# Time travel: Brea opens 25-year-old capsule

**BREA** — Suspense mounted as Don Fretwell struggled to open the large metal box.

The sides of the 25-year-old box had begun to deteriorate. Some bolts had grown weak, others were stubborn.

Fretwell, an employee in the city's maintenance department, had helped bury the time capsule

at the city's 50th birthday party in 1967.

On Sunday afternoon, he used a crowbar to reveal its contents to about 300 Brea residents and city officials who gathered at City Hall Park.

The capsule held a bonnet, newspaper clippings, and countless photographs — each with its own historical tale and meaning to the 1967 community leaders who included them in collection.

A plastic ball and chain were the most humorous of the remnants. They were a torture device used to punish Brea's male residents who cut their beards or shaved during a yearlong beard growing contest.

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The time-capsule opening was the second event in a yearlong celebration to commemorate Brea's 75th birthday.

More than 1,000 people attended the first event, a Saturday evening party at the Brea Mall. Residents wore costumes from their favorite decade in the city's past and demonstrations of dances popular in the 1920s, '30s and '40s were held throughout the evening.

On Sunday, nine historical bus tours of the city were held after the time-capsule opening. About 160 people took the bus tours through downtown Brea and Toner and Brea canyons. The tour featured a residential area near Lambert Road that was once a baseball field and the site of a 1924 baseball game in which Babe Ruth played.

Community volunteers were stationed along the tour route to explain the history of the Brea Canyon oil fields and pumping stations.

Not many residents have taken

such tours of the hills and most learned about the city's oil-drilling past for the first time, said Gill Reardon, who narrated a bus tour.

The city's first oil well, near the Chancellor Canfield Midway Oil Co. office, is still pumping oil and nearly 185 of the city's original 343 oil wells are still producing, Reardon said.

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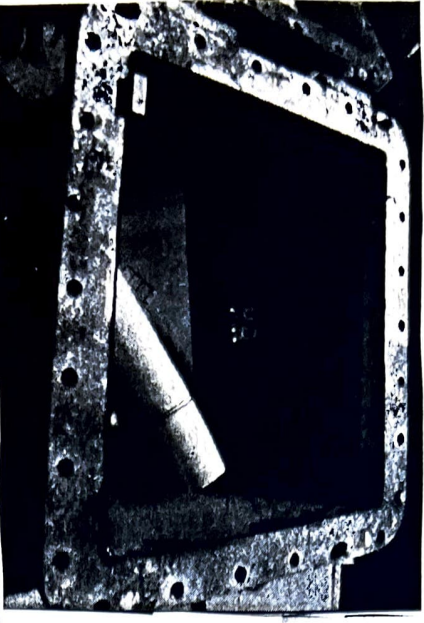

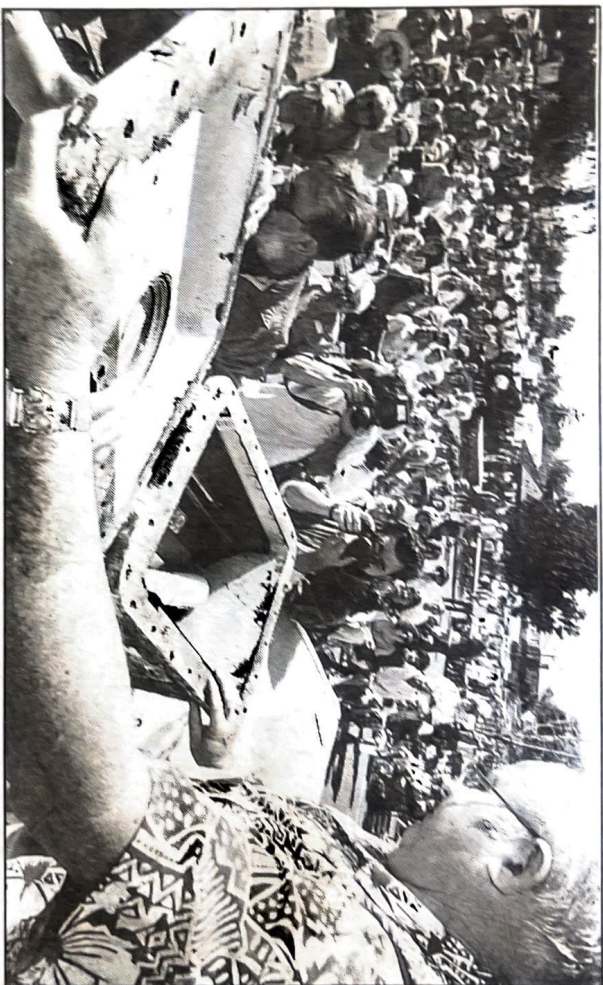

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# Breaans to blast into city's past

The local past will be resurrected on Brea's 75th birthday with the excavation of a 25-year-old time capsule and living history bus tours.

