## Citywide Photo Contest

**E**astman Kodak Company and the City of Brea invites all photographers—advanced, beginners and everyone in between, to capture their favorite images of Brea.

"Picture Brea" is a City-wide photo contest and is part of Brea's 75th Jubilee. - ◆ Second Place (one in each category) \$100 each
- ◆ Three Third Place (one in each category) \$50 each
- ◆ Honorable Mention Ribbons (any category) 10 ribbons

### Conditions of Entry

1. Entry is open to everyone presently living or working in Brea or current members of the Brea Chamber of Commerce.
2. There is no limit on the number of entries.
3. There is no entry fee.
4. Calendar selections must depict present day Brea, however, there is no such timeframe the exhibit or collage selections.
5. Categories are color prints, color slides or black and white prints
6. Entries will be judged on quality and appearance. While technical quality is important, it will not be the deciding factor.
7. There is no age limit for contestants.
8. All entries to the "Picture Brea" photo contest will become the property of the City of Brea and will NOT be returned.

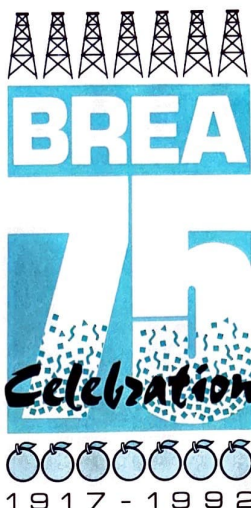

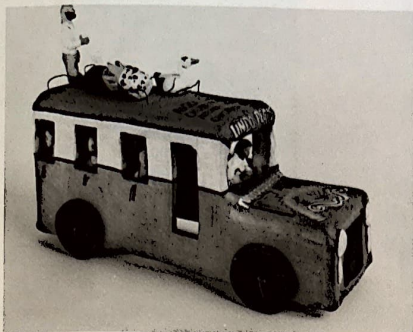

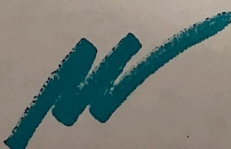

## BACK TO SCHOOL

September's here and it's back to school time for the 1991-92 school year. Here's some important information regarding registration and some other back-to-school facts.

### Kindergarten Enrollment

Children enrolling in kindergarten must be five years old on or before December 2, 1991. The student's birth certificate and immunization record, as well as proof of parent's residency (utility bill, escrow papers, or lease agreement) are required at the time of enrollment.

A student not residing within the Brea Olinda Unified School District boundaries can be enrolled in a BOUSD school by applying for an interdistrict transfer agreement. This agreement must be obtained from the district of residence. Non-resident students can also enroll in a BOUSD school if their parent/guardian works within the district boundaries. An interdistrict transfer permit must still be obtained from the district of residence, along with proof of employment (Verification of Employment form).

### Students New to BOUSD

All elementary, junior high, and high school students new to the Brea Olinda Unified

School District must register at the school they will be attending. If you're not sure which elementary school your child should attend, please call 990-7824 for assistance.

Again, all students must provide proof of residency within the BOUSD boundaries or an interdistrict transfer permit (see above) at the time of registration.

### Miscellaneous

The first day of school for elementary and junior high is Thursday, September 5. High school classes begin on Monday, September 9.

The cost of school lunches for the 1991-92 school year is \$1.50 for elementary schools, \$1.75 for junior high and high school.

## BREA CUTS WATER USE 16 PERCENT

Brea citizens continue to tally-up water savings amounting to 68,439,000 gallons for July, representing more than a 16 percent savings over the same period last year.



Brea's conservation track record prompted City Council to ease many of the restrictions mandated in April. Most of the rules, with the exception of washing off driveways and serving water in restaurants were eliminated.

Rules limiting car washing and filling pools to the early morning or evening hours have been dropped. Also eliminated is the odd/even rule for watering lawns and the mandate against hosing down rear patios.

"It is important that even though restrictions have been eased, we continue to conserve," said Pat Mc Carron, Maintenance Services Director. "We can't forget we were still in a serious drought situation."

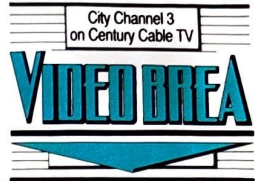

## BREA MALL BEGINS CARDBOARD RECYCLING PROGRAM

The Brea Mall, in conjunction with CVT Recycling, embarked on a unique cardboard recycling project in early July. The project is expected to divert hundreds of tons of cardboard from the Mall's waste stream each year.

The program is designed to promote the recycling of cardboard, a predominant material in the operation of a shopping mall, with little effort required from the Mall tenants. One of the Mall's five trash compactors has been converted to a cardboard recycling station. When tenants dispose of their trash, they simply separate out the cardboard and place it in the designated container.

According to Hugh Crawford, Brea Mall's assistant general manager, the response from merchants has been extremely positive. An average of three tons of cardboard a week are being recycled and diverted from overflowing landfills. "The recycling program is very simple, which is something we felt was important in order to encourage participation," said Crawford. "The more participation we receive, the higher amount of cardboard we will recycle. This allows Brea Mall merchants the opportunity to do their part for the environment by setting innovative standards for reducing waste and preserving our natural resources."

