# \$10,000 DRUG STORE TO FEATURE NEW BUILDING

Forms are being removed from the walls of the new Craig block on the east side of Pomona avenue between Ash and Birch streets where the last pour of concrete was made early in the week.

This re-inforced concrete business block will be Brea's finest structure. Even in its un- finished state it is one of the most imposing objects in the business district.

The entire city is anxiously awaiting its completion, in or- der that the Brea postoffice may occupy its new home in the street floor of this build- ing, where modern and ade- quate fixtures will permit of Brea receiving the postal ser- vice to which it is entitled and which it has been physically impossible to give under exist- ing conditions. Adjoining the postoffice on the north, a large store room has been leased by McKelvey and Volz, Fullerton pharmacists, who will install an up-to-the-minute drug store soda fountain and confection- ery at an approximate cost of \$10,000.

The remainder of the sec- ond floor will be occupied by the club rooms and meeting hall of Brea Post of the Amer- ican Legion, for whose use it has been specially designed. The structure will be in every way a credit to Brea, as well as to the Craig family, who are its owners and builders.

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A Manual Training display by Grammar Schools and High School will be seen in the Poly- technic or Manual Training Building. The machine shop will be in operation and boys will be at their work through- out the day and evening.

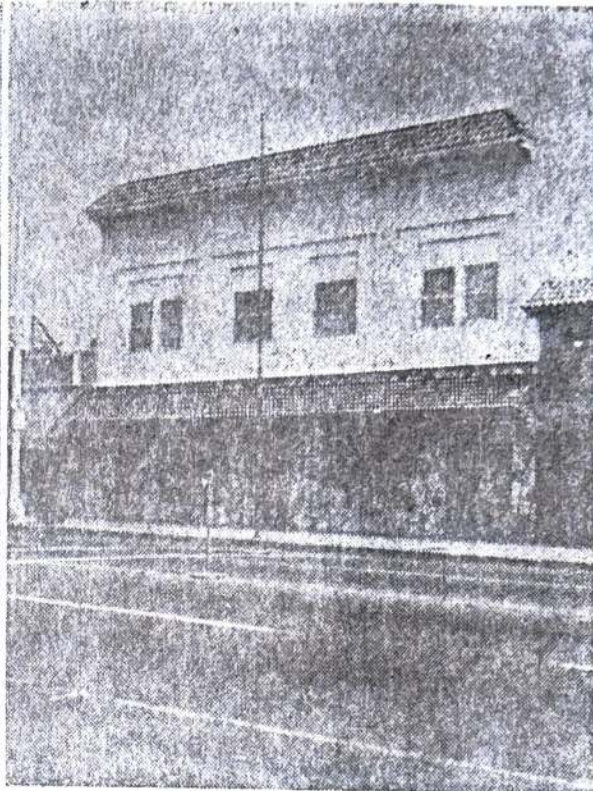

## Brea's Venerable Craig Building Solid Reminder of 'Good Old Days'

BREA— One of the city's oldest downtown business buildings is still being used, and according to city officials is still in as good a shape structurally as it was when it was built.

Built by Issac Craig, who served on the original Brea City Council, it was then in the center of the business district. Located on north Brea Blvd., it is still in the center of the business district.

When first constructed in 1921, the building served as the city post office and a tall flag pole set in 1921 still stands on the sidewalk.

Known as the Craig Building for years, it stands as an example of how they constructed buildings in the "good old days." According to Ted Craig, son of the builder, the old structure is made of solid concrete laced with oilfield steel cable.

In the "good old days," most buildings were built without

steel reinforcing, but this unit shows the wisdom of steel. According to city officials, not a crack exists after 44 years.

The old building has had various uses in its long history, including an upstairs public hall. Many Brea old timers remember public dances and get-togethers upstairs over the post office.

When first built, a drug store was located on the ground floor next to the post office, but various business have been located there over the years.

Ted Craig followed his father's footsteps in service to the city and was mayor of Brea 1928. He was instrumental in development of the City Hall park which was done during his four-year term.

Craig later served as an assemblyman from this district and was speaker of the Assembly in 1935 and 1936. When he retired, Tom Kuchel, now U.S.

senator from this district, was selected to take his place.

Regardless of what happens to the downtown shopping center, it will probably include the Craig Building.

Experts claim the building is constructed like a "vault" and they wouldn't want the job of tearing it down or moving it.