The time capsule ceremony will begin at noon Sunday, Feb. 23 in the parking lot next to Old City Hall, 401 S. Brea Blvd in City Hall Park.

The Brea Olinda High School and Brea Junior High School bands will play songs circa 1967, the city's golden

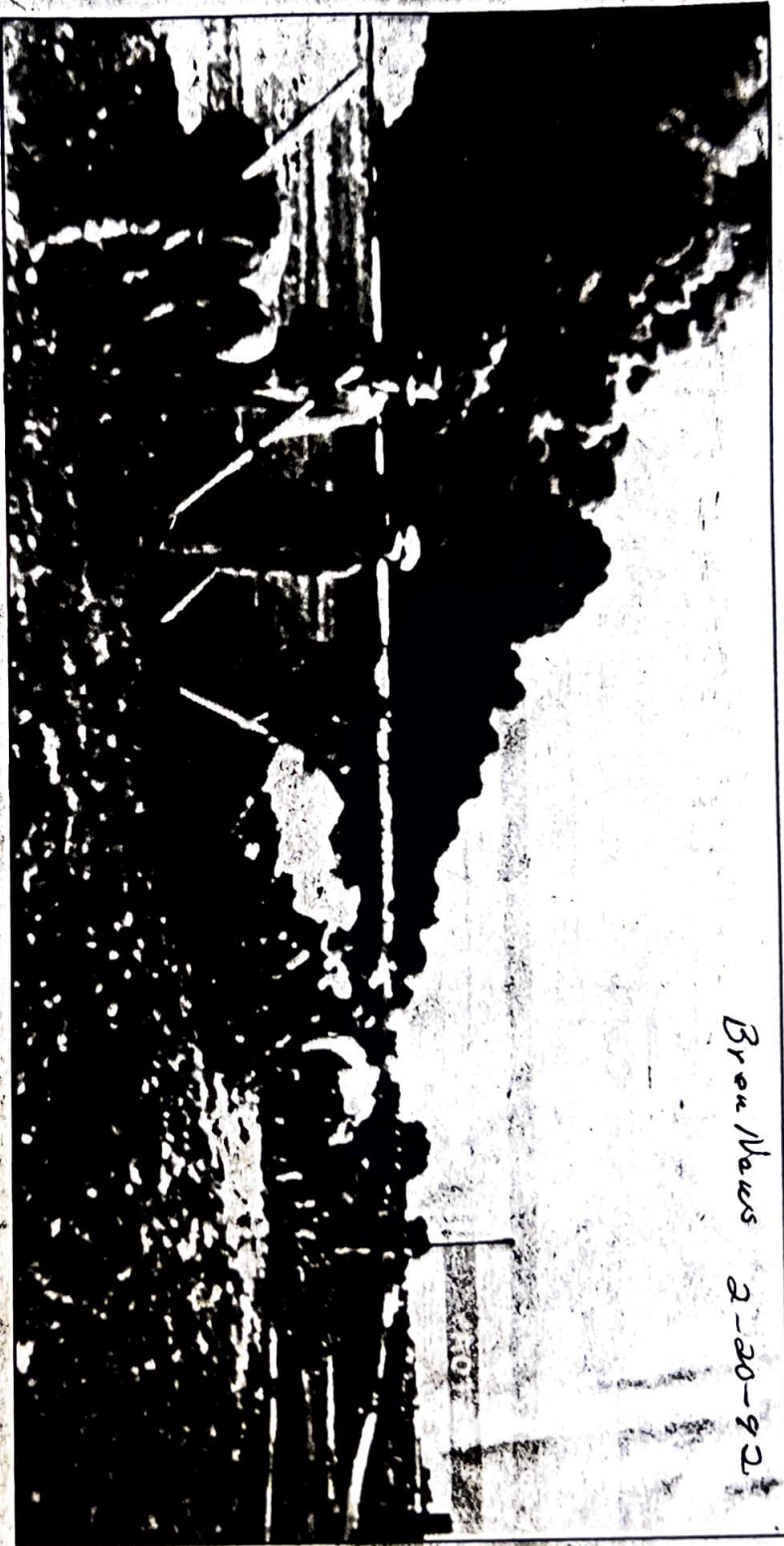
anniversary when the capsule was first placed in the ground. Nobody knows or can remember what was sealed in the capsule.