An additional benefit is that the program will help decrease our disposal costs. We will not only be paid for the cardboard CVT collects, but we expect to have substantial savings in our disposal costs as well.

Special green disposal bins for cardboard collection have been placed throughout the non-public areas of the Mall. This allows the Mall's 160 tenants to bring their cardboard to a bin in close proximity to their stores. Brea Mall has hired two employees to collect the cardboard from these bins and bring it to the cardboard recycling compactor where it will be collected weekly by CVT.

"We are very pleased to be working with Brea Mall on this new cardboard recycling program," said Barry Love, director of operations for CVT Recycling. "Every effort that can be made to reduce the amount of waste sent to our landfills is an important step. Brea Mall and its tenants have made the commitment and have already shown their enthusiasm for recycling. We expect the program to be a tremendous success."

## Beautification Committee Mission Statement

The Brea Beautification Committee was established as a Council Committee in October of 1989. The Committee is comprised of five members, including John Sandy, Dorothy Durbin, Carol Wolfert, Peg Morrissey and Randy Gamboa who meet on the first Tuesday of each month. The Council recognized the Committee's accomplishments and reviewed its new goals including an expansion of "Cleanup Month" (April), expansion of the Xeriscape Workshop, creation of a comprehensive tree-planting program and introduction of a residential composting program.

## Ordinances

- Speed zones on Birch and Randolph were adopted based on a traffic survey allowing 30 mph on Birch Street from Madrona to Randolph and 35 mph on Birch Street from Randolph to State College, as well as 35 miles per hour on Randolph between Birch Street and Imperial Highway
- The water conservation ordinance was amended to remove the restrictions regarding hours for watering, odd/even day watering schedule for landscaping, washing of autos, filling of swimming pools, watering of golf courses and hosing rear patios. An appeals process was established for those customers who have altered their living situation since the base year 1988-89. A water deposit process was approved requiring \$40 for new customers or a guarantee of good credit. The ordinance still requires users to reduce water consumption by a minimum of 10% in relation to usage during the 1988/89 base year. Furthermore, the ordinance still prohibits the washing of hard surfaces such as driveways and the serving of water at restaurants unless requested.

## Historical Committee Information

Five members selected to serve on the Historical Committee are Brian Saul, Ray Wolfert, Sharon Dean, Jose Segura and Wilma Sauer. This team will serve until December 31, 1992.

A concept plan for a historic block in the new downtown area was endorsed by the Council. The block's location was presented as the east side of Brea Boulevard, north of Ash Street. The schematic plan included relocation or rehabilitation of six historic structures for both residential and commercial uses, a plaza, mini-park and Charlie's Clock.

## Recreational Approvals

Council approved a \$5,000 appropriation to maintain and operate the Lowe Athletic Field on State College Boulevard. In an effort to preserve the field for community use, the City is seeking matching funds from the community.

The Council also approved an expanded contract with the City of Diamond Bar to provide a Youth Sports program, a summer Tiny Tots program and an American Explorer program plus excursions for teens. This service is completely funded by the City of Diamond Bar.

## Hazardous Materials Joint Powers Agreement

The Council approved a joint powers agreement with surrounding agencies to provide emergency response related to hazardous materials incidents. The agreement covers administrative costs only. Manpower will be provided by the cities as available. The ultimate responsible party for payment of costs is the property owner. The City also maintains an agreement with the HazMat Team of Orange County.

## Brea Downtown Project Approvals Continued

The approval of documents pertaining to development of the 50-acre downtown area was scheduled for public hearing this month but was continued to the first meeting in September in order to finalize agreements.

A bit of Williamsburg and the Plymouth Colony comes to Brea during the city's 75th Jubilee celebration Living History Tours, beginning Sunday, February 23. Rather than conversing the pilgrims or colonialists, tour members step back in history while interacting with actors portraying early Breans.

Brea's first Living History Tours will begin Sunday, February 23 at 1 pm, leaving from the Old City Hall Park on Brea Boulevard, south of Imperial Highway. The 90-minute tour leaves immediately after the opening of the City's 50 th Birthday time capsule buried in the park back in 1965.

Additional tours will leave that day at 1:30 pm, 2:30 pm and 3 pm from the same park location. Tour members will be transported in wide-view window buses supplied by Dial-A-Ride.

Tickets are \$5 per person and available at the Community Services Desk, third floor of the Brea Civic Center, located adjacent to Brea Mall at One Civic Center Drive.

Reservations may be made by telephoning 990-4461. Non-reserved tickets will be available at the bus boarding site only if space permits. Accommodations for handicapped persons must be arranged by advanced reservations.

The Living History Tours will be repeated on Saturday, May 9 and Saturday, September 19.

Tour visitors can discuss firefighting in the 20s with a fireman who fought the 1926 Stewart Tank Farm oil tank fire...maybe inquire about the price of beefsteak or bread from an oil worker or his family members living and working in the old Olinda oil town.

The one and one-half hour guided bus tours will take visitors to various parts of the city and canyon areas important to Brea's history. The buses will stop at selected sites so tour members can converse with the "residents" who were part of the history in its making. The oil worker can probably tell you how much crude they pump each day. But don't bother asking him the difference between regular and unleaded. He hasn't heard of them yet!

