christensen said that to listen to the West Germans talk of their problems is actually humorous, because the problems they believe to be unique and terrible are the same problems believed by many Americans to be unique to the U.S.

TOO MANY CARS

He said the Germans feel there are too many automobiles on their highways and the traffic problems are overbearing. Too, for many different reasons, students are quitting school and a juvenile delinquency problem has developed.

"There are many similarities in our cultures, though," Christensen said. "We have similar interests, although they may be more interested in art and classical music. Also, the family unit is generally stronger and the man is head of the family."

Christensen said another interesting thing is that Germans are more class conscious than Americans. He said if a man has one degree he is addressed as "Dr." If he has two degrees he is addressed "Dr. Dr."

On the whole, he said, the Germans are friendly toward the U.S. He said they often say they dislike certain aspects of America, but almost always indicate they like Americans. He said, for instance, Germans believe Americans may be too materially oriented.

Christensen said the Germans are very understanding about the integration problem in the U.S. and realize Americans are attempting to do something to solve the problem.

PROSPERITY WIDESPREAD

Although the West German economy may be slowing after a boom, Christensen said,

When the Germans decide to take a vacation in the summer, they simply close down their shops or factories for a month.

"It's difficult to get used to," Christensen said. "German shops are not customer-oriented and the customer isn't always right. They close when they want to. They feel if you don't want what they have to offer there are 10 others who do."

Although Germany has a dense population, Christensen said, the country is heavily forested. There is a heavy fine if a tree is illegally cut.

Christensen, who spent six months in each of the four sections of the embassy in Bonn, will be stationed in Curacao, a small island post about 35 miles off the north coast of Venezuela. After learning his job from the bottom up in Bonn, he said, he wants to do what he set out to do when he joined the State Department: Be useful to the U.S.

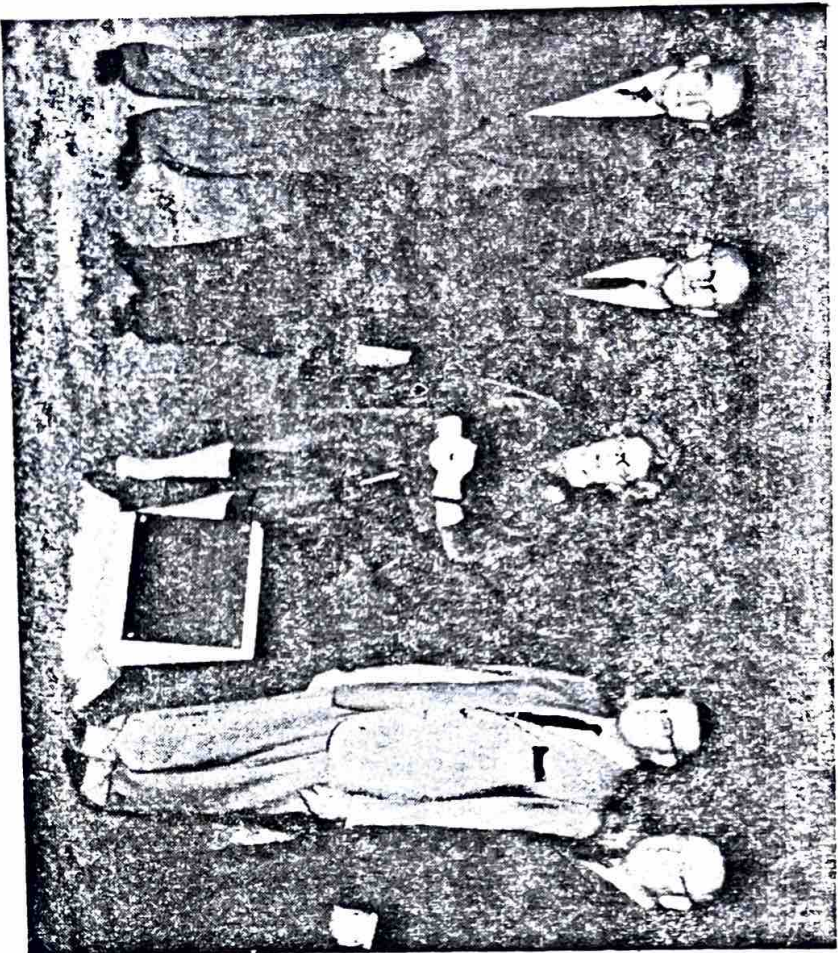