Kevin McGuire, the band director for the two schools, said his students had their own ideas about what should go into the 1992 capsule to be planted in December as the last activity commemorating the 75th Jubilee.

"They were mentioning Nike Pumps, condoms, the kinds of things that kids would think of," McGuire said.

The mayor from 1967, Robert Clark, will speak at Sunday's event as well as Mayor Ron Isles.

"Hopefully, there's something still in there that hasn't trotted away over the

last quarter century," said Brian Saul, vice president of the Brea Historical Society.

Items from the capsule will go on exhibit in the Museum of the Brea Historical Society at Old City Hall, along with photographic displays of the city and models of older buildings.

Copies of photos will be on sale with Jubilee souvenirs and a historical video.

The first living history tour buses will leave at 1 p.m. from the park for a 90-minute journey back in time. The tour will include a visit

to a place near Brea Junior High where Babe Ruth played baseball in 1924. The game was an exhibition for the Anaheim Elks Club. On the stop to Tonner Canyon, another story of mythic proportions will be discussed — the legend of the treasure of Tonner Canyon.

Explorers early this century hunted relentlessly for a chest said to contain gold. "If that's a true story, one of the developers who owns that land could run into a lot of money when they're grading out there," Saul said.

The tour also will feature a

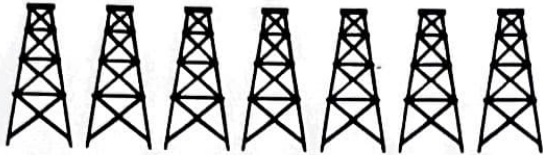
drive through an aging residential area near Old City Hall Park with talks about the houses and people who lived there. A visit will be paid to Brea's old airport north of Imperial Highway and Kraemar Avenue. The hangar consisted of a converted barn.

Following will be a trip to the site of the first living history — the former oil boom town of Olinda, (not to be confused with Olinda Village), near Carbon Canyon Park. Another stop will be the spot of the 1926 Stewart Tank Farm fire, which Saul calls Brea's worst

recorded disaster. Community volunteers, dressed in period clothing, will describe the life and times.

"These community people are really committed and they have an interest in the past," Saul said.

Tickets are still available for the bus tours at 2:30 and 3 p.m. Tickets can be obtained at the community services department, third floor of the Brea Civic and Cultural Center, One Civic Center Circle. Cost is \$5. The tours will be repeated May 9 and Sept. 19.

March 10, 1992

1. OPENING CEREMONY DEBRIEFING

We discussed three areas that we could definitely improve in: communication with the band so that the kids don't get up for some refreshments just as the ceremony begins, better planning on parking (especially for the disabled and elderly), and more VIP and participant seating.

We also talked about what to do with the contents of the time capsule. Brian will send a joint letter with Sharon Dean to the city council stating that the Historical Society would be honored to archive the contents for the city and would that be acceptable?

2. TIME CAPSULE CONTENTS CONTESTS

It was agreed that we would look into putting a few of the 1967 items back into the new time capsule. The items we felt were most deserving are the scroll, the ball and chain with an explanation, the Jubilee banner, and the 8mm film which Mary Jo will try to get converted to a video.

Who will be involved? There will be two contest groupings. The first will be for the schools. We will give each school a certain amount of space that they can have and they can decide if they only want to put one item in or a few smaller ones. The second group will be open to anyone else. There will be two categories open to individuals and groups. We want to stress imagination and creativity; also the use of different mediums.

Possible categories: 1) your view of the future - 2017 (hopes for the future)  
2) the world we live in now: the good, bad and the absurd!

Deadlines: Schools - May 31, Open - June 30

Logistics: Monica will put together a package of rules, etc.

SCHOOLS: Bev will find out the staff meeting times from the various public and private schools. Monica and Brian will then schedule with the principals to give a 5-10 minute presentation of the rules to the teachers and will serve as the contact people.

OPEN: Bev and Mary Jo will contact the various service clubs, ask merchants and the Mall to put up posters, get info put in the newspapers, on Channel 3, in the water bill, at Tiny Tots, the Senior Center, Chamber meetings, to the City employees, City Council meetings, etc.

Contest: Two ideas: 1) get some kind of savings bond for 25 years and put it in the time capsule with all the predictions of contest players. The person who gets the most of their 10 predictions closest to the mark will win the money. They must include their SS# so that they can be traced. 2) there will be two prizes given away at the burial in December. One will be for most unusual and the other for most indicative of our times. Other than these two winners, the other items that go in the time capsule will be kept secret.