The Living History Tour is the creation of Brea's Jubilee Historical Committee and it's chairman, Brian Saul. Saul, a teacher at Arovista Elementary School in Brea for more than sixteen years, and vice-president of the city's Historical Society, has been instrumental in preserving Brea's history through walking tours of the downtown area and collecting artifacts and memorabilia from former city landmarks.

"We got the idea of a living history tour of Brea," states Saul, "after my visit

to the Civil War living history exhibit at the Appomatox Court House in Virginia. That's where Generals Lee and Grant signed the peace accord that signaled the end of the War between the States. "Also," continues Saul, "from the overwhelming community interest generated when we gave the downtown walking tours."

Even though some of the historical sites have little or no resemblance to the originals, through the Living History Tours visitors can still get a "feel" of what transpired in the little oil town when gaslights, orange groves and flappers were in vogue. They will learn of the time when Brea had it's own airport. Also about the legend of buried treasure in Tonner Canyon. And other tidbits of information from the Jubilee Historical Committee's guides who promise a lively overview of life in Brea before we learned to say "mall."

Although there are two other living history exhibits in Orange County, the concept of a living history bus tour is a first. Other living history exhibits within Orange County include the old schoolhouse in Lake Forest's Heritage Hills Park. Not open to the general public, student groups may arrange to attend a typical turn of the century 4th grade classroom . These 90-minute sessions are "taught" by a schoolmarm just as they were in the late 1800s.

Another example of living history takes place the last Saturday of each month at the Old Mission San Juan Capistrano in San Juan Capistrano. The program, featuring actors portraying early Mission inhabitants, takes place between 10 am and 2 pm.

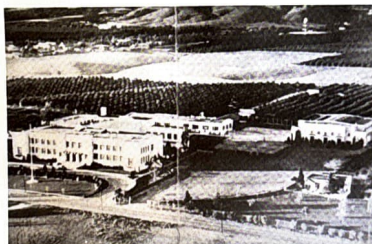

## What values and aspirations will shape "Future Brea?"

Executive Director's Message

As part of our ongoing City efforts to keep Brea a special and livable place, we have recently completed a series of community workshops to create a vision for the hillside and canyon areas north of Brea proper. The City Council decided to initiate the "Future Brea - Shaping the Vision" project after a developer requested that the City approve a conceptual plan for a very large residential development in Tonner Canyon. The proposed development would have required massive grading of the hillsides. To get out in front of development, the Council set in motion this proactive community planning process in early 1991.

**What is the Sphere of Influence?**

The Sphere of Influence (SOI) is the unincorporated County area north of Brea. This hillside and canyon area is 7.4 square miles and includes some of the most attractive, undeveloped land left in north Orange County. Specifically, the SOI area consists of Tonner Canyon; hillside land east of the 57 Freeway north of Lambert Road; and areas west of the 57 Freeway above Brea Canyon Road.

If all of the area is annexed, the City's size will increase by roughly 70%. Clearly, what happens to these 4,762 acres will have a major impact on Brea and its residents.

**"Create the Vision"**

To initiate the "Future Brea" project, City staff and consultants were assembled to design the

process and collect basic information about the SOI area. Over 100 Breans from all segments of the community were then appointed by the Council to serve as "Community Designers." The first workshop was held in mid-November, 1991, to "Create the Vision." During this intensive weekend event, Community Designers toured the SOI area, reviewed background information, considered values and concerns about the future, and created a series of over 250 "idea cards." These cards each represent "mini-visions" for the future of the SOI area. The excitement and commitment of the Community Designers were clearly reflected in the "idea cards," which were carefully sorted and reviewed by the staff and consultants. The "idea cards" dealt with open space preservation, village lifestyle, affordable housing, ridgeline protection, alternative transportation, and community facilities.

**"Evaluate the Vision"**

The Community Designers reconvened in a second workshop on Saturday, January 11. The agenda for the all-day session was designed to review planning principles generated from the "idea cards." The Community Designers were asked to consider these principles as the framework to guide any preservation and development of the SOI. After evaluating and modifying these principles, the Community Designers discussed a series of sketches which illustrated various approaches to implement the planning principles in the sphere of influence area. The key planning principles include:

1. **Diversity** - The SOI area should include a range of different types of land uses, intensities of uses, and types of housing.
2. **Sustainability** - Future use of the SOI area should incorporate "self-sustaining" development such as the use of reclaimed water and solar energy wherever possible.

3. **Economic Feasibility** - No net costs to the City of Brea or its taxpayers should result from any development of the SOI.

4. **Environmental Quality** - The SOI area includes many environmental assets which must be protected from adverse impacts.

5. **Mobility** - Future transportation needs and traffic demands on existing systems will be an important consideration for the SOI area.

6. **Historical/ Cultural Enhancement** - The SOI should affirm Brea's rich legacy of oil production and other historical heritage, Brea's regional "gateway" location, and other cultural and educational activities.

7. **Phasing** - Planning and development of the sizeable SOI area should be based on long-range scheduling rather than piece-meal solutions.

**What's the Next Step?**

Input from the community workshops is being used to draft a Vision Document which will be presented to the Community Designers and all Brea residents. The Vision Document will be used to evaluate all future development proposals in the sphere of influence area.

