BREA — All non-profit organizations are invited to present proposals for funding to Soroptimist International of Brea at the organization's annual Public Forum on Nov. 15.

Brea Soroptimists, a professional women's organization dedicated to community services, uses the Public Forum to learn about charitable needs in the local area. During the evening event, representatives of non-profit agencies will be asked to make a five-minute presentation detailing their organization's needs. In past years, Soroptimists

funds have been granted to projects like the gazebo in Brea's City Hall Park and the purchase of a Jaws of Life, and to organizations such as the Boys and Girls Club, Girl Scouts, the Women's Transitional Living Center, the Brea Olinda High School Ladycats and the Brea Historical Society.

Brea Soroptimists honor group

BREA ¹⁹² As a result of a community forum held on Feb. 22, the Soroptimist International of Brea honored seven organizations at a luncheon May 3 to present them with financial assistance.

Present at the meeting were: Cieta Harder representing Help for Brain Injured Children (H.B.I.C.); Rosemary DeCuir for the Brea Senior Center; Judy Stewart with Womens Transitional Living Center (WTLIC); Inez Fanning representing the Brea Historical Society; Jan Wingerter for Brea Community Girl Scouts; Eileen Moore for County Hills Elementary School; and Patty Thomas of the Girl Scout Council of Orange County.

The Boys and Girls Club of Brea and the Salvation Army representatives were unable to attend this meeting and will receive funding later in the month.

The Brea Senior Center received money to purchase a portable TV-VCR and cassettes to be used in their "Sharing

Companion Program." Volunteers make regular visits to the elderly, often bed-ridden, individuals and the equipment is being purchased so they can share health, educational, entertaining or remniscent tapes with their homebound friends. If you would like more information about the Sharing Companion Program or the Brea Senior Center, call DeCuir at (714) 990-7750.

WTLIC is an emergency shelter for battered women and their children (many of whom have also been physically abused or sexually molested). Since its inception in 1976, WTLIC has sheltered over 7,000 individuals. They received funding to purchase supplies for their new children's research center.

The Soroptimists lent assistance to Brea County Hills Elementary School to establish an Artist-in-Residence program whereby students will receive instruction in painting, sculpting, clay and learn an appreciation for the arts.

The Girl Scout Council of Orange County received partial funding for a special "Activity Center Troop" to serve the minority population of Brea who have not been able to receive volunteer leadership.

A check was also presented to the local Girl scout troops for a joint Christmas tree project. The Soroptimists purchase the Christmas trees and the Girl Scouts work to decorate and deliver them to the less fortunate citizens of Brea.

H.B.I.C. is well known for the hope it has given many children by making the most of their special talents and helping them to become participating members of their family. Since 1967, H.B.I.C. has helped over 3,300 children. The club presented H.B.I.C. with funds to purchase a laser printer for their computer.

The Brea Historical Society has many very old photographs of Brea which need to be preserved and framed. This is a very delicate procedure and many photos will have to be

restored or touched up. The Soroptimists are helping in this endeavor to keep in touch with a piece of "Good Old Brea."

Each year, the Soroptimists hold the community forum to find worthy causes in need of financial assistance. The 1990 forum will be held in September or October. Those connected with a charitable foundation in need of special funding are welcome to apply for funds by writing to Soroptimist International of Brea, P.O. Box 363, Brea, CA 92622-0363.

Soroptimist International of Brea honors pair for service to youth

BREA — Soroptimist International of Brea recently presented two Women of Distinction awards — one for service in health, one for service in economic and social development.

Despite the disparate titles, the awards recognized Judi Brenner and Inez Fanning for a shared accomplishment: service to youth.

Soroptimists honored Brenner, a Huntington Beach resident, with the "service in health" award for her efforts on behalf of Brandon Oba, a Brea Olinda High School senior who suffers from a fatal form of leukemia. As chairman of the Friends of Brandon Oba, Brenner recruited potential bone-marrow donors for a transplant procedure that could possibly save Oba's life. She also organized fund-raising efforts to help pay for the donor-testing program.

Fanning, a native Brea and active community leader, was saluted for her devotion to preserving Brea's history as president of the Brea Historical Society and a member of the city's Brea Historical Committee. Her commitment to sharing Brea's history, Fanning said, was based on her concern for children.

