

Battalion Chief Bernell Ausmus is dead at 66

Services will be held Wednesday for retired Fullerton Fire Department Battalion Chief Bernell L. Ausmus, who spent nearly three decades battling smoke and flames for the department.

Mr. Ausmus, who resided at 2015 E. Ballou Ave. in Fullerton, died of natural causes at St. Jude Hospital. He was 66.

Services will be held at 3 p.m. Wednesday at Waverly Chapel at Fairview Memorial Park in Santa Ana. A funeral will follow at the park. Fairview Memorial is handling the arrangements.

A memorial service also is slated for 2 p.m. Sunday at the Psychics Foundation, 1212 E. 14th Ave., Anaheim.



Bernell Ausmus

Mr. Ausmus was born Jan. 25, 1918, in Grand, Colo., and served with the Army during World War II.

He joined the Fullerton Fire Department in 1946, and served on the city fire force until 1952. He then was transferred to the El Toro Fire Department. He returned to the Fullerton force in 1955, and began moving up the promotional ladder.

He retired from the department in 1976 with the rank of battalion chief.

Mr. Ausmus was instrumental in the formation of the Fullerton Firemen's Association in 1960, and served as the group's president for its first two years. A past president of the Orange County Firemen's Association, Mr. Ausmus also served two years on the Fire Science Advisory Committee for Santa Ana College.

Active in firefighting affairs statewide, Mr. Ausmus served on the finance and education committees of California State Firemen's Association, and served four years as chairman for that association. He also served as chairman for three years for the annual fund-raiser to benefit CSFA.

While active in CSFA, Mr. Ausmus was instrumental in establishing the organization's annual "Medal of Valor" program designed to honor heroic firemen statewide. In 1967, Mr. Ausmus himself became a Medal of Valor winner. The award resulted from a December 1966 residential fire, which had been set by an arsonist. Mr. Ausmus ran into the blazing home to rescue two badly burned children who had been trapped by the flames. The children later died of their injuries.

Mr. Ausmus is survived by his wife, Joanne of Una of Waco, Colo.; a sister, Veda Chittock of McClave, Colo.; and one grandson.

Civic, financial leader Clarence Schwartz dies

Noted civic and financial leader Clarence Schwartz died Saturday at his Fullerton home at 1521 N. Raymond Ave. He was 72.

Burial military services will be held at 2 p.m. Monday at Arlington National Cemetery, and burial will follow at the cemetery. Neels Brea Mortuary is handling the arrangements.

A local memorial service will be conducted at 5:30 p.m. April 9 in Multipurpose Room A of the University Center at Cal State Fullerton, with the Rev. Howard Jamieson of Tustin Presbyterian Church officiating.

Mr. Schwartz was born Feb. 3, 1912, in Anita, Pa. He graduated from Allegheny College and went on to New York University graduate school before he entered the banking profession.

Mr. Schwartz, who married his wife Helen in 1942, served in the South Pacific with the Navy during World War II, and later served for a quarter of a century with the U.S. Navy Reserve, where he attained the rank of commander.

Following the war, the Schwartzs moved to California, and Mr. Schwartz joined the Oilfield's National Bank of Brea as assistant cashier. The bank later merged with California Bank and he was named manager.

When the bank became United California Bank — and later First Interstate Bank — Mr. Schwartz was president on the board of directors and was vice president in 1962. He retired in 1977, but became a founding director of the Founders National Bank in Brea during 1980-81, and later served as vice chairman of the bank.

Named by Brea Chamber of Commerce with an honorary life membership, he also was named Brea Business Pioneer by that organization.

Mr. Schwartz's community and civic projects also were noteworthy. He served as community representative for the advisory board of Family Service Association of Northern Orange County; a founding commissioner of the Fullerton Arboretum; a member of the board of directors and president of California State University, Fullerton, Foundation; and served on the advisory board of St. Jude Hospital.

He also was affiliated with the Brea Masonic Club Lodge 656 F. & A.M. and the Brea Lions Club.

Additionally, Mr. Schwartz maintained an interest in Orange County athletics and led fund-raising drives to send one Brea athlete to the Olympic games and another to Wimbledon.

In addition to his wife, Mr. Schwartz is survived by his sister, Mildred Geisweid of Cleveland, Ohio.

Memorial contributions in his name may be made to the St. Jude Hospital Memorial Fund.