In summary, the "Future Brea" project was designed to ensure that Brea continues to be planned with quality and livability in mind. Any mix of environmental preservation and development must be guided by the values and aspirations of the Brea community.

## Redevelopment Progresses

The Redevelopment Services Department, headed by Susan Georgino, is responsible for the identification of Redevelopment projects and project areas, coordination of negotiations between the Agency and developers, and monitoring of active agreements. Combined, the issue totaled approximately \$36,500,000. Proceeds from the issue will be used to finance a portion of the Community Center, an

## Brea Begins Pilot Recycling Program in Multi-Unit Residential Areas

Until now, most people living in multi-unit residential areas in Brea did not have recycling methods available to them except if they sorted and took the materials to a recycling center. The City of Brea and Brea Disposal are now making it easier for people living in multi-unit residential homes to recycle. As a second phase of Recycle Brea, a pilot program has started in 25 apartment complexes servicing over 3,000 units.

Similar to the single family residential program, the new program for multi-unit residences incorporates the same "commingled" system. Through its current recycling program, citizens of Brea have already diverted over 7,200 tons of recyclable material from a landfill. This material is processed and remanufactured into useful new products. By expanding the Recycle Brea program to multi-unit homes residences even more material can be recovered.

The City of Brea and Brea Disposal will continue these efforts to preserve our natural resources and protect our environment. It is the participation of citizens that makes these recycling programs such a success.

## Tax Time

### Free Tax Assistance for Seniors

Free income tax preparation assistance will be available for Brea senior citizens each Monday, March 2 through April 13 at the Brea Senior Center from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Volunteer counselors trained by the Internal Revenue Service and the Franchise Tax Board will provide assistance in the preparation of individual tax returns. This program is designed to help low and moderate income older persons understand income tax forms and become familiar with special benefits available to seniors. Persons interested in utilizing this service should bring copies of their last year's tax returns and forms for the current tax year, including W-2s, 1099s and other relevant materials reflecting income for 1991.

This tax assistance program, better known as "Tax Aide" is sponsored by the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), the Internal Revenue Service and the Franchise Tax Board. For further information call 990-7750.

### Get Up to \$2,000 in Two Simple Steps

Did you work during 1991 - and did your family earn less than \$21,250? Did a child live with you for at least half the year? If so, you may be eligible for up to \$2,000 from the Earned Income Credit. It's a federal benefit for both married and single parents who worked either full or part time during part or all of the year.

### How to Get Your Money

Getting your Earned Income Credit takes just two simple steps:

1. File a federal income tax return (Form 1040A or 1040)
2. Fill out "Schedule EIC" and attach it to your tax return

If you are eligible, you will either owe less in taxes - or the government will mail you a check! You can get the Earned Income Credit even if you don't owe income tax. For information, call the IRS at 800-829-1040. You can get tax forms from the IRS, or at your local Post Office and many banks and libraries.

### Birch Street

Soon Birch Street will have new sidewalks, curbs, gutters, and street lights as the construction crew nears completion of the south side of the street, according to John Hogan, Assistant City Engineer.

"The south side was the most intense part of the project because of the amount of work involved," said Hogan. Once the south side is complete, the remainder of the project will include paving and landscaping.

Over the past few months, the project has included widening the street, installing storm drains, relocating public utilities, and removing structures on the south side of Birch.

Birch Street is being widened to give Brea citizens a cross town thoroughfare between the downtown and the Civic Center.

### Imperial Highway Update

The Imperial Highway project, expected to alleviate traffic congestion along a one mile stretch between Berry and Randolph, is currently awaiting Cal Trans approval.

Due to the use of federal money and because Imperial Highway is a state highway, Cal Trans and its federal counterparts must approve all plans before construction can begin.

The City is using this "down time" to explore ways to ease inconvenience to area businesses, residents, and commuters during the construction. Once underway, the project is expected to take two years, consisting of 18 months of major road work and six months of clean up and landscaping. Two lanes of traffic in each direction will remain open throughout construction.

## Earthquake Preparedness

On October 17, 1989, February 28, 1990, and June 28, 1991, major earthquakes rocked parts of California, which together caused 64 deaths, more than 3,800 injuries and almost \$6 billion in property damage.

Earthquakes are a fact of life in California. Because of this the City of Brea wants to help Brea residents prepare for future quakes. Governor Wilson has proclaimed April as Earthquake Preparedness Month and the City of Brea has joined other California cities in an effort to encourage everyone, young and old alike, to get prepared.

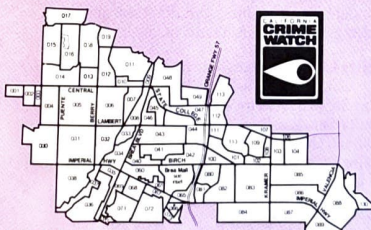

# CITY RECAP

JANUARY - FEBRUARY 1992

## Mid-year Budget Review

In light of the recession, the mid-year budget review took on added importance during the past several months. The mid-year review determined a \$1.3 million shortfall in projected revenue for the current fiscal year 1991-92. The City Council approved expenditure cuts in the operations of all departments. However, this belt-tightening avoided any reduction in personnel or community services.

