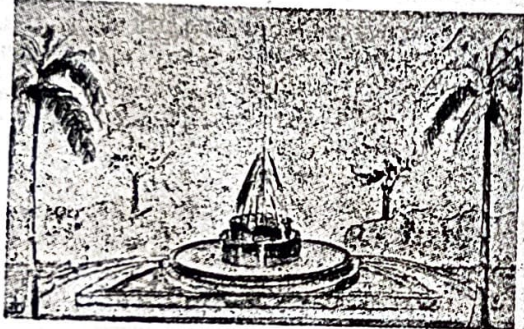
The drill bit for Brea's Com-

Shaffer Memorial Fountain Is Nearing Completion



ARTIST'S CONCEPTION OF FOUNTAIN

Charles McCormick, of the
Shaffer Memorial Fountain com-
mittee, announced this week that
the fountain should be in opera-
tion about August 14.

One of the most frequent ques-
tions asked, Mr. McCormick said,
is how much water the fountain
will use. "That depends on how
much evaporates," Mr. McCor-
mick said. "The fountain uses the
same water over and over again
and the only loss is by evapora-
tion," Mr. McCormick explained.

"Before work was started on
the fountain bids from contract-
ors were called for and the esti-
mates were around \$17,000," Mr.
McCormick said. He added that
that the fountain is being built
by supervised labor at a cost of
around \$6,000. Approximately
\$750 is still needed to cover this
cost.

All form lumber for the foun-
tain has been donated by the
Ward and Harrington Lumber
Company. Wiring of the fountain
has been donated by the Brea
Electric Company. The plumbing
has been donated by James Wil-
lamson of the A. & W. Plumbing
Company. The mixing of the
concrete has been donated by
the Brea Ready-Mixed Concrete
company and a suitable plaque
for the fountain is to be donated
by the McGraw Foundry of Brea.

A coat of seal paint is being
applied to the concrete, which is
similar to that used by the U. S.
Navy for sealing bottoms of ships.
This is being donated by Carl
Helmick.

Brea citizens interested in help-