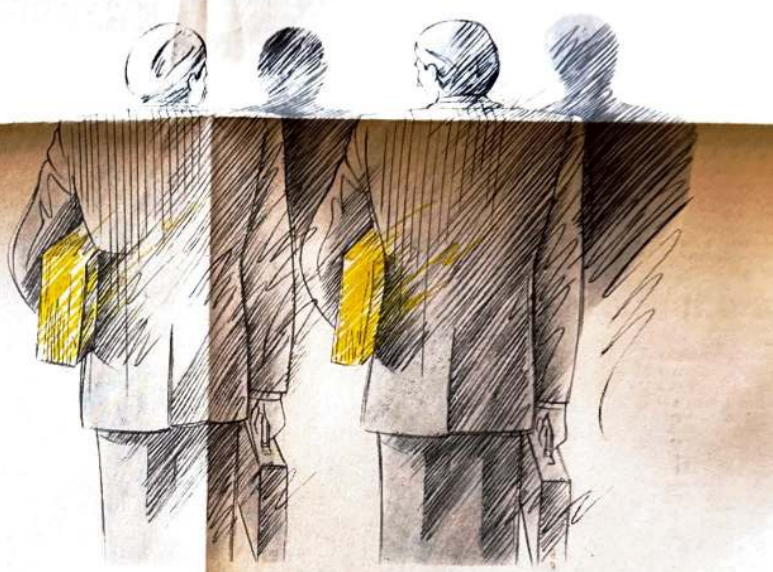

Banker Clarence J. Schwartz Is Dead at 72

Was a Fixture in Brea, Fullerton Business Circles for Four Decades

Clarence J. Schwartz was a fixture in business and banking circles in Brea and Fullerton for more than four decades. Those who knew him best often said the UCB initials at his branch of United California Bank, later to become First Interstate Bank, stood for "Uncle Clarence's Bank."

came to California after their marriage in 1942, and he joined what was then called Oilfields National Bank of Brea as an assistant cashier.

When Oilfields merged into a chain called California Bank, later to become UCB and then First Interstate, Schwartz moved from manager to member of the board of directors, and then in 1962 to UCB vice president.

After his retirement in 1977, he joined seven other local businessmen as a founding director of the independent Founders National Bank in Brea. He was vice chairman of the bank's board of trustees when he died.

Bob O'Such, a district manager with First Interstate who worked for most of a decade with Schwartz in the 1960s and '70s, said Monday that Schwartz "had a lot to do" with the original merger of Oilfields into California Bank. "He taught me a lot over the years. He was well-respected and very involved in his community," he said.

Among his many other activities, Schwartz was a

Schwartz, who died Saturday at 72, was active in dozens of business and charitable organizations in the two cities. "He did a lot of things for a lot of people," said Agnes Porter, his secretary for 21 years and now a bank manager herself.

Porter said Schwartz, who lived in Fullerton, helped bring much new industry to Brea both in his banking role and as an organizing member of the city's Chamber of Commerce.

Schwartz was born in Anita, Pa., and started his banking career in Pennsylvania in 1935. He and his new wife, Helena,

Full military services for Schwartz will take place Monday at Arlington National Cemetery in Washington, D.C., where he will be buried. A memorial service will take place April 9 at 5:30 p.m. at Cal State Fullerton's University Center.

just a lot of wind, she said. Nearly all the 1,300 Southern California Edison customers in the Mojave Desert and Antelope Valley lost power, but had it restored by Monday evening, said utility spokesman Charles Beal. Bob Oldfield, operations manager of Edison's Barstow district, said the outages were mainly due to winds crossing power lines, causing circuits to "lock" or short out.

The 103-mph gust was clocked at Mojave Airport about 75 miles north of Los Angeles, said a Federal Aviation Administration spokesman who declined to give his name.

CHP Officer Randy Whiteside was hit by a flying rock near Indio in the Mojave Desert, and three people suffered minor injuries in the nine-car crash near Lone Pine on Highway 395, about 170 miles north of Los Angeles, officials said.

Whiteside was opening his patrol car door Monday afternoon when a sand blast and the rock came hurtling at him on Interstate 10, CHP information Officer Debbie Stanfill said.

The car door was ripped off its hinges, she said, adding that Whiteside was treated for head injuries at Desert Hospital in Palm Springs.

All the glass was blown out of another CHP car near Indio on state Route 111 where a truck had overturned. No one was injured, Ms. Stanfill said. Route 111 was closed due to the winds, CHP dispatcher Ruta Fox said.

Highway 395 was closed from just north of Lone Pine to just south of Independence for almost three hours, following the nine-car pile-up about 1 p.m. near Manzanar, a World War II Japanese internment camp, CHP Sgt. Jay Roberts said.

One woman suffered a concussion and was admitted to Southern Inyo Hospital in good condition, said Dr. Barbara Keenan.

Two other women were taken to local hospitals to be checked, but appeared to have no serious injuries, she said.

In Barstow, the wind snapped a steel pole on a 50-foot road sign at a Main Street truck stop around 3:30 p.m., forcing officers to di-

C.J. Schwartz dies at age 72

BREA — Clarence J. Schwartz, long an active community leader, died in his home Saturday, March 24, after a lingering illness. He was 72.

Schwartz had been involved in numerous civic programs since moving to the area almost 40 years ago. He founded the Brea Community Fund in 1950, helped organize the Brea Chamber of Commerce, was a founding member of the Brea Industrial Development Committee in 1969 and devised innovative financing to help the Redevelopment Agency complete the basic site improvement for the Brea Mall.

Schwartz was born in Anita, Pennsylvania, Feb. 3, 1912. He graduated from Allegheny College and attended graduate school at New York University.

He moved to California follow-

ing World War II and became assistant cashier for Oilfields National Bank in Brea. The bank merged with California Bank in 1955, and Schwartz became manager in 1958. He was later elected vice president when the bank became United California Bank (now First Interstate Bank). He retired in 1977.

He became a founding director of Founders National Bank in Brea in 1980 and served as vice chairman of the board of trustees. He was president of Group IV of the California Bankers Association in 1976 and served on the board of the statewide association from 1970 to 1977.

Schwartz' interest in worthy causes was evident in his many charitable activities. He was chairman of the Red Cross Drive in Brea for three years, beginning in 1947. He served as treasurer of the Orange County Youth Foundation from 1962 to 1981, and he was instrumental in