## Expansion of Landfill

After much public input, the Council negotiated a number of concessions from the County of Orange with regard to expansion of the Olinda Landfill. The County is drafting an amended agreement to ensure that the landfill will not be utilized after the year 2013 and it will stay within its existing perimeter with no need for borrow dirt sites. The County will also support State purchase of Shell property adjacent to the landfill for the Chino Hills State Park. With regard to water protection, efforts will begin immediately to implement a leachate recovery system to protect the groundwater. Landscaping to mask the face of the landfill will be provided.

## Development Agreement

A Disposition & Development Agreement was approved with Darwin Manuel Service Corporation to develop a sixteen-unit residential condominium project at 122-128 S. Orange Avenue. Five of these units will be affordable to low and moderate income families.

## Underground Utility District Formed

Council approved undergrounding of electrical lines along Orange Avenue and Brea Boulevard between Imperial Highway and Cypress Street. Costs for this undergrounding will be borne by Southern California Edison Company and the Brea Redevelopment Agency. Work will begin in 1993.

## Joint Use with School District

A "joint use of facilities" agreement between the City and School District was approved. During the fiscal year, the City will use school facilities for sports and recreation classes in exchange for a \$33,000 custodial fee and an additional \$9,000 for two Tiny Tot Program classrooms at Laurel School.

## Entertainment Permit Approved for Regency Coffee Roast

A permit for light entertainment at the coffee shop at the Lucky Shopping Center at 2500 E. Imperial Highway was approved. Entertainment will be permitted on the patio during early evening hours on weekdays and extended evening hours on Fridays and Saturdays.

## Property Exchange Agreements

A Redevelopment Agency agreement will relocate Phillips Towing and Storage from 121 W. Ash Street to property at the southeast corner of Cypress Street and North Orange Avenue. A second agreement will relocate the Brea Foursquare Church to the vacated site on Ash Street, providing a new sanctuary, a child care facility and a nine-unit residential area above the day care center. The new parking structure between Birch and Ash Street along Brea Boulevard will be used for the majority of the needed parking in that it is directly across the street from the church.

## Car Wash Zoning Requirements/

The City's zoning ordinance was amended last month to set minimum parking standards for full-service car washes to require 10 parking spaces plus 2 additional spaces per each detail bay, 20 queuing spaces and 17 drying spaces. A drying space is measured at a minimum of 10 feet by 20 feet. This somewhat relaxes the former code requirement and provides clearer definition to individual uses.

## Rainfall Creates False Hopes for End of Drought

Although Southern California has received more rain over the past few months than in previous years, the drought continues. The heavy rains we have experienced recently provides a welcome relief to dry hilltops and low reservoirs, however, the inches received are not nearly enough to offset the sizable shortages caused by five years of very dry weather.

The City of Brea, like most Southern California cities, imports the majority of its water supply from the Metropolitan Water District (MWD). The MWD indicates that its water supply is still down by almost 50% of normal making it imperative for citizens to continue practicing conservation measures.

upgrade of Brea's public water system facilities, and the recently approved acquisition of two fire trucks.

## Relocation of Brea Boulevard Merchants

As the date for the widening of Brea Boulevard nears, the Redevelopment Agency continues to make every effort to retain existing Brea Boulevard merchants in Brea. The Agency has been working with Boulevard merchants to fashion property exchange agreements or find relocation properties within the city. These efforts will result in businesses being relocated from their current locations on Brea Boulevard to locations in close proximity to the Downtown area. One such relocatee, Pawlack Tile, has found new quarters on the corner of Lambert Road and Berry Street. Pawlack Tile expects to be open in their new location by the beginning of March 1992.

## Brea Senior Subsidy Program

Recently the City Council/Agency Board approved revisions to the Senior Subsidy Program. This program assists Brea seniors by providing a \$110 per month rent subsidy to help make housing costs more affordable. In the past this subsidy was available at a limited number of locations in Brea with a small number of subsidies available for undesignated locations. The revised program will move 10 existing subsidies from the fixed apartment locations, through attrition, to the undesignated portion of the program. Although the total number of subsidies has not increased, this restructuring should make it easier for Brea seniors who live in undesignated apartments, mobile homes, single family homes or other living arrangements to participate in the program. of people speeding don't do it intentionally, they just aren't paying attention." As motorists pass the trailer it will provide an instant, non-threatening reminder to slow down and be more mindful of their speed.

The trailer is planned for use primarily in residential areas, school zones and places where there are high occurrences of speeding and traffic accidents. Use of the trailer in these areas rather than deployment of police personnel will allow the Traffic Division to concentrate on speed-related complaints and other enforcement activities.

# City to Start Celebrating Its 75th Year

A giant birthday party will be held Saturday at the Brea Mall as the city officially kicks off its 75th anniversary celebration.

About 1,000 people are expected to attend the birthday bash, the first in a series of events scheduled throughout the yearlong jubilee.

"I think that the community is interested in where it has come from and where we are going," said Community Services Director Ret. Wixted, whose department is coordinating the celebrations. "There is a great deal of community pride in Brea."

The party will be followed on Sunday with living history tours and the opening of a time capsule buried in 1967 under the old City Hall flagpole.

