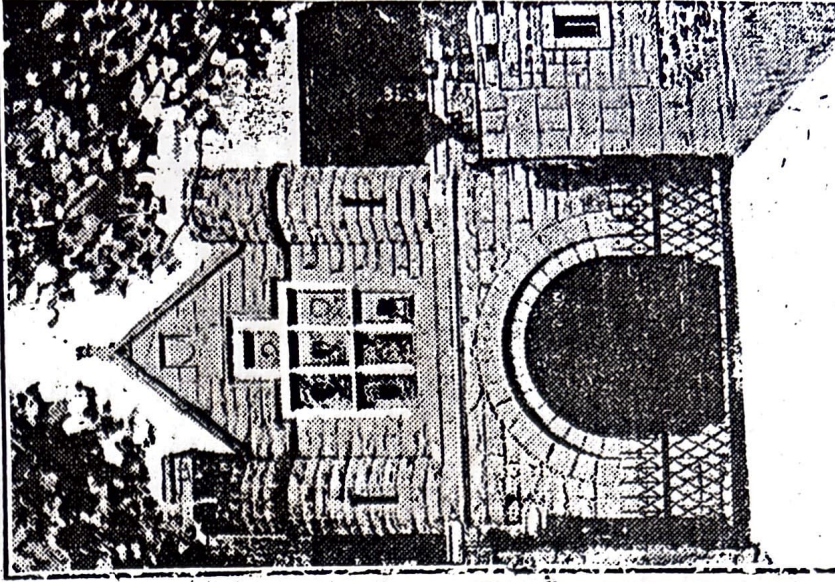

## Farm Bureau Takes Part In Power Hearing

The Orange county farm bureau is today representing the farmers of Orange county at the hearing of the Southern California Edison Company before the railroad commission at Los Angeles. This hearing is a re-evaluation case and will probably take several months.

The bureau is being represented by Sidney E. Saunby, chairman of the power division of its public utilities department, and by Judge F. S. Brittain, attorney for the California Farm Bureau Federation. The farm bureau has made extensive investigations and preparations for this case in an effort that he farmers' side may be properly presented along with that of the power company's.

Strenuous efforts to have the government develop the avocado industry in California to the same point of perfection as it has the lemon and orange production are being made in Washington at the present time. F. O. Popenoe of Los Angeles, head of the Avocado Association, has been in Washington for some time and has had several conferences with Congressman Osborne preliminary to conferences with the secretary of agriculture and members of his technical staff.

Popenoe's plan is to have the department of agriculture include an item in the appropriation bill to set aside \$7,500 to retain the services of A. D. Shamel, an acknowledged expert in the propagation and development of the avocado and standardize the methods of its production and improvement so that the avocados may be marketed under standard grades with as great certainty

**Lynn Blystone Tours Austria**

Today we saddle up for a jaunt through the Tirolean area of Austria. This is a region of Alps and glacier-carved valleys. Although the country is modern and civilized, the old world costumes are still worn as everyday clothes.

The women in their peasant blouses and skirts are always carrying a large handbag of drawing type which serves to carry groceries or other things. It is a common sight to see men, old and young, walking down the streets of the city in their leather shorts and suspenders, green embroidered jackets, and knee warmers. The outfit is completed by a green tirolean hat with the largest plume of an owl or a brush of badger hair. Last, but not least, comes the ornately carved pipe with its foot-long stem.

I had my first acquaintance with the tirol in Garmish-Partenkirchen which is on the German-Austrian border. One of the first things I did was to ride the cable railway to the top of the local mountain. At one point our angle of ascent was 45° and we dangled 320 feet off the ground. From the top we had a great view of the valley and the Zugspitz, German's highest mountain (9200 feet).

That evening back in G-P I watched the cows come home, first stopping at the town well for a drink and continuing on down the appropriate street to get home. This happens right in the middle of the city so I thought I could get some interesting pictures. I knelt down in the gutter, ignorant of the fact that I was between the

**"EVERY FIRE IN BREA LAST YEAR WAS CAUSED BY CARELESSNESS"**

The Brea Fire department answered 38 alarms for fire in the city of Brea during the fiscal year ending June 30, according to the report of Fire Chief A. G. Ellis which was turned over to the city council last Monday night.

The department also went out on alarms during the year.

Seven of the 38 alarms were for dwellings while eight were grass fires. Five fires were caused by burning rubbish and four were burning automobiles.

"Every fire which was started in Brea last year," Fire Chief Ellis said, "was the result of carelessness."

Causes of fires were listed by Fire Chief Ellis as follows: cigarette smokers, 2; individual carelessness, 8; dangerous electrical wiring, 8; children with matches, 3; heating and cooking, 2.

Fire losses in the city of Brea were controlled to a per capita fire loss of \$1,007 according to the fire chief's report. Dwelling loss in Brea was only \$3,690. The previous year the total fire loss in Brea was only \$3,690.

The Brea fire trucks traveled a total of 5 1/2 miles during the year and in doing so also rescued two cats out of trees and flushed a parrot out of a tall tree for a lady.

An Important Function Perhaps one of the most important functions of the Brea Fire Department is the resuscitator work which has been accomplished this year. Those who have had occasion to see the work of the Brea fire department

for their efficiency and their patience.

The Brea fire department answered a total of nine calls for resuscitator service and were able to revive five of the victims. Seven of the persons treated were heart victims, one was choking and one was overcome by smoke.

In two cases brought to the attention of The Progress it would have been fitting for a worthy Brea Fire department for the excellent work done in attempting to revive patients suffering with heart failure. This was not done at the time in order to avoid embarrassment to those concerned and their families.

The chief reports he made a total of 110 fire prevention inspections last year and issued 156 fire permits. The chief also gave four fire prevention talks at the grade school and showed a fire prevention movie at the Grammar school.

The department was improved by a 1954 GMC fire truck to replace the small 200-gallon Ford pumper. The new truck is a 750-gallon pumper triple combination.

An Excellent Department Chief Ellis praised his force and his volunteer fire fighters and modestly admitted that the Brea Fire department is in excellent condition at this time. Chief Ellis admitted, however, that low pressure still plagues some fire hydrants. This condition has been called to the

### New Negley Home Gets Under Way

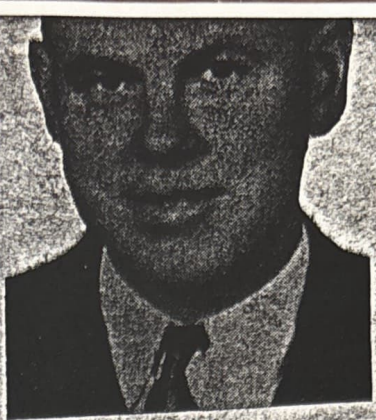
The new home planned by G. R.