"The great and good family values are the historical ones,"

Fanning said, noting many children today face the insecurity of a transient family life or a broken home.

Offering youngsters "a community history" gives them back a feeling of belonging, of being part of a "special place" they can call their own, she said.

In addition to her Brea history work, Fanning has been an active member of the Lark Ellen Christian Church, serving as Women's Fellowship president, as well as playing organ for many years. She has been a member of the Brea Woman's Club since 1977 and served two terms as its president, from 1981 to 1983. She recently was a part of the Brea Project's Development/ Redevelopment Task Force and Brea's Downtown Charette.

Fanning, a graduate of Brea Olinda High School and UCLA, began her teaching career at Laurel Elementary School. She has kept in contact with youth by working in Scouting, teaching piano lessons and serving as a school volunteer for Project Self-Esteem. She also brought Brea's past to the attention of local third-graders in a project she called "Treasure Chest of Brea History."

Fanning and husband Karl have four children, Richard, Bill, Alan and Jean.

Brenner, a University of Michigan graduate, began her nursing career as a pediatric nurse in Pittsburgh. A switch to a career in medical sales marketing eventually brought her to California. She is married to Dr. Charles Brenner of Brea's Center Orthopedic Group and has two sons, Michael, 7, and Scott, 5.

Brenner learned of Oba's need for a bone-marrow donor after talking with his mother, Karen, an employee at Center Orthopedics. At that time, Brenner said she believed "Brea was a small town that would rally to help one of its own."

Since then, hundreds of potential donors have been screened and more than \$120,000 was raised to help pay for donor testing. Brea Soroptimists were among the first to contribute to the Friends of Brandon Oba campaign, Brenner said.

A national registry of marrow donors eventually found a potential match for Oba, who underwent the transplant procedure in January. Although the transplant was unsuccessful, Oba has been able to return to high school and will graduate with his class this month. He and his family are exploring further treatment possibilities with medical experts in Texas.



Brea Soroptimists honor group

BREA — As a result of a community forum held on Feb. 22, the Soroptimist International of Brea honored seven organizations at a luncheon May 3 to present them with financial assistance.

Present at the meeting were: Clea Harder representing Help for Brain Injured Children (H.B.I.C.); Rosemary DeCuir for the Brea Senior Center; Judy Stewart with Womens Transitional Living Center (WTLIC); Inez Framing representing the Brea Historical Society; Jan Wingerter for Brea Community Girl Scouts; Eileen Moore for County Hills Elementary School; and Patty Thomas of the Girl Scout Council of Orange County.

The Boys and Girls Club of Brea and the Salvation Army representatives were unable to attend this meeting and will receive funding later in the month.

The Brea Senior Center received money to purchase a portable TV-VCR and cassettes to be used in their "Sharing

Companion Program." Volunteers make regular visits to the elderly, often bed-ridden, individuals and the equipment is being purchased so they can share health, educational, entertaining or reminiscence tapes with their homebound friends. WTLIC is an emergency shelter for battered women and their children (many of whom have also been physically abused or sexually molested). Since its inception in 1976, WTLIC has sheltered over 7,000 individuals. They received funding to purchase supplies for their new children's research center.

The Soroptimists lent assistance to Brea County Hills Elementary School to establish an Artist-in-Residence program whereby students will receive instruction in painting, sculpting, clay and learn an appreciation for the arts.

The Girl Scout Council of Orange County received partial funding for a special "Activity Center Troop" to serve the minority population of Brea who have not been able to receive volunteer leadership.

A check was also presented to the local Girl Scout troops for a joint Christmas tree project. The Soroptimists purchase the Christmas trees and the Girl Scouts work to decorate and deliver them to the less fortunate citizens of Brea.

HBIC is well known for the hope it has given many children by making the most of their special talents and helping them to become participating members of their family. Since 1967, HBIC has helped over 3,300 children. The club presented HBIC with funds to purchase a laser printer for their computer.

The Brea Historical Society has many very old photographs of Brea which need to be preserved and framed. This is a very delicate procedure and many photos will have to be

restored or touched up. The Soroptimists are helping in this endeavor to keep in touch with a piece of "Good Old Brea."

Each year, the Soroptimists hold the community forum to find worthy causes in need of financial assistance. The 1990 forum will be held in September or October.