During the tours, residents will be treated to snapshots from the city's past, including one of the most devastating catastrophes in Brea's history. In 1926, oil tanks from San Luis Obispo to the Stewart Tank Farm—a mile west of what is now downtown Brea—caught fire after lightning strikes. In Brea, the fiery oil spilled out and jumped to nearby oranges, lemons and walnut groves, devastating everything in its path.

"The city's lone fire truck couldn't handle the blaze, which took several fire departments from other cities to tame. Nor could it stop the cyclone which churned up in the fire-driven wind that toppled buildings and sheared off roofs."

On Sunday, residents can visit the site of the oil tank fire, the field that once was the site of the city's airport and the Brea Boulevard warehouse where inventor Fred Truhab built the first low-winged monoplane.

"There are very few people who know that we had an airport here one time," said Brian Saul, a local historian who is heading up the historical committee. "This even surprised me."

For several months, more than 100 community volunteers have been working to put the finishing touches on the jubilee. Six committees have been busy tackling everything from ordering chairs for the birthday party to organizing a parade scheduled for May 16.

Other events include historical home tours planned for April and a Fourth of July county fair. More events are being added along the way, officials said.

"We want to make sure that any one who passes through knows we are proud of our town," said volunteer Chris Reimer.

"We are expecting a good turnout [this weekend]," he added. "We are really excited."

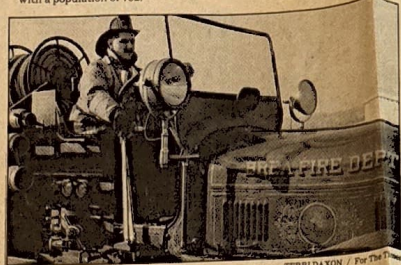
## Tree-Planting Effort Ceases Temporarily

The city's volunteer tree-planting operation has come to a crashing halt—well short of its goal of planting 20,000 trees by the year 2000—but officials hope to revive it by summer.

### Brea Milestones

This year is Brea's 75th anniversary. Among the significant events in the city's history:

- 1945—Chamber of Commerce was formally incorporated.
- 1950—First tract homes were constructed in the southeast area of Brea.
- 1960—"Good Ole Brea" project began to enliven the downtown economy.
- 1972—Orange Freeway was completed.
- 1977—Brea Mall opened.
- 1980—New Civic and Cultural Center was built.
- 1982—Relocated Olinda School became the Brea Senior Citizen Center.
- 1989—New Brea-Olinda High School opened.
- 1990—Imperial Plaza East Shopping Center opened.
- 1991—Brea Mall expansion was completed.
- 1992—Brea is 75.

Under the new program, the Utility Department would pay for the planting of trees on private property to shade homes, Edwards said. "That would cut down on the amount of electricity used for air conditioning," he said.

Called Shade Tree, the new plan would have to be approved by the City Council. But in the last seven months the council approved spending \$40,000 for fertilizer and other supplies for the Releaf Anaheim plantings, making Edwards hopeful that the council may also approve funds for the new program.

The part-time coordinator, position, paid for by the local Rotary Club, will be filled if Shade Tree begins or Releaf Anaheim is resumed, Edwards said.

Edwards said the city will apply for another state grant, which, if approved, would allow the Releaf Anaheim program to resume sometime after July. He also hopes that Shade Tree will be approved by that time.

Cover, the former Relief coordinator, was hired by California Relief, a non-profit foundation that helps local programs such as Anaheim's. In her new position, she will seek federal grants for the state.

"I think that Releaf Anaheim has been a success because 895 street trees have been planted that might not have been planted otherwise," Cover said. "So I don't think the program can be perceived as a negative, even though it's stopped for the time being."

## Drug Tests to Be Required of Police

The Police Department announced Tuesday that it is enacting a policy calling for mandatory drug testing for narcotics officers and other department employees who handle or process drugs.

Orange is one of the first police departments in the county to adopt such a policy, according to Police Chief Merrill V. Duncan.

The policy, which becomes effective immediately, also requires department employees who do not deal directly with narcotics to submit to random—but less frequent—drug testing.

The testing program was adopted partly because "there is a tremendous potential for corruption associated with drug use by police employees," according to the department policy statement.

Duncan said the policy, under consideration for a year, was not prompted by any incidence of drug use within the department but rather by the department's desire to retain public confidence.

"Nothing brought it on," he said. "It comes down to the fact that the patrol car next to me and who's knocking on my front door when I cry for help?"

The policy was created in cooperation with the department's union, the City of Orange Police Assn. The COPA board of directors voted unanimously in December to approve the policy.

A letter from COPA board members called the policy "fair and impartial." "It is truly a sad time in our profession that such measures have to be considered," the board's letter stated. "Yet, in our opinion that both the public and employees themselves must be assured that drugs are not present within our working environment."

Recommendations for drug-testing policies are often resisted by department employees, and Duncan praised COPA for supporting the program.

"Some of the [police] associations are using this as a bargaining chip, but COPA decided to adopt it," he said.

The policy did not require City Council approval, but Councilman Mike Spurgon commended the Police Department and the association for being willing to monitor themselves.

"This is one reason we have one of the best departments around," he said.

The drug-testing program will require each narcotics enforcement officer and every employee who conducts drug analysis, or whose work includes preservation or disposal of drugs, to submit to unannounced drug tests up to four times each year. Other police staff will be required to submit to unannounced tests given at random no more than twice a year.

Employees will be tested while on duty, if possible, and will be given two hours to provide a blood or urine sample. The private tests will screen for use of cocaine, marijuana, PCP, LSD, barbiturates, amphetamines, Valium, steroids, codeine, morphine and methadone.

If a drug test is positive, a second test will be given to confirm the results. If tests are confirmed, employees may then elect to take their samples to another lab.



Employees will also be required to notify their superiors if they use prescription medication that may impair their performance on the job or if they have had outside contact with an illegal substance.

If an officer is found to use drugs, he could be dismissed. If an employee has absorbed drugs through handling them on the job, he will receive appropriate treatment, Duncan said.

## District to Expand DARE Program

The Santa Ana Unified School District will expand its Drug Abuse Resistance Education program to reach high school students with a new DARE officer paid for by the city.

A retired police officer will be added at a cost of \$25,000 a year, bringing the number of DARE officers in the district to six.

District spokeswoman Diane Thomas said the enhanced program will reinforce decision-making skills that many high school students learned in the DARE program in lower grades, as well as reach new students who missed the program.

High school students throughout the district will take the 10-week course beginning this spring. The council approved the expansion at its meeting last week.

### Non-Residential Building Valuations

Commercial construction permit activity in Orange County limped through the first 11 months of 1991. During the January-November interim, the most recent period for which information is available, the value of permits issued reached just \$761.3 million, 29% less than the comparable total for 1990.

Valuations for all five major categories were below the 1990 levels, particularly in the case of hotel/motel building. Alterations and additions were nearest the total for the year before, slipping just 2%.

Orange County is not alone in this slump, however; it is statewide (down 24%). In urbanized Southern California's six-county region, three counties (Los Angeles, -29%; Riverside, -32%, and San Diego, -33%) fared worse than Orange County. San Bernardino (-20%) and San Diego (-22%) also lingered below their 1990 totals, though not as much.

Of all the commercial construction permits issued during the first 11 months in the six-county area, 15% were for Orange County projects, 8% of the value of all permits issued statewide occurred here. Those figures have remained fairly consistent since the beginning of 1990.

# Bitter Landlord-Renter Dispute Goes to Trial

**Law: Tenants of Santa Ana apartment complex say they lived in a 'pit of squalor.' Owner says repairs were made but trashed by residents.**

SANTA ANA—Tenants in a run-down apartment complex lived in a "pit of squalor" for years, and repairs by their landlord were too little too late, a tenants' lawyer said Tuesday during opening statements in Municipal Court in the county's longest and most bitter landlord/renter dispute.

After seven years of out-of-court grappling, which included the county's longest rent strike, Carmine Esposito and 68 tenants of his Santa Ana apartments heard their attorneys give dramatically conflicting views about who is responsible for the conditions at his six apartment buildings.

Attorney Stuart M. Parker accused landlord Esposito, 53, of Anaheim, of operating his properties on West Brook Street in Santa Ana for mere profit at the expense of the safety and well-being of the residents.

Esposito's attorneys, however, contended that since 1985, the landlord has attempted to fix problems in the buildings, which are next to one another, only to have tenants repeatedly trash the repairs.

"I guess our case is broken,

replaced, repaired, broken, repaired, prepared. That's our case," attorney James R. Wakefield told jurors.

The tenants are claiming emotional and physical distress and are asking for compensatory and punitive damages. Esposito is also asking for damages, alleging that the tenants wrongly carried out the strike, which lasted from 1985 to 1990, and should pay back rent. The trial is expected to last six weeks.

The dispute dates from February, 1985, when a string of civil suits and countersuits were filed between the tenants and Esposito. The tenants' series of civil suits—naming Esposito and his wife, Miran—claimed that apartment units were uninhabitable because of continuous infestation of cause of continuous infestation of roaches and rodents, exposed wiring, faulty plumbing, electrical equipment and appliances, and other substandard conditions. After the filing of the first organized rent strike in the county.

Esposito countered, saying the rent rebellion was illegal and asked the court to evict the rent strikers. Subsequently, the tenants won the right to stay in the apartments but were ordered to pay reduced rents to a court-appointed receiver who would then distribute the payments to Esposito to make repairs on the buildings.

On Tuesday, Esposito's attorneys argued that since 1985, the embattled landlord had spent more than \$500,000 to renovate the 52 units in the six apartment buildings. Furthermore, the attorneys

# Medical Board Files Complaints Against 2 Doctors

In separate complaints, the Medical Board of California has accused a Los Alamitos anesthesiologist of gross negligence in the death of a patient and charged that a Tustin obstetrician sexually abused his patients.

State officials are seeking to revoke or suspend the medical licenses of Howard J. Rosen, chief of anesthesiology at Los Alamitos Medical Center, and Tustin obstetrician Ivan G. Namihas.

Rosen said: "The allegations are incorrect. I'd like to comment, but that is usually restrained by the attorneys."

Namihas could not be reached for comment.

According to the accusation against him, Rosen failed to properly evaluate a 30-year-old labor and delivery patient who needed a Cesarean section.

The complaint says the anesthesiologist had difficulty placing a tube down her airway, but he told an obstetrician to proceed with surgery anyway. The woman then went without oxygen for from five to 20 minutes during the June 29, 1989, surgery and later died.

In the case against Namihas, state officials cited a series of incidents from 1986 to 1988 in which the doctor had allegedly fondled his patients.

said, despite the court order, the tenants did not pay any rent to the receiver in 1985.

And, Wakefield added, while Esposito paid for new bathroom, new walls, new electrical units and other repairs, "for some reason, things keep going wrong in those apartments . . . and the tenants will tell you they don't know what happened."

As for the infestation, Wakefield said, in 1985, when Esposito tried to remedy the problem, tenants "refused to let fumigators into their apartments."

Tenant attorney Parker contended that the tenants had been living in "a pit of squalor that endangered" their health since 1980, when Esposito bought the property. And, it wasn't until 1985, when he cited Esposito, that he tried to fix the units, Parker said.

And, "although there have been some improvements," Parker said, "it's still far less than satisfying."

# 'Lagunatic' Harry Moon Jr. Dies

**Obituary: Widely known ex-restauranteur was avidly involved in his city's business and environmental issues.**

LAGUNA BEACH—Community activist Harry Ansel Moon Jr., former owner of the Cottage Restaurant and one of this city's best-known residents, died Monday of heart failure after a long bout with Parkinson's disease. He was 64.

Moon, who labeled himself a "Lagunatic" because of his passion for the city where he lived for 36 years, was an avid supporter of the local business and environmental communities. Civic groups used his restaurant regularly for fund-raisers.

Friends say Moon, who was named Laguna Beach's Citizen of the Year in 1987, was a tenacious problem-solver.

"Harry gave the meaning to the word 'Lagunatic,'" said attorney Don Black, who served with Moon on the local Chamber of Commerce. "Harry was always willing to help. And no matter how dismal the problem, Harry had a solution for it. We're going to miss him."

Moon's sister, Helen Anne Tenua of San Juan Capistrano, said one wall in Moon's Laguna Terrace

mobile home was covered with awards and commendations from various civic groups. And City Clerk Verna Bollinger said Moon distinguished himself by embracing a wide range of local concerns.

"Perhaps you could say he was one of a kind in that he was a successful downtown business person and a strong environmentalist, and he understood the need for both and worked diligently to see that Laguna had everything," Bollinger said.

"He was always willing to lend his restaurant for fund-raisers for practically every organization in town—the Community Clinic, the Hortense Miller Gardens, Laguna Greenbelt and many others, I'm sure," she said.

Moon was active in the Laguna Beach Free Clinic—now the Community Clinic—from its inception and served on its board. But perhaps his greatest passion, those who knew him said, was the issue of transportation.

He served on the Orange County Transit District's citizens' advisory committee for a decade, as well as the city's Parking, Traffic and Circulation Committee. He hosted annual breakfasts at his restaurant on transportation, offering up a range of ideas on electric cars, rails and trams to try to solve the growing transit crunch in Laguna Beach and the region.

"He was a champion of transportation," City Councilwoman Mar-

tha Collison recalled. "He had the ability to let his mind expand on all the alternatives instead of letting it be closed to just one."

Sometimes, Moon's efforts touched people in personal ways. Years ago, Moon befriended Eiler Larsen—the famed "Laguna Greeter"—regularly gave him a free breakfast at the Cottage Restaurant, named a pancake breakfast after him and even held a fundraiser to allow him to return to his native Scandinavia. Moon's sister said. Pictures of the Greeter still adorn the restaurant wall.

Moon, who was born in Pasadena on April 15, 1927, moved to Laguna Beach in 1956 and in 1964 opened what was to become one of the city's most popular restaurants.

In 1979, he was found to have Parkinson's disease, a condition that had worsened in recent years, Tenua said. He sold the business in 1988.

Recently, Moon spent two weeks at South Coast Medical Center in Laguna Beach. He was later admitted to Ahimsa Care Center in Laguna Beach, where he stayed for three days until he died about Monday, Tenua said.

Moon is survived by Tenua and two other sisters, Edith Abbie Trone of Glendora and Harriet Ada Bailey of El Monte.

The Cottage Restaurant will host a public memorial service for Moon next Tuesday at 2 p.m. There will be no funeral.

# Man, 19, Denies Girlfriend's Murder

SANTA ANA—A young man accused of fatally stabbing his girlfriend pleaded not guilty Monday in Orange County Superior Court.

Prosecutors allege that Kiem Van Do, 19, murdered Hang Thi Thy Dinh, 18, last October in a rage when their relationship fell apart.

According to police, Dinh was stabbed four times just four days after arriving in the country. Police said Do, Dinh and her parents and several brothers and sisters fled Vietnam for a Philippines refugee camp and then came to the United States.

Because Do is an Amerasian, he was eligible to enter the country under a 1987 law aimed at helping Amerasians. The Dinh's, who are Vietnamese and do not qualify under the special law, apparently immigrated as part of Do's family.

Do, police said, had expected to marry Dinh. But once they were in the United States, Dinh's father forced them to break up.
